Ludlow Pond Management Committee End of Year Summary

2025

The Ludlow Pond Management Committee would like to share a 2025 summary of the work that has been done on some of the Ludlow Ponds and the status of the health of the ponds. Since the re-formed Pond Management Committee began in 2022, the Committee has utilized an external Pond Management company, Water and Wetland, to help identify and treat our local ponds. With the support of the Ludlow Selectboard, the committee has been able to meet our objective of improving and sustaining a healthy ecosystem in Haviland, Harris, Alden and Murphy Ponds. Due to constraints with obtaining appropriate permits for Minechoag, we continue to work to improve this pond as well. Below is more details of the overall health of these ponds as of September, 2025 We are excited to see the amazing results and we look forward to continue to expand our reach to other ponds while maintaining the amazing results in the above ponds.

Haviland Pond

This site visit consisted of a post-treatment survey. Haviland Pond is currently in excellent ecological condition. During the time of the survey, no invasive aquatic plant species or significant algal blooms were observed, indicating a stable aquatic ecosystem. The only notable invasive species present was purple loosestrife (Lythrum salicaria), which was confined to the shoreline. A diverse assemblage of native pondweeds were observed throughout the pond. These submerged aquatic plants play a critical role in maintaining the pond's ecological balance. They provide essential habitat and cover for fish, invertebrates, and amphibians, as well as contribute to oxygen production and nutrient cycling. Overall, Haviland Pond is in excellent condition and shows the previous treatment to target filamentous algae, microscopic algae, and pondweed growth was successful.

Harris Pond

A survey was conducted at the time of this visit to Harris Pond. The goal of this survey was to assess previous treatment success, as well as hand-pull and water chestnut observed. We are happy to say that only one water chestnut was observed during this visit (which was hand-pulled and properly disposed of). Nuisance densities of large-leaf pondweed and thin leaf pondweed have been reduced, opening water that was previously overrun by aquatic plant growth. Filamentous algae was present throughout most of the pond along shorelines, with the greatest algae found in the eastern half of the pond in very shallow water. The western half of the lake was found to have small, scattered mats of filamentous algae. Due to the lack of rainfall in recent weeks, water levels were visibly lower than normal. Overall, the pond appeared to be in good health with no more existing invasive water chestnut and reduced densities of nuisance plant growth.

Alden Pond

A survey and an herbicide treatment were conducted at the time of this visit to Alden Pond. The goal was to observe the effects of our ProcellaCor treatment which targeted invasive variable milfoil. Prior to treatment, milfoil covered a vast majority of the pond, forming dense mats from the shoreline and

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extending into the middle. This high density of plant growth made recreational activities and navigation of the pond extremely difficult. We are pleased to report that this treatment worked extremely well, with no variable milfoil found within any portion of the pond. Water levels remained very low due to the lack of summertime rainfall, but water clarity and dissolved oxygen readings remained on par with our previous visit. A very small trickle of water was noted at the northern end of the pond, but construction barriers in the water impeded most of this movement. A slight algae bloom was visible at the southern end of the pond near the dam. Algae blooms have been very common in this region due to excessive nutrients from springtime rain, lack of water movement, and hot summer temperatures. Overall, management of invasive variable milfoil was extremely successful.

Murphy Pond

The visit consisted of a final post-treatment survey for the 2025 season. Sonar applications were applied previously targeting nuisance densities of aquatic species such as waterlilies. Previously, almost one hundred percent of the pond was covered in waterlilies, with dense bladderwort underneath. This survey revealed the success of our treatments, as the pond's surface was now entirely open water. Bladderwort was found in low, scattered densities around the pond with nearly all specimens observed in a state of death or decay. "Floating islands," or clusters of waterlily roots on the surface, were observed scattered around the entire pond. This is a common and natural result of waterlily treatment, as roots will float to the surface after the waterlilies are no longer living. The rhizome (root) mass can float to the surface due to the decomposition process and the plant's built-in buoyancy structures. As a result of the lack of summertime rainfall, water level within was considerably low, as well as water clarity. This lack of rainfall also contributed to the low dissolved oxygen readings, which can be common in shallow, stagnant bodies of water. Overall, management of Murphy Pond in the 2025 season was highly successful at reclaiming the open water.

Minechoag Pond

Minechoag was surveyed in 2022. Documented were waterlilies, watershield, bladderwort, duckweed, and coontail. Waterlilies, watershield, and bladderwort were the most dominant, as these species were noted at dense densities, observed throughout the majority of the Pond. These three species were most problematic from the shoreline extending towards the middle of the Pond and continue to invade the majority of the pond since the survey in 2022.

At the time of the survey, Water & Wetland checked the Natural Heritage and Endangered Species Program (NHESP) database to see if the Ponds falls within either an estimated habitat or priority habitat area of rare species. Minechoag Pond falls within an area considered as priority habitat of rare species. Due to this habitat of rare species, the committee has not been able to obtain the required permit to treat Minechoag until a determination can be made if the rare plant species exist. This has been an ongoing priority for the committee and multiple approaches have been researched. The committee continues to work with experts in the field to find a suitable resolution.

RE: Request for Review of Potential Impact of Proposed Commercial BESS Project Near Cobble Mountain Reservoir Watershed

Dear Selectboard:

The Springfield Water and Sewer Commission (Commission) is in receipt of correspondence dated October 21, 2025, from the Town of Blandford. The Commission appreciates the Town of Blandford's concern with regards to Battery Energy Storage Systems (BESS) in the watershed associated with the Cobble Mountain Reservoir. As you know, the Commission is a regional water supplier that provides drinking water to 250,000 customers in Springfield, Ludlow, Agawam, East Longmeadow, and Longmeadow. Source water protection and protecting the public water supply are top priorities for the Commission. The Commission submitted a comment letter on October 30, 2025, to the state Department of Energy Resources regarding the Energy Infrastructure Siting and Permitting Reforms to express our concerns about projects like the referenced projects in Blandford. Please see attached for a copy of this comment letter that details significant concerns with the Draft Guidance of Site Suitability for Clean Energy Facilities.

As a public water supplier, the Commission has a vested interest about any development within the watershed to Borden Brook Reservoir and Cobble Mountain Reservoir. Each specific development project in the watershed is unique and has a variety of benefits and risks depending on the type of development, its size, and location. All developments in the watershed require thoughtful consideration and review. A project that is poorly designed and constructed can pose a variety of concerns related to water quality. These concerns may vary from potential chemical usage or spills, increased risk of wildfire, and sediment and erosion problems that can lead to increase in turbidity and organic matter being discharged into the reservoirs.

Recent fires at Battery Energy Storage Systems (BESS) facilities in California and New York as well as information on EPA website regarding these systems indicate that lithium battery fires have raised safety concerns in many communities and provide unique challenges for host communities and first responders. The Commission's source waters are in rural municipalities served by volunteer fire departments surrounded by forests. In 2024, Massachusetts experienced an unprecedented amount of brush fires across the state exacerbated by drought conditions during the fall months. Large wildfires in a watershed to a public drinking water reservoir would result in vegetation loss, a reduction in nutrient uptake, and could alter the quality of runoff into reservoirs potentially increasing the costs of water treatment and resulting in water quality violations.

JEVEDEVEL

While the Commission has no formal jurisdiction over development on private property in the watershed, there is an opportunity to collaborate with the Town to develop and implement local zoning controls through adoption of a watershed protection district or health regulations that would impose targeted land use and development regulations to protect the Cobble Mountain Reservoir watershed.

With regards to specific BESS projects within the Town of Blandford, the Commission understands, based on review of proposed energy projects on the Town's website, that there are currently two BESS projects proposed within the watershed; a 4.04 megawatt solar facility and BESS located at 89 Chester Road, and another 200 megawatt BESS located near the existing Eversource Substation at 79 North Blandford Road. The Commission will closely monitor and provide comments with the siting, design, or construction of these and any proposed BESS projects to the extent that the Commission has standing in a regulatory process that the BESS developers are following.

RE: Comments on Draft Guidance on Site Suitability Assessments for Clean Energy Infrastructure

To Whom It May Concern:

This correspondence details significant concerns that the Springfield Water and Sewer Commission (Commission) has on the Draft Guidance of Site Suitability for Clean Energy Facilities.

Springfield Water and Sewer Commission is a Regional Public Water Supplier

The Commission is a regional water supplier that provides drinking water to 250,000 customers in Springfield, Ludlow, Agawam, East Longmeadow and Longmeadow. The Commission's reservoir system is located about 20 miles west of Springfield in the towns of Blandford, Granville, Russell, and Westfield. The primary source of raw water comes from two surface water reservoirs, with the smaller Borden Brook Reservoir draining into the larger Cobble Mountain Reservoir. Water from Cobble Mountain Reservoir is then moved through a series of two smaller impoundments, before being treated at West Parish Filters Water Treatment Plant and distributed to the service area. The combined watershed of these reservoirs total over 30,000 acres.

The Commission maintains and implements a Source Water Protection Plan, as required by the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection (MassDEP) Drinking Water Regulations, the purpose of which is to identify existing and potential threats to the quality and/or quantity of drinking water sources and to propose ways to mitigate or minimize those threats. The watershed is mostly rural forested land, the ideal natural filter/buffer for surface drinking water reservoirs.

Comments on the Draft Guidance on Site Suitability Assessments for Green Infrastructure

The draft Guidance on Site Suitability Assessments for Green Infrastructure does not include any protection of public drinking water supply watersheds as part of the criteria. Energy facilities pose the potential for unacceptable water quality risks if located within public water supply watersheds.

Recent fires at Battery Energy Storage Systems (BESS) facilities in California and New York as well as information on EPA website regarding these systems indicate that lithium battery fires have raised safety concerns in many communities and provide unique challenges for host communities and first responders. The Commission's source waters are in rural municipalities served by volunteer fire departments surrounded by forests. In 2024, Massachusetts experienced an unprecedented amount of brush fires across

the state exacerbated by drought conditions during the fall months. Large wildfires in a watershed to a public drinking water reservoir would result in vegetation loss, a reduction in nutrient uptake and could alter the quality of runoff into reservoirs potentially increasing the costs of water treatment and resulting in water quality violations.

Currently there are six existing and proposed facilities in the Cobble Mountain Reservoir watershed, identified in the attached Figure. Development of the existing facilities has not been without impacts to the watershed. As an example, the Commission was asked to hold a Conservation Restriction on a large wetland on property owned by a solar developer as mitigation required by an Administrative Consent Order issued by the MassDEP due to the discharge of untreated stormwater directly to wetlands or waters of the Commonwealth. The solar developer had self-reported violations related to the discharges to resource areas on at least 29 different days.

The draft guidance for site suitability assessments does not include water protection zones as part of the site suitability criteria, rather the guidance includes drinking water supply under a section titled "Other Considerations of Note". This section notes that the Mass DEP Drinking Water Regulations, 310 CMR 22.00, regulate public water supplies and water supply protection areas and that municipal public water systems are required to adopt local controls (in the form of zoning or general bylaws/ordinances or health regulations that meet the requirements of 310 CMR 22.00), enforceable by the municipality, to protect these areas. This section assumes that all public water supplies own and operate water supply land and reservoirs within the municipality that they serve, or that municipalities have adopted zoning restrictions for public water supplies that do not serve their municipality. For many public water suppliers, including the Commission's case, water supply reservoirs are in other communities, and the implementation of protective local zoning is not feasible.

We recommend that the draft guidance be revised to prohibit BESS projects from being sited in Zone A or Zone B water protection areas. We also recommend including a water supply category within the site suitability criteria that will trigger a notification to a public water supplier that a facility has the potential to be located within Zone C of a public drinking water reservoir. Accordingly, we recommend that the associated draft guideline on minimization and mitigation measures be revised to include a water supply category that includes qualifying minimization measures such as funding water and watershed land acquisition or infrastructure improvement projects, Emergency Response Plan (ERP) training events, and wildfire training events. Public water suppliers provide essential services, and it is critical that these resources be included in the site suitability criteria for green energy facilities.

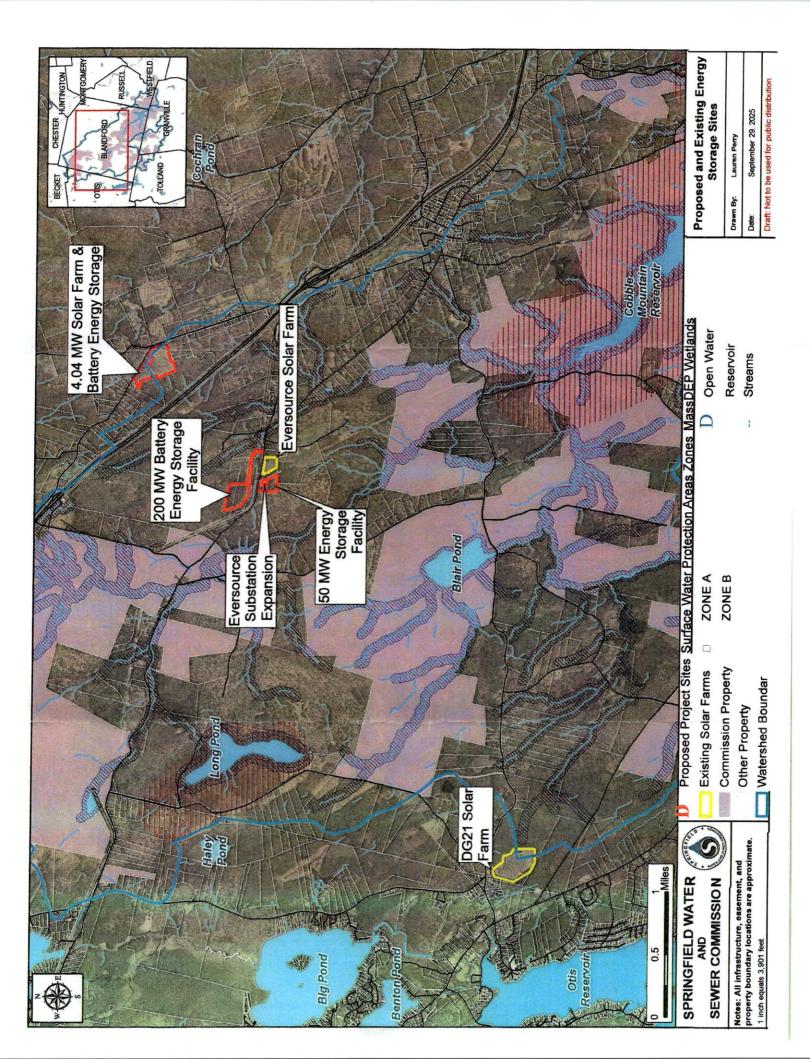
The Commission's top priority is protecting the public water supply. While we understand the benefits of green-energy and generally support green energy projects, BESS-may-pose unacceptable water-quality risks when located within public water supply watersheds. We strongly request that the Energy Infrastructure Siting Board consider revising the regulations and associated guidelines to include the protection public drinking water.

REMARKS

BRIDGE ORIENTATION

Bridge carries West Street, north and south, over Stony Brook, which flows from east to west. **See Sketches 1 - 3.**

GENERAL REMARKS

Scour Monitoring:

Drop line measurements of the channel were taken during this inspection. See Chart 1.

ITEM 58 - DECK

Item 58.1 - Wearing Surface

Hot Mix Asphalt (HMA) Wearing Surface has some minor longitudinal & mapcracking with & without sealer. **See Photo 1.**

Item 58.2 - Deck Condition

Refer to Item 59.15. - Concrete Slab.

Item 58.8 - Railing

Railing consists of two square shaped concrete rails with concrete posts.

Several of the concrete rails have cracks and spalls with exposed rusted rebar.

Southeast Endpost has a spall with exposed rebars with no section loss. See Photo 2.

East Railing:

- Center post is spalled, 3" wide x 5" high x 1" deep, at the bottom interior west edge.
- Top rail, north end, the concrete is missing with only rebar remaining. See Photo 2.
- Bottom rail, north end is spalled, full length x 3" high, x 3" deep with exposed rebar on the lower interior face.
- Remainder of rails have moderate scaling with exposed rebar.

West Railing:

All horizontal rails have moderate scaling with exposed rebar. See Photo 3.

ITEM 59 - SUPERSTRUCTURE

Item 59.15 - Concrete Slab

18" thick reinforced concrete slab has several random isolated rust stains from the rebar chairs.

Southeast Corner, Underside of Slab has 2 minor delaminations with rust staining 2' long x 7" wide. **See Photo 4.**

ITEM 60 - SUBSTRUCTURE

Item 60.1 - Abutments

Item 60.1.d - Breastwalls

North & South Breastwalls have minor waterline abrasion. See Photo 4.

South Breastwall has a small pop-out spall, 3.5" diameter. See Photo 5.

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REMARKS

Item 60.1.e - Wingwalls

Northeast Wingwall has an 1/8" wide full-height vertical crack with light efflorescence. See Photo 6.

Northwest Wingwall has a 10" diameter x 1" deep spall.

Item 60.1.1 - Embankment Erosion

Southeast, & Southwest Corners have minor embankment erosion behind the wingwalls.

ITEM 61 - CHANNEL AND CHANNEL PROTECTION

Item 61.2 - Embankment Erosion

Refer to Item 60.1.I. - Embankment Erosion.

Item 61.4 - Vegetation

Upstream channel has an 10' diameter vegetative island in middle of brook, directing the brook flow against the South Breastwall. **See Photo 7.**

Downstream channel is filled with vegetation growth. See Photo 8.

Item 61.7 - Aggradation

North Abutment has silt accumulation up to 8.5' into the channel and up to full width of the breastwall. Brook flow is directed at the South Abutment. **See Photo 9.**

TRAFFIC SAFETY

Item 36a - Bridge Railing

Refer to Item 58.8. - Railing.

Item 36b - Transitions

Transition areas consist of single panel steel W-beam guardrail that abut the concrete railing on the east side, the west side guardrails have terminal ends that abut the railings. See Photo 2.

Transitions have minor collision damage.

Item 36c - Approach Guardrail

Approach guardrails consist of steel W-beam guardrail on steel H-posts with steel offset blocks. All railing is covered with vegetation.

Northwest Approach guardrail has moderate collision damage. Guardrail is leaning to the west. See Photo 10.

Southwest & Southwest Approach guardrails have been replaced. See Photo 11.

Item 36d - Approach Guardrail Ends

All four approach quardrails have terminal ends.

Southeast Approach guardrail end has severe collision damage.

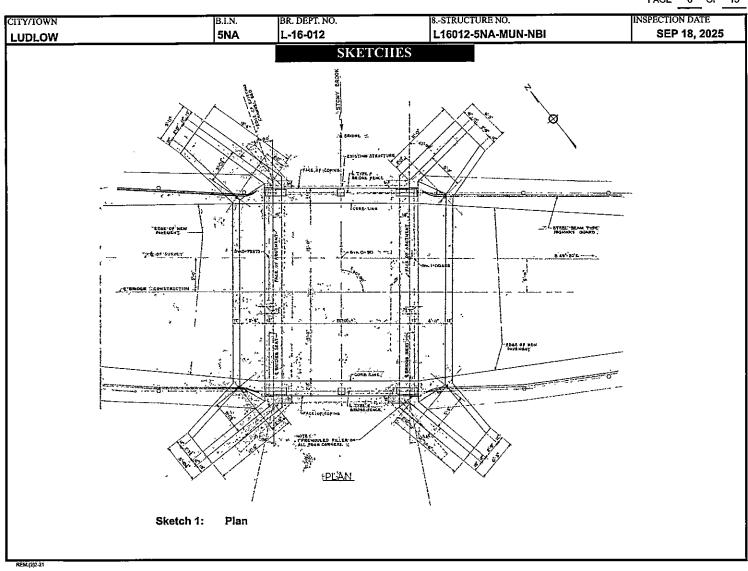

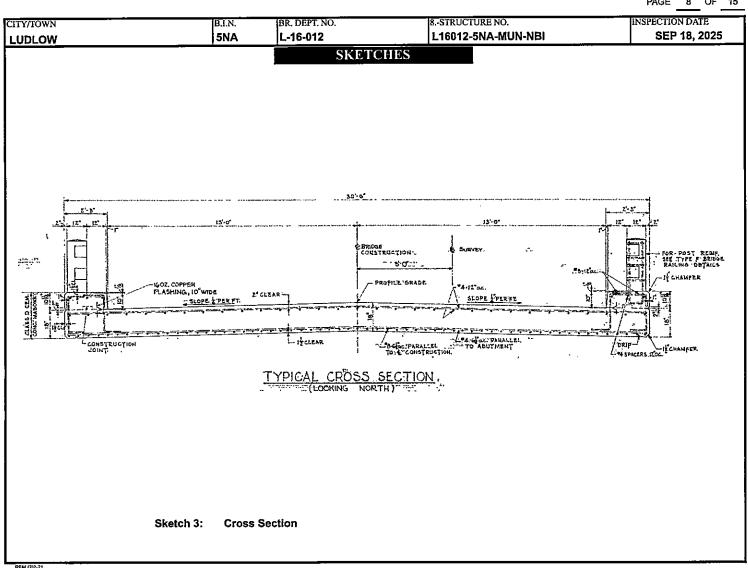

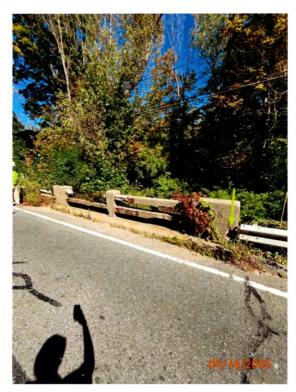

REMARKS

BRIDGE ORIENTATION

Culvert carries Piney Lane, east and west, over the Broad Brook which flows north to south.

The 3 barrels are numbered west to east. The man made Alden Pond is on the downstream end of the culvert.

GENERAL REMARKS

Structure BIN 0QX is closed to highway and pedestrian traffic. An adjacent ACROW panel bridge with a pedestrian way now carries Piney Lane.

At the time of this inspection Broad Brook still flows through the pipes. See Photos 1 & 2.

Pedestrian and Highway traffic is blocked by fencing, Jersey barriers and signage.

SI&A Notes:

The following Items apply to the ACROW panel:

- Item 51 Bridge Roadway Width Curb to Curb = 4.1m
- Item 32 Approach roadway width = 4.1m
- Item 47 Inventory Route Total Horiz. Clear = 4.1m
- Item 102 Direction of Traffic = 1 Lane Alternating, 3

Traffic Management:

Piney Lane is a dead end; a detour is not required.

Alden St has 2 VMBs.

- The south board states "BRIDGE WORK PINEY LN & USE CAUTION". See Photo 3.
- The north board is not functioning.

East & West Advanced signage states speed limit (25mph), one lane road ahead, and speeding fines doubled. See Photo 4.

East & West At-Bridge signage states road closed with barrels and ladder barriers. See Photo 5.

Access:

Wintertime, Dam Control Downstream keeps the stream level low and water velocity higher, from the November Inspection to the February inspection. Both ends of the pipes can be accessed with chest waders.

Summertime, Dam Control Downstream keeps the stream at a higher level and water velocity slow, from the May inspection to the August inspection. Water level is too high for the chest waders and a boat would not helpful to inspect the floor of the pipes.

Inspection of ACROW panel:

Report is an initial inspection. See Photos 9 - 12.

ACROW panels are labelled south and north trusses, panels are numbered west to east. Abutments are labeled west and east.

Overall Rating of Items 58, 59 & 60 is 7 - 7 - 7. Item 61 is 7.

REMARKS

<u>ITEM 58 - DECK 7:</u>

Item 58.1 - Wearing Surface 7:

Wearing surface consists of Epoxy Aggregate Non-Skid Coating on the 24 steel prefabricated deck units.

Wearing surface has minor sand and debris. See Photo 13.

Item 58.2 - Deck Condition 7:

Deck consists of 24 prefabricated deck units. See Photo 10.

Item 58.6 - Sidewalks 7:

The sidewalk is cantilevered off the south side of the bridge. See Photo 14.

Item 58.8 - Railing 7:

Railing consists of square steel tubes on t-beams.

APPROACHES

Approaches a - Appr. Pavement Condition 8:

East & West Approaches, Hot Mix Asphalt (HMA) is new.

Approaches b - Appr. Roadway Settlement 8:

ITEM 59 - SUPERSTRUCTURE 7:

Item 59.5 - Trusses - General 7:

Item 59.5.a - Upper Chords 7:

Upper Chords throughout have minor surface corrosion.

Item 59.5.b - Lower Chords 7:

Lower Chords throughout have minor surface corrosion.

Item 59.5.c - Web Members 7:

Web Members throughout have minor surface corrosion. See Photo 7.

Item 59.5.d - Lateral Bracing 7:

Item 59.5.e - Sway Bracings 7:

Item 59.5.g - End Posts 7:

End Post throughout have minor surface corrosion.

Item 59.7 - Conn Pit's, Gussets & Angles 7:

Connection Plates have minor surface corrosion

Item 59.9 - Bearing Devices 7:

Bearings are comprised of 3 rocker bearings, one for each of the 3 courses of web panels.

East Bearings (expansion) do not have anchor bolts. See Photo 15.

REMARKS

West Bearings (fixed) have anchor bolts.

Item 59.13 - Member Alignment 7:

No misalignment or settlement was noted.

Item 59.14 - Paint/Coating 7:

Item 59.15 - Transoms 7:

Transoms have minor corrosion. See Photo 10.

ITEM 60 - SUBSTRUCTURE 7:

Item 60.1 - Abutments 7:

Item 60.1.b - Bridge Seats 7:

East & West Bridge Seats consist of reinforced concrete.

Both seats, at the centerline, have timber cribbing. Per the plans these act as "bolsters," a material is not called out.

East Bridge Seat has sand accumulation. See Photo 16.

Item 60.1.c - Backwalls 7:

Backwalls consist of reinforced concrete.

Item 60.1.f - Slope Paving/Rip-Rap 7:

East Slope is behind sheet piles.

West slope consists of sand and clay.

Item 60.1.i - Piles H:

Each abutment has 8 micropiles.

Item 60.1.k - Settlement N:

ITEM 61 - CHANNEL AND CHANNEL PROTECTION 7:

Item 61.1 - Channel Scour N:

At the time of inspection, Alden Pond was drained to winter levels. The 3 pipes have been disturbed during construction, slowing water velocity. Sand and silt are filling the previously noted scour downstream of the pipes. **See Photo 17.**

Item 61.3 - Debris 7:

Upstream of the ACROW panel is the remnants of the 3 barrel culvert. See Photo 17.

Item 61.4 - Vegetation N:

TRAFFIC SAFETY

Item 36a - Bridge Railing 7:

See Item 58.8 - Railing.

REMARKS

Item 36b - Transitions 8:

Transitions consist of a 3 barrel Sentry Longitudinal Energy Dissipater (SLED) system. See Photo 18.

Item 36c - Approach Guardrail 8:

North Approach guardrail consists of sidewalk handrail and chain-link fence.

South Approach guardrail consists of sidewalk handrail and jersey barriers. **See Photo 19.**

Item 36d - Approach Guardrail Ends N:

Approach guardrails have no end treatments.

Photo 1:	Pedestrian and Highway traffic is now directed onto and ACROW panel. The culvert and
	construction site are wrapped in fencing and jersey barriers.

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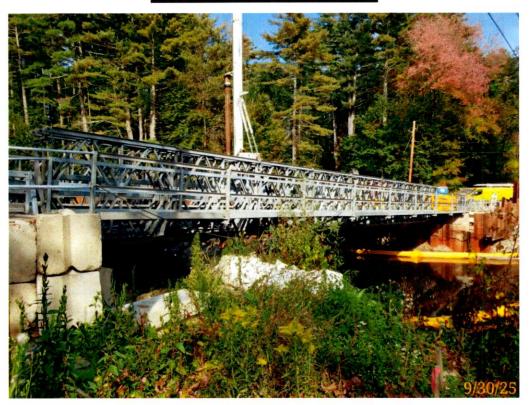

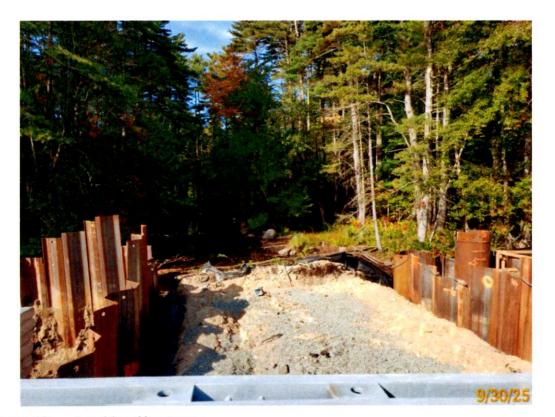


Photo 12: Looking Upstream.

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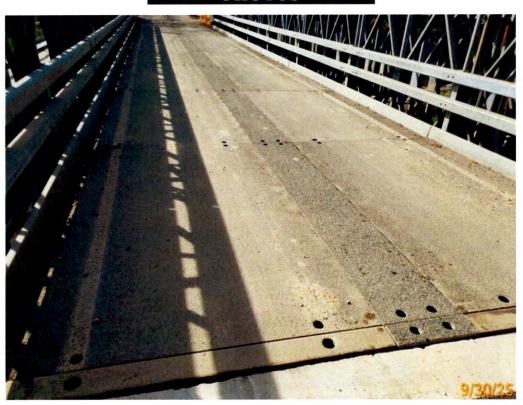


Photo 13: Wearing Surface has minor sand and debris.

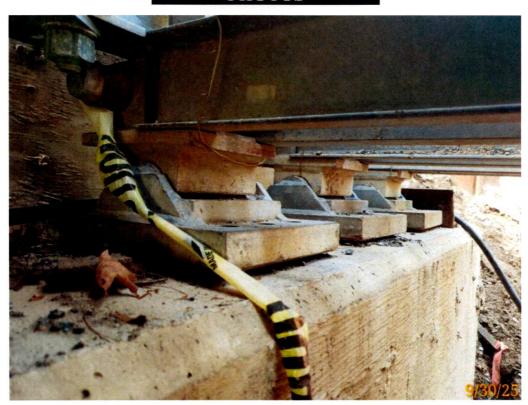


Photo 15: East Bearings (expansion) do not have anchor bolts. Each of the 3 web panels rest on an individual bearing.

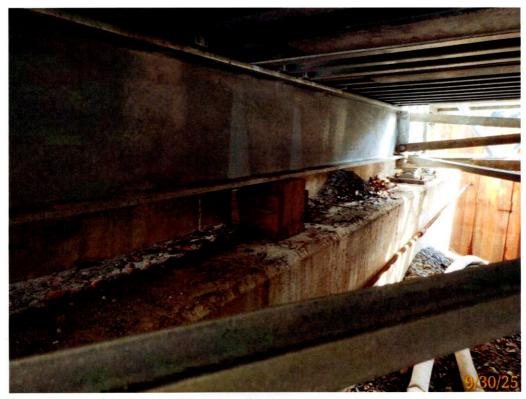


Photo 16: East Bridge Seat has minor sand accumulation. Both seats have timber blocks that act as bolsters per the plans.

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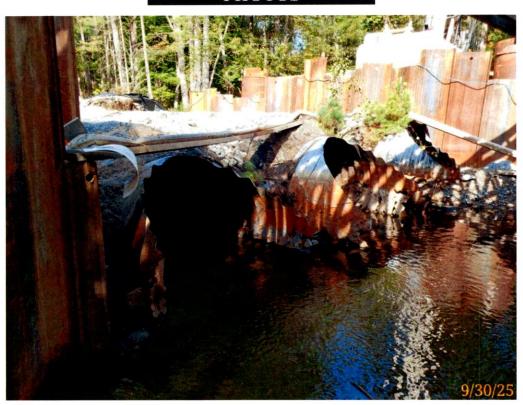


Photo 17: Scour, 0QX has been disturbed during sheet pile installation, down stream water velocity and scour has reduced significantly.

On August 1, 2025, Eversource Gas Company of Massachusetts, d/b/a Eversource Energy ("Company"), filed with the Department of Public Utilities ("Department") its 2022-2025 Three-Year Energy Efficiency Plan Term Report ("Term Report"). The Term Report documents actual energy savings, benefits, and expenditures resulting from the implementation of the Company's 2022-2024 three-year energy efficiency plan approved by the Department in Eversource Gas Company of Massachusetts, D.P.U. 21-121 (2022). Dam Registration (302 CMR 10.05)

All dams regulated by the ODS must be registered to create a public record of ownership.

The first step in the Registration process is to complete and submit a Dam Registration Form (DRF) to ODS. If you have not yet completed and submitted a DRF (Dam Registration Status = DRF OVERDUE), please find one enclosed for your use. Please complete, sign, and return the DRF to: Office of Dam Safety, Attn: Registration, 180 Beaman Street, West Boylston, MA 01583.

In order to complete your DRF, you will need to know the Parcel ID and Registry of Deeds reference for the property on which the dam is located. Oftentimes, you can call or visit the Assessors Department website of the municipality in which the dam is located for assistance in determining this information. Additional information that you will be required to include on the DRF can often be found in your most recent dam safety Phase I Inspection report or you can call or email ODS for assistance in locating this additional information.

The Registration process is complete when, after you have submitted a DRF to ODS, ODS issues you a "Certificate of Registration," which then needs to be recorded at the Registry(ies) of Deeds in the County(ies) in which your dam parcel(s) is (are) located, and return proof of recording to ODS (Dam Registration Status = Registration Certificate Recorded). Until you return proof of recording of the "Certificate of Registration" to ODS, you are out of compliance with the Dam Registration requirement.

If you were issued a Certificate of Registration and did not record at the time of receipt (Dam Registration Status = Registration Certificate Issued), you will need to contact the ODS and request a re-issue. If you have recorded your Certificate of Registration and have not yet forwarded a copy to ODS, please forward a copy to update the official record.

Ch. 253 Dam Safety Permit (302 CMR 10.09)

It is the obligation of a dam owner to contact and notify all applicable local, state, and/or federal permitting agencies prior to conducting any work at a dam, including manipulation of water levels. Additionally, any dam owner planning to conduct any material alterations or repairs to a dam is obligated to file a Ch. 253 Dam Safety Permit Application with the Office of Dam Safety. Please be advised that no work can begin until the dam owner/project proponent is issued a Ch. 253 Dam Safety Permit, or ODS issues a written determination that no Ch. 253 Dam Safety Permit is required for the proposed scope of work, and also obtains all other applicable local, state, and/or federal permits.

For questions related to an open Ch. 253 Dam Safety Permit or questions related to submitting a Ch. 253 Dam Safety Permit application, please contact Bryan Carignan at Bryan.Carignan@mass.gov.

Other Local, State, and/or Federal Permits

In order to maintain compliance with the Commonwealth's Wetlands Protection Laws, you may have to seek requisite approval from your local Conservation Commission in accordance with G.L. c. 131, §40. You are obligated to contact and maintain communication with your local Conservation Commission and any other local, state, and/or federal permitting agencies to ensure compliance with the Wetlands Protection Act and any other regulatory requirements, which may include, but not be limited to, Department of Environmental Protection, Wetlands and Waterways Program, whose website can be viewed at the following link: https://www.mass.gov/topics/wetlands-waterways, the Massachusetts Environmental Policy Act (MEPA) Office, whose website can be viewed at the following link: https://www.mass.gov/orgs/massachusetts-environmental-policy-act-office, and the US Army Corps of Engineers Regulatory/Permitting Division, whose website can be viewed at the following link: https://www.usace.army.mil/missions/civil-works/regulatory-program-and-permits/.

You may also need to seek requisite approval from MassWildlife's Natural Heritage and Endangered Species Program, whose website can be viewed at the following link: https://www.mass.gov/orgs/masswildlifes-natural-heritage-endangered-species-program.

The above reference to other local, state, and/or federal permits is meant to be a reference guide for informational purposes only. Each project and property are unique. The permits required for any project will be project specific and site specific and will require due diligence on the part of the property owner and/or project proponent. ODS recommends you consult with your chosen dam engineering consultant to determine all of the local, state, and/or federal permits that may be applicable to your proposed project.

Phase I Inspections (302 CMR 10.07)

Owners of dams are required to hire a qualified engineer to complete a Phase I Inspection and report results every 2 years for High Hazard Potential dams, every 5 years for Significant Hazard Potential dams, and every 10 years for Low Hazard Potential dams. Phase I Inspections must be conducted by a Professional Engineer registered in Massachusetts with dam engineering experience.

Condition Compliance (302 CMR 10.08)

High Hazard Potential and Significant Hazard Potential dams with condition ratings that are Poor or Unsafe are considered to be out of compliance with dam safety regulations and posing a heightened, unacceptable risk to downstream public safety. Such dams are required to be brought into compliance with Dam Safety regulations by either being repaired, adequately breached to prevent re-impoundment to a jurisdictional threshold, or completely removed. The choice of which alternative to pursue is for a dam owner to make in conjunction with their chosen engineering consultant and in consideration of any other applicable stakeholders and regulations.

Please be advised that this requirement is not applicable to dams classified as Low Hazard Potential.

Follow-Up Inspections (302 CMR 10.07(2)(a))

In addition to the periodic Phase I Inspections required of all regulated dam owners, owners of High Hazard Potential and Significant Hazard Potential dams with condition ratings that are Poor or Unsafe are also required to submit Follow-up Inspection reports once every six (6) months for Poor condition dams, or once every three (3) months for Unsafe condition dams. Follow-up Inspections are to be conducted by a Professional Engineer registered in Massachusetts with dam engineering experience at the frequency stated above until the dam is

brought back into compliance with dam safety regulations by either being repaired, adequately breached, or completely removed.

Please be advised that this requirement is not applicable to dams classified as Low Hazard Potential.

Phase II Inspections and Investigations (302 CMR 10.08(3))

High Hazard Potential and Significant Hazard Potential dams with condition ratings that are Poor or Unsafe are also required to have a Phase II Inspection and Investigation completed to prepare for design and permitting of a repair, adequate breach, or complete removal project that will bring the dam into compliance with dam safety regulations.

Additionally, dam owners with dams of any Hazard Potential Classification or condition rating may choose to complete a Phase II Inspection and Investigation to prepare for design and permitting of a proposed dam construction project that will maintain a dam in a condition that is protective of the public.

Emergency Action Plans (302 CMR 10.11)

All owners of dams classified as High Hazard Potential and Significant Hazard Potential, regardless of condition rating, shall submit an Emergency Action Plan (EAP) to the ODS, the Massachusetts Emergency Management Agency (MEMA), and your local Emergency Management Director (EMD). Please be advised that there are two different EAP templates available on the ODS website. One template is required for High Hazard Potential Dams and the other template is required for Significant Hazard Potential dams. Please ensure that you and your engineering consultant are using the correct template.

Annually, the owner shall review the EAP, update it, and provide the updated EAP to all involved agencies.

EAPs and annual updates shall be provided by the owner in both hard copy and electronic format to the ODS. MEMA currently requests only electronic copies of EAPs/updates be submitted to their general inbox at TechHazards@mass.gov. You will need to inquire directly with your local EMD for their preference of submittal format. A directory of EMDs is available at the following link: https://www.mass.gov/find-your-local-emergency-management-director-emd.

Any GIS based inundation map shapefiles are to be forwarded to ODS electronically along with the copy of the completed EAP.

Please be advised, the Executive Office of Energy and Environmental Affairs (EEA) will shortly be announcing that their "Dam Owners Technical Assistance Program" is again accepting applications. Please be on the lookout for that letter with instructions on how to apply for assistance completing the EAP review and update at no cost to the dam owner. Please visit EEA's website at the following link for more information: https://www.mass.gov/info-details/dam-owners-technical-assistance-program.

Please be advised that this requirement is not applicable to dams classified as Low Hazard Potential.

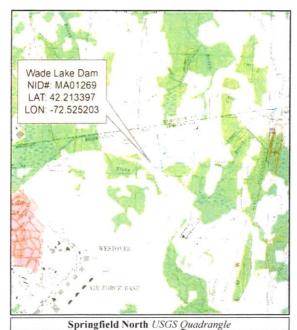

PREAMBLE

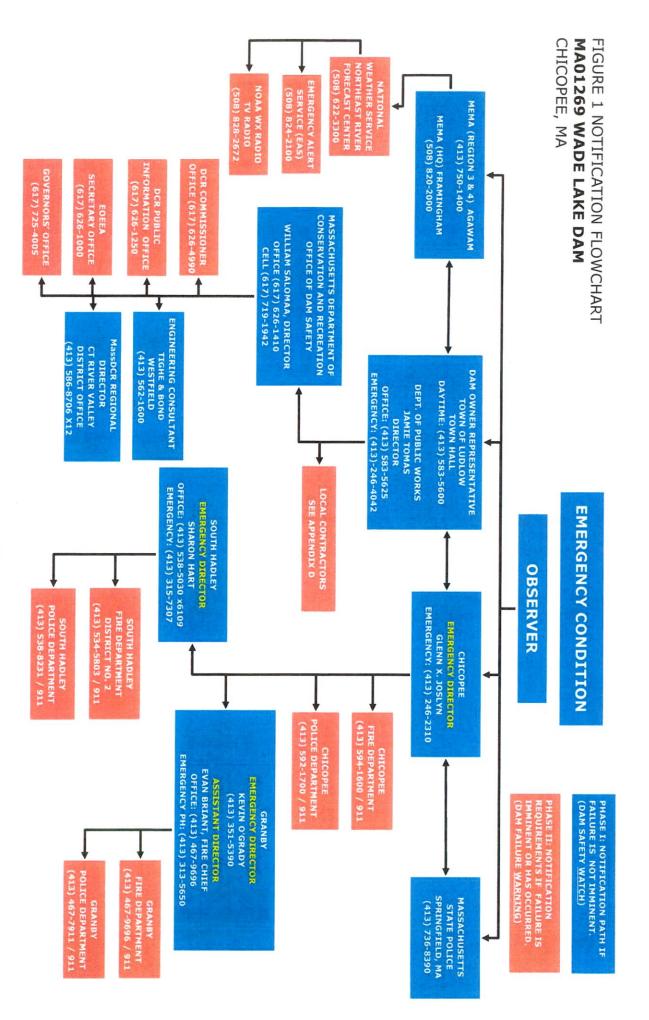
This Emergency Action Plan was prepared for the Town of Ludlow for Wade Lake Dam in accordance with the Commonwealth of Massachusetts General Laws, M.G.L. 253, Section 44, Chapter 302 CMR 10.00, "Dam Safety, dated February 10, 2017" to establish a basic plan of action if conditions at the dam indicate the potential for dam failure or if any individual observes and reports that a dangerous condition is developing at the dam. The development of this EAP has been primarily based on the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) "Federal Guidelines for Dam Safety: Emergency Action Planning for Dam Owners," dated October 1998, the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) "Emergency Action Plan Guidelines," dated November 1998, 2006 NRCS recommendations for developing EAPs, and other publicly available EAP templates from state dam safety programs.

The purpose of this plan is to define responsibilities and provide procedures for identifying unusual and unlikely conditions, which may endanger Wade Lake Dam and infrastructure downstream of the dam, in time to take mitigated action and to notify the appropriate emergency management officials of possible, impending, or actual failure of the dam in order to minimize property damage and loss of life.

This Emergency Action Plan should not be viewed as a substitute for implementing standard dam maintenance, inspections, and repairs in accordance with good dam operations.

It is important to note that the condition of the dam depends on numerous and constantly changing internal conditions and is evolutionary in nature. It would be incorrect to assume that the condition of the dam will remain the same over time. Only through continued care and inspection can there be any chance of detecting unsafe conditions before they result in an emergency condition.

The EAP is housed in a three-ring binder to easily facilitate updates to the plan. The EAP should be updated and exercised annually to ensure that the information is current. Most importantly, the names and telephone numbers of emergency response personnel listed in the Notification Flowchart shall be updated periodically. The general layout of an emergency response is as follows:



1.0 NOTIFICATION PROCEDURES

1.1 Notification Flowchart

The Notification Flowchart indicates the chain of communication to be followed in the event of an Emergency. The Notification Flowchart indicates a Phase I and Phase II type of notification to be implemented depending on the emergency classification level (Dam Safety Watch or Dam Failure Warning) as determined necessary based upon the judgment of the personnel monitoring the emergency condition at the dam (see Section 4 for additional descriptions).

- <u>Dam Safety Watch:</u> "Potential failure is developing": This is a situation where a failure may eventually occur if left unattended. This situation will require a Phase I response with continuous monitoring of the situation.
- <u>Dam Failure Warning:</u> "Failure is Imminent or has occurred": This is a situation where a failure either has occurred, is occurring, or is just about to occur. This situation will require Phase I and II responses that will proceed with evacuation procedures.

During the highest emergency level (Dam Failure Warning), procedures are to evacuate the downstream residents using a combination of the telephone, augmented by police cruising the area broadcasting the evacuation message and going door to door to homes that cannot be reached by telephone. To ease this burden somewhat, the National Weather Service can be alerted at (508) 622-3302 and they will make a general broadcast about the evacuation over the airways. The National Weather Service will call the Fire Department to verify the emergency. Therefore, the Fire Department should be called before the National Weather Service is contacted. MEMA can also be contacted to activate the Emergency Alert Service.

The flowchart should be updated yearly to account for local or state personnel changes. Any new personnel should be informed and trained to perform their responsibilities under this plan.

This Notification Flowchart is contained within the opening pages of this report.

1.2 Emergency Notification Template

Once the emergency condition has been identified, and the appropriate response level has been determined, the following template can be used as a guide for notification announcements:

"This is (your name, title, affiliation).

You are being contacted per the Emergency Action Plan for Wade Lake Dam.

Please be advised: A Dam (Safety Watch or Failure Warning) condition has been identified at Wade Lake Dam.

The observation was made at (time and date).

The situation is (provide brief description).

It is recommended that you (Remain on alert; Prepare for Evacuation; Evacuate the area and move to higher ground)".

1.3 Impact Summary / Road Closures

Details related to the modelling methodology and assumptions are summarized in Section 4.1 of this report.

It is anticipated that approximately 17 properties may be impacted by a flood wave from a breach at Wade Lake Dam. Table 1 contains a list of potentially impacted areas.

It is anticipated that 5 roadways may be impacted by a dam breach failure event. The location of the roadways relative to the dam, as well as the approximate peak flow, flood arrival time, and maximum depth are reported in Table 2.

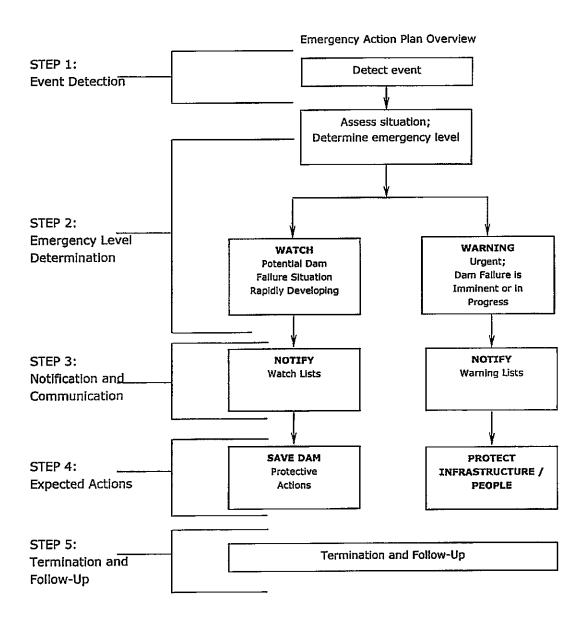

3.2 Emergency Response Coordination

During an emergency situation, **Emergency Management Director**, **Glenn X. Joslyn**, will be responsible for the proper organization and operation of the Emergency Action Plan. He will coordinate all activities with state and local authorities.

4.0 INUNDATION MAPS

4.1 Inundation Map Development

An analysis has been performed for Wade Lake Dam to estimate the downstream areas that may be inundated by flood waters in the event of a breach of this structure. The analysis was completed in December 2019 by Tighe & Bond, Inc. The dam breach flood and downstream inundated areas were estimated using DSS-WISE Lite. DSS-WISE Lite is an automated, web-based, two-dimensional dam failure flood simulation model and is a MassDCR approved software.

The potential area of inundation due to a breach of Wade Lake Dam as presented in this EAP and as shown on the "Orthophotograph of Estimated Downstream Breach Extent" map is based on the following assumptions:

- The pre-breach water level in the impoundment is at the assumed maximum elevation at the dam crest. This breach elevation represents the maximum water surface elevation modeled for this dam.
- 2. The post-breach water level in the downstream reach is based on routing the dam breach flood through the dam and includes no additional flow, representing a "sunny-day" failure condition.
- 3. Downstream structures, including bridges/culverts and dams, are not included in the model and are therefore assumed to not have any impact on the downstream flow.
- The horizontal resolution of the digital elevation model (DEM) used for the model was comprised of 15-foot grid cells.

For the purposes of this EAP, breach initiation is defined as the beginning of rapid uncontrolled growth of the breach, and full formation is defined as the point when significant lateral expansion has stopped. The dam breach parameters were calculated using the Federal Emergency Management Association (FEMA) P-946 "Federal Guidelines for Inundation Mapping of Flood Risks Associated with Dam Incidents and Failures" (July 2013) for a rigid dam. The time from breach initiation to full formation is 0.1 hours. The final breach bottom width is 30 feet, which is the minimum breach width modeled by DSS-WISE Lite. The peak flow through Wade Lake Dam at the time of failure is approximately 663 cubic feet per second.

This analysis provides a rough approximation of the dam breach outflow and the potentially inundated downstream areas. However, the actual magnitude of the flood wave and the resulting downstream flood levels will be dependent on numerous factors that cannot be predicted in advance. For example, the dam breach flood wave would be greater in magnitude if the water level in the impoundment is higher at the beginning of the failure. Furthermore, downstream flood levels could be increased due to conditions such as debris clogging bridge/culvert crossings and others. If these conditions exist, additional nearby properties may need to be evacuated.

4.2 Impact Area Summary

Wade Lake Dam impounds Wade Lake located on Stony Brook immediately east of Perimeter Road in the City of Chicopee. Discharge from Wade Lake Dam flows west towards the Westover Air Reserve Base and turns right to flow north into the Towns of Granby and South Hadley.

Downstream of Wade Lake dam, Stony Brook flows beneath Perimeter Road located immediately downstream of the dam. Flows then enter the Westover Air Reserve Base to cross a few private road-stream crossings, followed by a second Perimeter Road crossing before entering the Town of Granby. In the Town of Granby, Stony Brook crosses New Ludlow Road, Morgan Street, and West State Street (Route 202) before entering the Town of South Hadley, where Stony Brook crosses Morgan Street a second time.

Model results indicate that floodwaters from a breach of Wade Lake Dam may impact properties adjacent to Stony Brook on New Ludlow Road and West State Street (Route 202) in the Town of Granby, and Edison Drive, Mary Lyon Drive, and Morgan Street in the Town of South Hadley. Floodwaters are expected to attenuate through the wetland areas within the Westover Air Reserve Base property and through the forested areas adjacent to Stony Brook.

It is estimated that the maximum extent of a dam breach event at Wade Lake Dam will be limited to Stony Brook just upstream of Morgan Street in the Town of South Hadley.





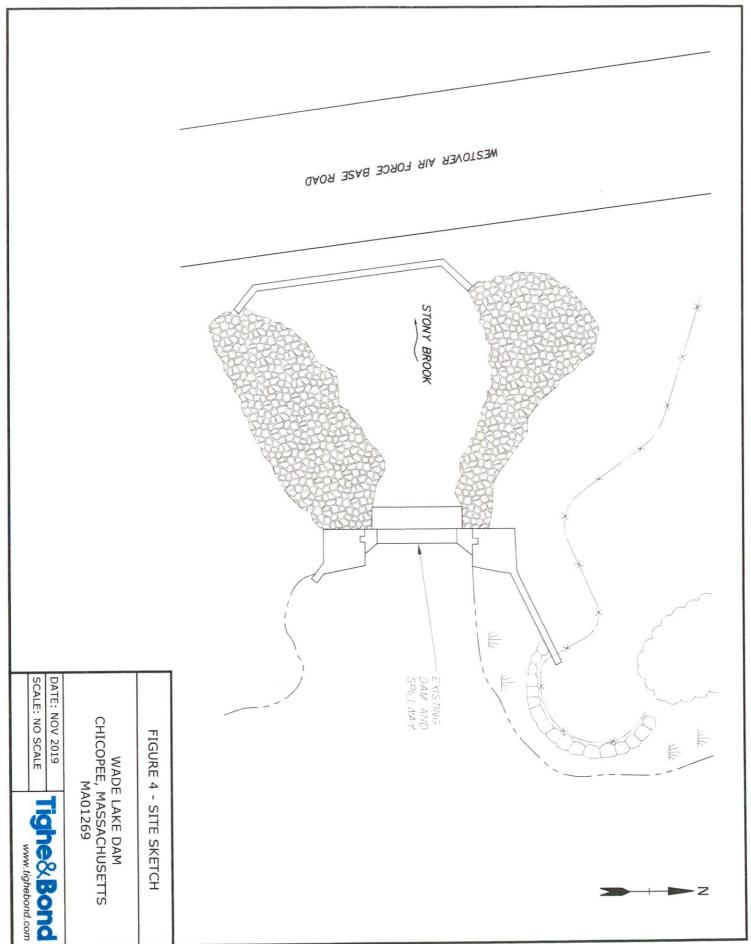

APPENDIX A PREPAREDNESS

Preparedness actions are taken to prevent an emergency situation from developing or to minimize the extent of damage caused from a developed emergency situation. The preparedness actions may be by providing response procedures to emergency situations and/or arranging for equipment, labor, and materials for use in emergency situations.

A.1 Surveillance

The most important part of the EAP is the identification of a problem at the dam. If a problem is not identified, the plan cannot be implemented. Problem identification will be much easier if knowledgeable personnel regularly monitor the dam closely.

The dam owner and dam operator must continue to monitor the dam on a regular basis. This is especially important during high rainfall events and during spring runoff conditions when large amounts of snow melting occur. Appendix B identifies some potential hazards that could lead to dam failure.

It is impossible to predict when an emergency situation will develop, therefore it is important that emergency contact information be posted at the site so that a casual observer can contact emergency personnel if they observe an unusual condition.

A.2 Access to Site

Wade Lake Dam is located east of South Street in Chicopee, MA. To reach the dam from the intersection of Route 202 and Route 33, travel southeast on Route 33 for approximately 350 feet, then turn left onto Old Lyman Road. Travel on Old Lyman Road for 1.0 miles, then turn left onto New Ludlow Road and travel for 1.7 miles to South Street. Turn right onto South Street and travel for 0.5 miles to a parking area. The dam is south of the parking area.

A.3 Operations and Maintenance Manual

There is no known formal operations and maintenance plan for Wade Lake Dam. The dam is inspected on a quarterly basis or after severe storm events. Maintenance is generally limited to vegetation removal and debris removal from the spillway as necessary.

A.4 Response during Periods of Darkness

At initiation of any Emergency Condition, the Dam Owner Representative and Emergency Management Authority should discuss options for bringing in artificial lighting in the event that the emergency continues into periods of darkness. The lighting should be used to illuminate the spillway, distressed areas of the dam, and other areas where observation or access may be required based on conditions that arise. In the event of a Failure Warning, such lighting should be brought to the site even if daylight is still available since onset of night could occur before the condition is terminated. In the event that artificial lighting is not yet available, the Dam Owner

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Representative, dam observer and other on-site personnel should use flashlights and vehicle headlights to the extent possible.

A.5 Response during Evenings, Weekends, and Holidays

Municipal departments staff can be contacted during weekends and holidays using standard phone numbers and hotlines. The Dam Owner Representative and Emergency Management Authority should ensure that alternate personnel are familiar with the dam and this EAP so that appropriate responses will occur if key personnel cannot be detected.

A.6 Response during Periods of Adverse Weather

Prior to and during storms, municipal personnel will be preparing to respond to adverse situations. Since municipal staff are more likely to be responding to other conditions during these periods, the Departments of Public Works, Police, and Fire from each community will ensure that additional staff are on-call if needed. If trees and/or limbs were to obstruct direct access and crews are occupied with emergency response in other areas, personnel should be equipped with chain saws as a precautionary measure.

A.7 Training and Testing

Training and testing of the EAP is the responsibility of the dam owner. The dam owner should coordinate training and testing with local responders and emergency personnel within the municipalities impacted by a dam failure. Training seminars should be held for all operators, attendants and other personnel (i.e. police and fire) responsible for the implementation of the plan. After the initial training seminar, it is recommended that a special meeting be held to explain the plan to the downstream residents and elected officials. The meeting with downstream residents will be extremely beneficial at a time of emergency.

It is recommended that the EAP or components of the plan be tested periodically. The testing should be conducted through the use of drills and exercises. Testing should include operators, attendants, police, fire and other personnel responsible for the implementation of the plan. Downstream residents shall not be included in the test.

Below is a list of suggested training exercises, the frequencies they should be conducted, and the topics they should cover:

Seminars with Emergency Personnel

- Frequency: As needed
- Topics:
 - o New hires should be briefed on their duties during an emergency response.
 - o At a minimum, a read through of the EAP and a brief assessment should be conducted.

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Emergency Management Workshop

- Frequency: Annually
- Attendees: Emergency Management Director, Fire Department, Police Department, Dam Owner
- Topics:
 - o Authorities responsible for executing the EAP should gather to discuss the EAP.
 - Review and updating of the Notification Flowchart, Emergency Contracts, and Emergency Warning systems should be conducted at this time.
 - Parties should discuss the response effort, specifically the Notification Flowchart and the corrective actions to be taken at the dam during various scenarios.
 - o Lines of communication should be streamlined such that a developing condition at the dam can be assessed and handled.

Public Meetings

- Frequency: Every 2 Years
- Topics:
 - o The public should be educated on the EAP and how they can facilitate the rapid and safe execution of the EAP during an emergency.
 - o Evacuation routes should be discussed.
 - Emergency Warning systems (i.e. Chicopee Swift911, Granby CodeRED, South Hadley Emergency Alert E-Notifications) should be discussed and updated.
 - Preparation and situational awareness techniques during an emergency situation e.g., areas of high ground within the town, keeping a cell phone charged, supplies needed for an extended evacuation, navigation of flooded roads.

Table Top Exercise

- Frequency: Every 3-4 Years
- Topics:
 - Emergency management personnel should gather and discuss different emergency scenarios to assess plans, policies, and procedures.

Functional Exercise

- Frequency: Every 5 Years
- Topics:
 - A functional exercise is conducted to test and validate the coordination, command, and control between the EOC, EMD, and all agencies involved with carrying out the EAP.

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o This type of exercise does not include any "boots on the ground".

After each of the tests mentioned above, a "lessons learned" discussion and evaluation should be conducted. The discussions should highlight procedures that work well and those that did not; as well as inaccurate information (within the flowchart, inundation maps, resident contacts, assigned responsibilities, equipment, etc.). Results should be written down and distributed to the associated parties and any corrections and updates should be made.

The training and testing activities should be fully documented.

A.8 Updating and Posting

All aspects of the EAP should be reviewed and updated once per year in accordance with the applicable guidelines. During the review, a determination of any new developments or other changes downstream or elsewhere should be made to determine whether any revisions to the current EAP are necessary. It is imperative that all other holders of the EAP receive updates to the EAP immediately upon becoming aware of necessary changes to keep the EAP workable. This includes revisions when phone numbers and/or names change for notification flow chart personnel and downstream residents.

An up-to-date copy of the flowchart and notification list should be in prominent locations in the offices of the personnel responsible for the EAP Implementation.

A copy of the complete up-to-date EAP should also be available to all operators and personnel responsible for the implementation of the EAP. At a minimum, a full copy of the EAP should be located at the following locations:

A.9 Emergency Response Coordination

During an emergency situation, the **Incident Commander** will be responsible for the proper organization and operation of the Emergency Action Plan. He/she will coordinate all activities with state and local authorities.

A.10 Contact Lists

Contact lists should be maintained for facilities, structures, and other properties that may be impacted by a flood wave. Dependent upon the nature of the inundated area, the contact lists may include residents to be evacuated due to shallow flooding, facilities requiring special considerations, and other facilities. Contact lists should also consider special needs in the impacted area such as multilingual communications.

Hard copies of the list should be kept at the EOC and within each EAP binder. At a minimum, annual reviews and updating of the contact list should be completed to keep the list current.

A.11 Alternative Systems of Communication

If there is an interruption in telephone service during an emergency condition, emergency response personnel should broadcast over their radio communications system and cellular phones as necessary. Cell phone/telephone numbers for the emergency responders should be maintained and updated in the notification flowchart on a regular basis.

A.12 Emergency Labor, Supplies and Equipment

Once an emergency condition has been identified, mobilization of the appropriate equipment is key to addressing the situation. The following lists provide partial equipment lists for the conditions described above. This list should be modified as required to address actual conditions at the time of the emergency. Additional equipment not listed below may be necessary. Actual condition and estimated response time versus the rate of deterioration of the dam may preclude the repair of the structure and necessitate full evacuation. The primary goal is to protect human life and minimize property damage.

- Emergency lights and generators for dam work or evacuation
- Construction equipment if the dam is repairable
- Loaders
- Excavators
- Gravel hauling trucks
- High wheel trucks

- Sandbags
- Shovels
- Tree removal equipment
- Barriers, barricades and personnel transportation to facilitate evacuation

The provision of labor, equipment and materials is the responsibility of the dam owner. As such, the following sections provide recommendations for establishing relationships and agreements with local contractors, vendors, and suppliers.

A.13 Subcontractors

The dam owner should develop/maintain open-ended contracts with a number of general contractors and/or suppliers. These contracts allow the dam owner to hire equipment as needed at a set hourly rate. Materials could be purchased from any of the contractors.

A.14 Potential Borrow Areas Around the Town

Potential borrow areas should be identified that could be utilized as sources of fill material in the event of an emergency condition at the dam requiring extra material. The owners of these and any other gravel pits that may be utilized during an emergency should be contacted. Appendix D identifies materials and equipment available within the region.



APPENDIX B EMERGENCY DETECTION, EVALUATION, AND CLASSIFICATION

The detection, evaluation, and classification of a potential emergency situation are crucial in determining the level of response and notification required in order to minimize the response time.

The following emergency classification system is proposed for this site:

- <u>Dam Safety WATCH:</u> "Potential failure is developing": This is a situation where a failure may eventually occur if left unattended. This situation will require a Phase I response with continuous monitoring of the situation. This emergency classification level was formerly titled "Condition I".
- <u>Dam Failure WARNING:</u> "Failure is Imminent or has occurred": This is a situation where a failure either has occurred, is occurring, or is just about to occur. This situation will require Phase I and II responses that will proceed with evacuation procedures. This emergency classification level was formerly titled "Condition II".

Examples of the preplanned procedures and notifications that should be followed based on the various conditions observed during either storm or fair weather conditions are outlined below. These are examples and are not intended to describe all possible conditions, nor are they intended to limit the actions taken during a given event.

B.1 Dam Safety WATCH Examples

Notify: ALL PARTIES SHOWN IN BLUE ON THE NOTIFICATION FLOWCHART

- Any seismic event regardless of how slight
- Other situations which may lead to damage at the structure
 - Evidence of vandalism
 - o Bomb threat
 - o A civil disorder near the reservoir
 - o Any aircraft accident near the reservoir
- Water level of the impoundment is at an unsafe level and is rising threatening to overtop the dam
- Discharges resulting in significant erosion and/or scour
- Any developing erosion, settlement, or upheaval occurring on the downstream slope or at the toe of the dam that is considered to be controllable
- Any undocumented leakage through any dam structure considered to be controllable

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B.2 Dam Safety WARNING Examples

Notify: ALL PARTIES LISTED ON THE NOTIFICATION FLOWCHART

- Water has overtopped or will overtop the dam
- Any uncontrollable erosion, settlement, or upheaval occurring on the downstream slope or at the toe of the dam
- Any uncontrollable leakage through any dam structure resulting in degradation to the structural integrity of the dam
- A dislocation or failure of any structure which allows for an expanding, uncontrollable discharge of water through the spillway or dam indicating a breach is occurring
- Dam is failing, is about to fail, or has failed

A Dam Safety Watch may be declared initially with gradual transition into a Dam Failure Warning or a Dam Failure Warning may be declared immediately, depending on the actual conditions.

While these actions attempt to generalize responses to the observed conditions, the judgment of the primary observer and/or knowledgeable person(s) must be utilized. While some conditions such as breaching, overtopping and severe piping can dictate an immediate evacuation; others will require the observer to determine the extent of the concern and the probability of the concern being addressed within a timely fashion.

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B.3 Additional Guidance for Determining the Emergency Level 1

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B.4 Potential Hazards That Can Lead to Dam Failure

The purpose of the section is to educate the user of the EAP as to some of the common causes of dam instability and possible failure. A short definition of each hazard is listed along with typical causes. This is not intended to be an exhaustive list of all failure mechanisms as each dam has a unique set of conditions which will influence the development of conditions and concerns.

1. Flow Erosion

- Washout of spillways, embankment sections.
- Causes: poor compaction of silt backfill; lack of riprap or concrete protection at interface between soil embankment and concrete structure; erosion by flow over embankment, spillway, or through outlet.

2. Embankment Leakage, Piping

- Excessive seepage resulting in internal erosion followed by formation of a "pipe" through the embankment, which once formed, causes rapid flow erosion and washout of the embankment.
- Causes: poor compaction of soil along interface with concrete structures; lack of seepage control collars around pipe; root and rodent holes; inadequate or nonexistent filters between fine and coarse soils; cracks or voids within the concrete structure.

3. Foundation Leakage, Piping

- Washout of foundation material below dam causing undermining.
- Causes: poor interface with bedrock and concrete structures; excessive seepage at dam toe carrying soil with it.

4. Sliding

- Serious movement in foundation or concrete structure, which either result in dam failure or significantly weaken the dam structure.
- Causes: Foundation material weak; excessive water pressure in structure or foundation.

5. Deformation

- Gross deformation of dam or outlet structures resulting in immediate failure or cracking of the dam, and subsequent washouts.
- Causes: excessive settlement in foundation, ice jacking (Pressure exerted by expending/contracting ice structures).

6. Blowing of Trees from Embankment

- Blowing of trees on and near the embankment would result in substantial cracks and scour of the embankment and subsequent washout of the embankments.
- Causes: heavy rain associated with gusty winds and natural aging and poor root system of the trees on and near the embankments.

7. Reduction of Crest Elevation

- Deterioration or washout of dam crest.
- Causes: poor concrete condition; heavy rain runoff.

8. <u>Dam Overtopping</u>

- Water flows over the crest of the dam causing erosion and subsequent reduced dam height with time. If overtopping continues for any length of time it may lead to a total failure of the dam.
- Causes: Heavy rain; blocked or inadequately sized spillway.

9. Cracking

- Longitudinal cracking can be due to movements and/or settlements of the dam and can allow water to infiltrate the concrete.
- Transverse cracking can be due to horizontal and/or vertical movement and can result in a flow path across the concrete structure.
- Thin cracks can be very deep and intersect the phreatic surface.

APPENDIX C TERMINATION AND RECOVERY

If the EAP has been placed into action and the event has been deemed to not be an emergency, or the threat has been mitigated, termination of the emergency response under the EAP will be the sole responsibility of the incident commander. Termination process should include, but not be limited to, the following steps:

- Notify all agencies and parties contacted during the response of the situation termination
- Issue public notification
- Complete post-situation dam inspection

Implement post-situation recovery including restoring impacted areas such that they are safe for public use and repairing or otherwise addressing damaged infrastructure

APPENDIX D AVAILABLE MATERIALS AND EQUIPMENT

The Town of Ludlow Department of Public Works should be contacted for emergency supplies such as trucks, pumps, sandbags and generators. Additionally, a partial listing of local contractors (with contact information) and the emergency supplies they have available is provided below. If emergency repairs may be warranted, supplies and equipment should be brought to the dam so they are available when needed.

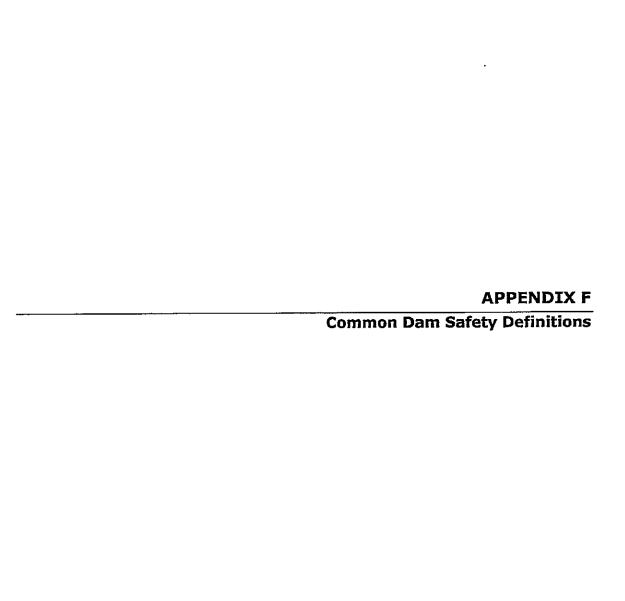

APPENDIX F COMMON DAM SAFETY DEFINITIONS

For a comprehensive list of dam engineering terminology and definitions refer to 302 CMR10.00 Dam Safety, or other reference published by FERC, Dept. of the Interior Bureau of Reclamation, or FEMA. Please note should discrepancies between definitions exists, those definitions included within 302 CMR 10.00 govern for dams located within the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

Orientation

Upstream - Shall mean the side of the dam that borders the impoundment.

<u>Downstream</u> – Shall mean the high side of the dam, the side opposite the upstream side.

Right - Shall mean the area to the right when looking in the downstream direction.

Left - Shall mean the area to the left when looking in the downstream direction.

Dam Components

<u>Dam</u> – Shall mean any artificial barrier, including appurtenant works, which impounds or diverts water.

<u>Embankment</u> – Shall mean the fill material, usually earth or rock, placed with sloping sides, such that it forms a permanent barrier that impounds water.

<u>Crest</u> - Shall mean the top of the dam, usually provides a road or path across the dam.

<u>Abutment</u> – Shall mean that part of a valley side against which a dam is constructed. An artificial abutment is sometimes constructed as a concrete gravity section, to take the thrust of an arch dam where there is no suitable natural abutment.

<u>Appurtenant Works</u> – Shall mean structures, either in dams or separate therefrom, including but not be limited to, spillways; reservoirs and their rims; low level outlet works; and water conduits including tunnels, pipelines, or penstocks, either through the dams or their abutments.

<u>Spillway</u> – Shall mean a structure over or through which water flows are discharged. If the flow is controlled by gates or boards, it is a controlled spillway; if the fixed elevation of the spillway crest controls the level of the impoundment, it is an uncontrolled spillway.

Size Classification

(as listed in Commonwealth of Massachusetts, 302 CMR 10.00 Dam Safety)

<u>Large</u> – Structure with a height greater than 40 feet or a storage capacity greater than 1,000 acre-feet.

<u>Intermediate</u> – Structure with a height between 15 and 40 feet or a storage capacity of 50 to 1,000 acre-feet.

Small – Structure with a height between 6 and 15 feet and a storage capacity of 15 to 50 acre-feet.

Non-Jurisdictional – Structure less than 6 feet in height or having a storage capacity of less than 15 acre-feet.

Hazard Classification

(as listed in Commonwealth of Massachusetts, 302 CMR 10.00 Dam Safety)

<u>High Hazard (Class I)</u> – Shall mean dams located where failure will likely cause loss of life and serious damage to home(s), industrial or commercial facilities, important public utilities, main highway(s) or railroad(s).

<u>Significant Hazard (Class II)</u> – Shall mean dams located where failure may cause loss of life and damage to home(s), industrial or commercial facilities, secondary highway(s) or railroad(s), or cause the interruption of the use or service of relatively important facilities.

<u>Low Hazard (Class III)</u> – Dams located where failure may cause minimal property damage to others. Loss of life is not expected.

General

<u>EAP – Emergency Action Plan</u> - Shall mean a predetermined plan of action to be taken to reduce the potential for property damage and/or loss of life in an area affected by an impending dam break.

<u>O&M Manual</u> – Operations and Maintenance Manual; Document identifying routine maintenance and operational procedures under normal and storm conditions.

Normal Pool – Shall mean the elevation of the impoundment during normal operating conditions.

<u>Acre-foot</u> – Shall mean a unit of volumetric measure that would cover one acre to a depth of one foot. It is equal to 43,560 cubic feet. One million U.S. gallons = 3.068 acre-feet

<u>Height of Dam</u> – Shall mean the vertical distance from the lowest portion of the natural ground, including any stream channel, along the downstream toe of the dam to the crest of the dam.

<u>Spillway Design Flood (SDF)</u> – Shall mean the flood used in the design of a dam and its appurtenant works particularly for sizing the spillway and outlet works, and for determining maximum temporary storage and height of dam requirements.

Condition Rating

<u>Unsafe</u> - Major structural, operational, and maintenance deficiencies exist under normal operating conditions.

<u>Poor</u> - Significant structural, operation and maintenance deficiencies are clearly recognized for normal loading conditions.

<u>Fair</u> - Significant operational and maintenance deficiencies, no structural deficiencies. Potential deficiencies exist under unusual loading conditions that may realistically occur. Can be used when uncertainties exist as to critical parameters.

<u>Satisfactory</u> - Minor operational and maintenance deficiencies. Infrequent hydrologic events would probably result in deficiencies.

<u>Good</u> - No existing or potential deficiencies recognized. Safe performance is expected under all loading including SDF.

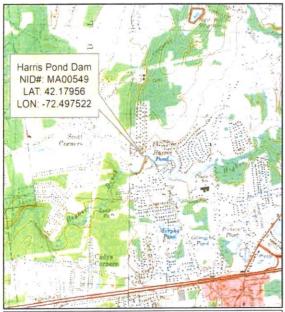

PREAMBLE

This Emergency Action Plan was prepared for the Town of Ludlow for Harris Pond Dam in accordance with the Commonwealth of Massachusetts General Laws, M.G.L. 253, Section 44, Chapter 302 CMR 10.00, "Dam Safety, dated February 10, 2017" to establish a basic plan of action if conditions at the dam indicate the potential for dam failure or if any individual observes and reports that a dangerous condition is developing at the dam. The development of this EAP has been primarily based on the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) "Federal Guidelines for Dam Safety: Emergency Action Planning for Dam Owners," dated October 1998, the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) "Emergency Action Plan Guidelines," dated November 1998, 2006 NRCS recommendations for developing EAPs, and other publicly available EAP templates from state dam safety, programs.

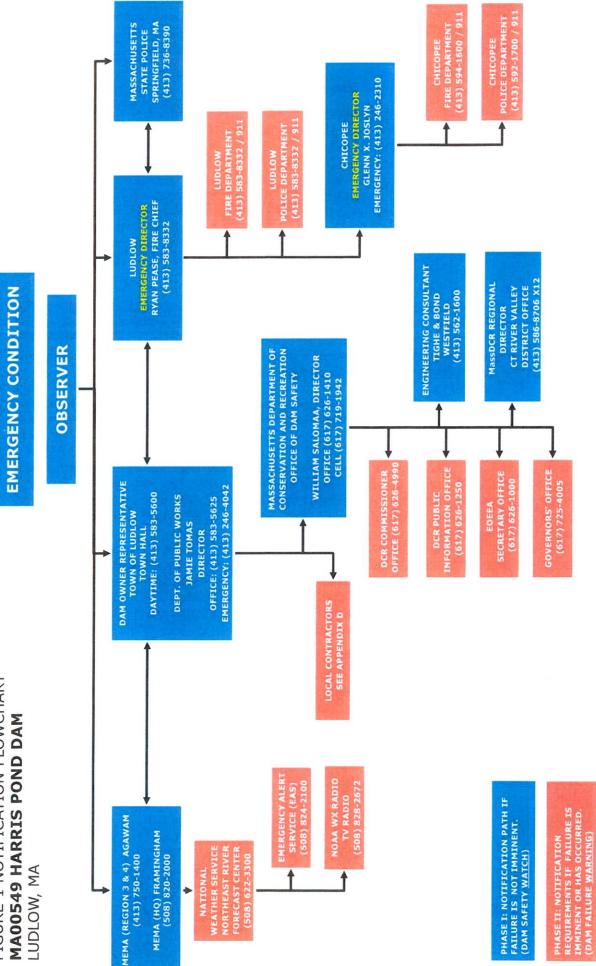
The purpose of this plan is to define responsibilities and provide procedures for identifying unusual and unlikely conditions, which may endanger Harris Pond Dam and infrastructure downstream of the dam, in time to take mitigating action and to notify the appropriate emergency management officials of possible, impending, or actual failure of the dam in order to minimize property damage and loss of life.

This Emergency Action Plan should not be viewed as a substitute for implementing standard dam maintenance, inspections, and repairs in accordance with good dam operations.

It is important to note that the condition of the dam depends on numerous and constantly changing internal conditions and is evolutionary in nature. It would be incorrect to assume that the condition of the dam will remain the same over time. Only through continued care and inspection can there be any chance of detecting unsafe conditions before they result in an emergency condition.

The EAP is housed in a three-ring binder to easily facilitate updates to the plan. The EAP should be updated and exercised annually to ensure that the information is current. Most importantly, the names and telephone numbers of emergency response personnel listed in the Notification Flowchart shall be updated periodically. The general layout of an emergency response is as follows:





1.0 NOTIFICATION PROCEDURES

1.1 Notification Flowchart

The Notification Flowchart indicates the chain of communication to be followed in the event of an Emergency. The Notification Flowchart indicates a Phase I and Phase II type of notification to be implemented depending on the emergency classification level (Dam Safety Watch or Dam Failure Warning) as determined necessary based upon the judgment of the personnel monitoring the emergency condition at the dam (see Section 4 for additional descriptions).

- <u>Dam Safety Watch:</u> "Potential failure is developing": This is a situation where a failure may eventually occur if left unattended. This situation will require a Phase I response with continuous monitoring of the situation.
- <u>Dam Failure Warning:</u> "Failure is Imminent or has occurred": This is a situation where a failure either has occurred, is occurring, or is just about to occur. This situation will require Phase I and II responses that will proceed with evacuation procedures.

During the highest emergency level (Dam Failure Warning), procedures are to evacuate the downstream residents using a combination of the telephone, augmented by police cruising the area broadcasting the evacuation message and going door to door to homes that cannot be reached by telephone. To ease this burden somewhat, the National Weather Service can be alerted at (508) 622-3302 and they will make a general broadcast about the evacuation over the airways. The National Weather Service will call the Fire Department to verify the emergency. Therefore, the Fire Department should be called before the National Weather Service is contacted. MEMA can also be contacted to activate the Emergency Alert Service.

The flowchart should be updated yearly to account for local or state personnel changes. Any new personnel should be informed and trained to perform their responsibilities under this plan.

This Notification Flowchart is contained within the opening pages of this report.

1.2 Emergency Notification Template

Once the emergency condition has been identified, and the appropriate response level has been determined, the following template can be used as a guide for notification announcements:

"This is (your name, title, affiliation).

You are being contacted per the Emergency Action Plan for Harris Pond Dam.

Please be advised: A Dam (Safety Watch or Failure Warning) condition has been identified at Harris Pond Dam.

The observation was made at (time and date).

The situation is (provide brief description).

It is recommended that you (Remain on alert; Prepare for Evacuation; Evacuate the area and move to higher ground)".

1.3 Impact Summary / Road Closures

Details related to the modelling methodology and assumptions are summarized in Section 4.1 of this report.

It is anticipated that approximately 4 residential properties may be impacted by a flood wave from a breach at Harris Pond Dam. Table 1 contains a list of potentially impacted areas.

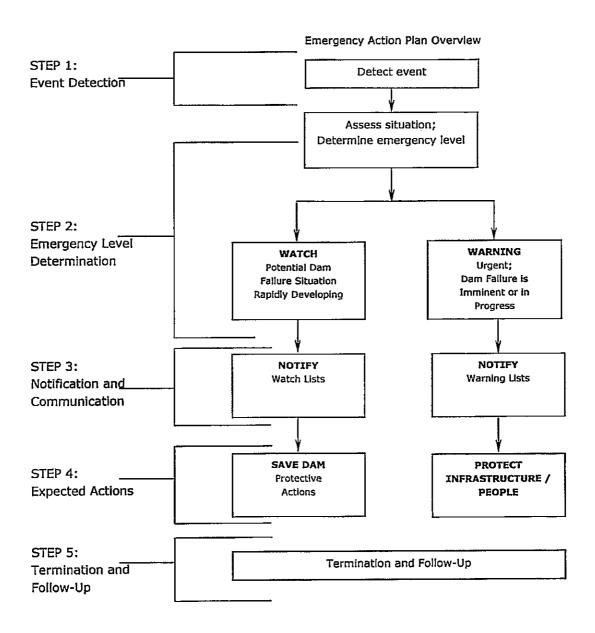

Massachusetts State Police Springfield, MA Barracks 413-736-8390	1.	Assist in securing the site, implementing evacuation, and controlling traffic flow in and out of the impacted area as <u>requested</u> by the local Police Department.

3.2 Emergency Response Coordination

During an emergency situation, **Emergency Management Director**, **Ryan Pease**, will be responsible for the proper organization and operation of the Emergency Action Plan. He will coordinate all activities with state and local authorities.

4.0 INUNDATION MAPS

4.1 Inundation Map Development

An analysis has been performed for Harris Pond Dam to estimate the downstream areas that may be inundated by flood waters in the event of a breach of this structure. The analysis was completed in October 2019 by Tighe & Bond, Inc. The dam breach flood and downstream inundated areas were estimated using DSS-WISE Lite. DSS-WISE Lite is an automated, web-based, two-dimensional dam failure flood simulation model and is a MassDCR approved software.

The potential area of inundation due to a breach of Harris Pond Dam as presented in this EAP and as shown on the "Orthophotograph of Estimated Downstream Breach Extent" map is based on the following assumptions:

- 1. The pre-breach water level in the impoundment is at the assumed maximum elevation at the dam crest. This breach elevation represents the maximum water surface elevation modeled for this dam.
- 2. The post-breach water level in the downstream reach is based on routing the dam breach flood through the dam and includes no additional flow, representing a "sunny-day" failure condition.
- 3. Downstream structures, including bridges/culverts and dams, are not included in the model and are therefore assumed to not have any impact on the downstream flow.
- 4. The horizontal resolution of the digital elevation model (DEM) used for the model was comprised of 15-foot grid cells.

For the purposes of this EAP, breach initiation is defined as the beginning of rapid uncontrolled growth of the breach, and full formation is defined as the point when significant lateral expansion has stopped. The dam breach parameters were calculated using the Federal Emergency Management Association (FEMA) P-946 "Federal Guidelines for Inundation Mapping of Flood Risks Associated with Dam Incidents and Failures" (July 2013) for a rigid dam. The time from breach initiation to full formation is 0.1 hours. The final width is 30 feet, which is the minimum breach width in DSS-WISE Lite. The peak flow through Harris Pond Dam at the time of failure is approximately 771 cubic feet per second.

This analysis provides a rough approximation of the dam breach outflow and the potentially inundated downstream areas. However, the actual magnitude of the flood wave and the resulting downstream flood levels will be dependent on numerous factors that cannot be predicted in advance. For example, the dam breach flood wave would be greater in magnitude if the water level in the impoundment is higher at the beginning of the failure. Furthermore, downstream flood levels could be increased due to conditions such as debris clogging bridge/culvert crossings and others. If these conditions exist, additional nearby properties may need to be evacuated.

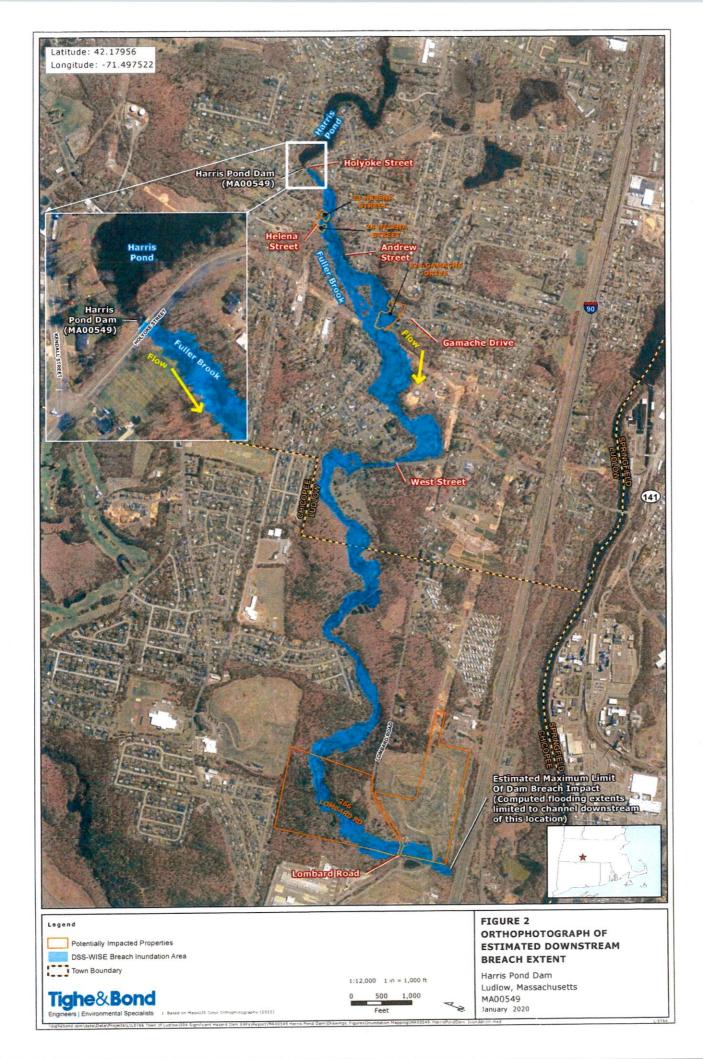
4.2 Impact Area Summary

Harris Pond Dam impounds Harris Pond located on Fuller Brook immediately north of Holyoke Street in the Town of Ludlow. Discharge from Harris Pond Dam flows southwest along Fuller Brook through the Town of Ludlow and the City of Chicopee.

Downstream of Harris Pond Dam, Fuller Brook travels beneath Holyoke Street, crosses an electrical right-of-way, and flows beneath West Street before entering the City of Chicopee. In the City of Chicopee, Fuller Brook travels through a forested area adjacent to Lombard Road, then crossing Lombard Road just upstream of Interstate 90

Model Results indicate that floodwaters from a breach of Harris Pond Dam may impact properties adjacent to Fuller Brook on Gamache Drive and Helena Street in the Town of Ludlow, and Lombard Road in the City of Chicopee. Floodwaters are expected to attenuate through forested lands in the area around the electrical right-of-way and in the area between West Street (in the Town of Ludlow) and Lombard Road (in the City of Chicopee).

It is estimated that the maximum limit of a dam breach event at Harris Pond Dam will be limited to Fuller Brook immediately upstream of Interstate 90 in the City of Chicopee. Interstate 90 is not anticipated to be impacted due to a breach of Harris Pond Dam.

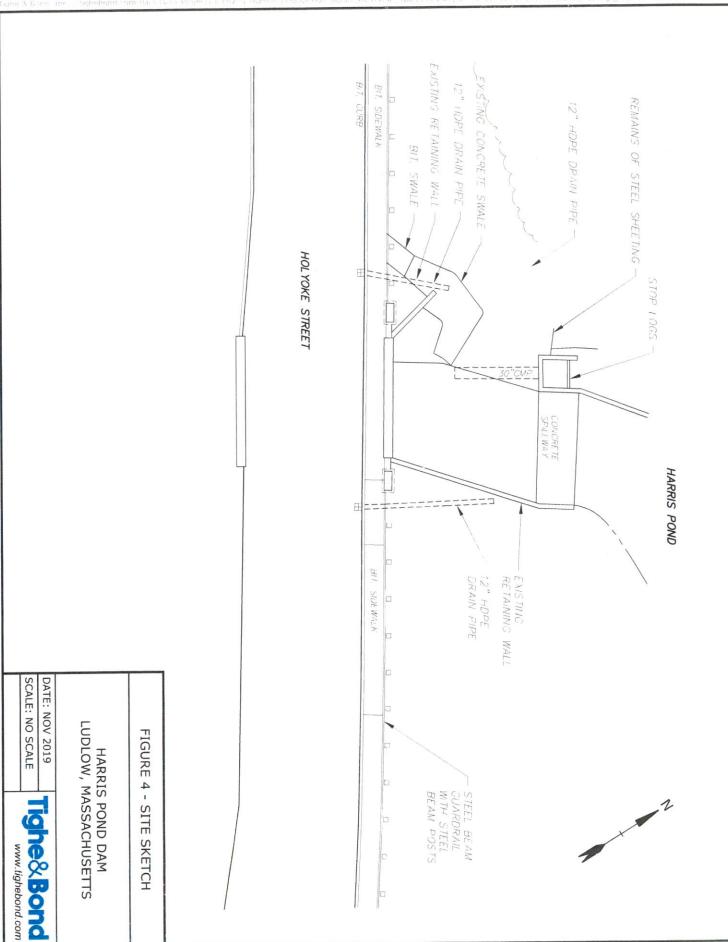

APPENDIX A PREPAREDNESS

Preparedness actions are taken to prevent an emergency situation from developing or to minimize the extent of damage caused from a developed emergency situation. The preparedness actions may be by providing response procedures to emergency situations and/or arranging for equipment, labor, and materials for use in emergency situations.

A.1 Surveillance

The most important part of the EAP is the identification of a problem at the dam. If a problem is not identified, the plan cannot be implemented. Problem identification will be much easier if knowledgeable personnel regularly monitor the dam closely.

The dam owner and dam operator must continue to monitor the dam on a regular basis. This is especially important during high rainfall events and during spring runoff conditions when large amounts of snow melting occur. Appendix B identifies some potential hazards that could lead to dam failure.

It is impossible to predict when an emergency situation will develop, therefore it is important that emergency contact information be posted at the site so that a casual observer can contact emergency personnel if they observe an unusual condition.

A.2 Access to Site

Harris Pond Dam is located northeast of Holyoke Street in Ludlow, MA. To reach the dam from the intersection of Interstate 291 and Interstate 90, travel north onto Burnett Road for 2.1 miles (Interstate 291 becomes Burnett Road). Burnett Road then becomes Holyoke Street, continue onto Holyoke Street for 0.9 miles, the dam will be on the left.

A.3 Operations and Maintenance Manual

There is no known formal operations and maintenance plan for Harris Pond Dam. The stop logs within the outlet structure have reportedly not been removed or adjusted since the 1978 rehabilitation. The dam is inspected on a semi-annual basis or after severe storm events. The spillway is cleared of debris as necessary and maintenance is generally limited to vegetation clearing.

A.4 Response during Periods of Darkness

At initiation of any Emergency Condition, the Dam Owner Representative and Emergency Management Authority should discuss options for bringing in artificial lighting in the event that the emergency continues into periods of darkness. The lighting should be used to illuminate the spillway, distressed areas of the dam, and other areas where observation or access may be required based on conditions that arise. In the event of a Failure Warning, such lighting should be brought to the site even if daylight is still available since onset of night could occur before the condition is terminated. In the event that artificial lighting is not yet available, the Dam Owner

Representative, dam observer and other on-site personnel should use flashlights and vehicle headlights to the extent possible.

A.5 Response during Evenings, Weekends, and Holidays

Municipal departments staff can be contacted during weekends and holidays using standard phone numbers and hotlines. The Dam Owner Representative and Emergency Management Authority should ensure that alternate personnel are familiar with the dam and this EAP so that appropriate responses will occur if key personnel cannot be detected.

A.6 Response during Periods of Adverse Weather

Prior to and during storms, municipal personnel will be preparing to respond to adverse situations. Since municipal staff are more likely to be responding to other conditions during these periods, the Departments of Public Works, Police, and Fire from each community will ensure that additional staff are on-call if needed. If trees and/or limbs were to obstruct direct access and crews are occupied with emergency response in other areas, personnel should be equipped with chain saws as a precautionary measure.

A.7 Training and Testing

Training and testing of the EAP is the responsibility of the dam owner. The dam owner should coordinate training and testing with local responders and emergency personnel within the municipalities impacted by a dam failure. Training seminars should be held for all operators, attendants and other personnel (i.e. police and fire) responsible for the implementation of the plan. After the initial training seminar, it is recommended that a special meeting be held to explain the plan to the downstream residents and elected officials. The meeting with downstream residents will be extremely beneficial at a time of emergency.

It is recommended that the EAP or components of the plan be tested periodically. The testing should be conducted through the use of drills and exercises. Testing should include operators, attendants, police, fire and other personnel responsible for the implementation of the plan. Downstream residents shall not be included in the test.

Below is a list of suggested training exercises, the frequencies they should be conducted, and the topics they should cover:

Seminars with Emergency Personnel

- Frequency: As needed
- Topics:
 - o New hires should be briefed on their duties during an emergency response.
 - At a minimum, a read through of the EAP and a brief assessment should be conducted.

Emergency Management Workshop

- Frequency: Annually
- Attendees: Emergency Management Directors, Fire Departments, Police Departments, Dam Owner
- Topics:
 - Authorities responsible for executing the EAP should gather to discuss the EAP.
 - Review and updating of the Notification Flowchart, Emergency Contracts, and Emergency Warning systems should be conducted at this time.
 - Parties should discuss the response effort, specifically the Notification Flowchart and the corrective actions to be taken at the dam during various scenarios.
 - o Lines of communication should be streamlined such that a developing condition at the dam can be assessed and handled.

Public Meetings

- Frequency: Every 2 Years
- Topics:
 - o The public should be educated on the EAP and how they can facilitate the rapid and safe execution of the EAP during an emergency.
 - Evacuation routes should be discussed.
 - o Emergency Warning systems (i.e. Ludlow Blackboard Connect, Chicopee Swift911 Emergency ALERT System) should be discussed and updated.
 - Preparation and situational awareness techniques during an emergency situation e.g., areas of high ground within the town, keeping a cell phone charged, supplies needed for an extended evacuation, navigation of flooded roads.

Table Top Exercise

- Frequency: Every 3-4 Years
- Topics:
 - Emergency management personnel should gather and discuss different emergency scenarios to assess plans, policies, and procedures.

Functional Exercise

- Frequency: Every 5 Years
- Topics:
 - A functional exercise is conducted to test and validate the coordination, command, and control between the EOC, EMD, and all agencies involved with carrying out the EAP.
 - This type of exercise does not include any "boots on the ground".

After each of the tests mentioned above, a "lessons learned" discussion and evaluation should be conducted. The discussions should highlight procedures that work well and those that did not; as well as inaccurate information (within the flowchart, inundation maps, resident contacts, assigned responsibilities, equipment, etc.). Results should be written down and distributed to the associated parties and any corrections and updates should be made.

The training and testing activities should be fully documented.

A.8 Updating and Posting

All aspects of the EAP should be reviewed and updated once per year in accordance with the applicable guidelines. During the review, a determination of any new developments or other changes downstream or elsewhere should be made to determine whether any revisions to the current EAP are necessary. It is imperative that all other holders of the EAP receive updates to the EAP immediately upon becoming aware of necessary changes to keep the EAP workable. This includes revisions when phone numbers and/or names change for notification flow chart personnel and downstream residents.

An up-to-date copy of the flowchart and notification list should be in prominent locations in the offices of the personnel responsible for the EAP implementation.

A copy of the complete up-to-date EAP should also be available to all operators and personnel responsible for the implementation of the EAP. At a minimum, a full copy of the EAP should be located at the following locations:

A.9 Emergency Response Coordination

During an emergency situation, the **Incident Commander** will be responsible for the proper organization and operation of the Emergency Action Plan. He/she will coordinate all activities with state and local authorities.

A.10 Contact Lists

Contact lists should be maintained for facilities, structures, and other properties that may be impacted by a flood wave. Dependent upon the nature of the inundated area, the contact lists may include residents to be evacuated due to shallow flooding, facilities requiring special considerations, and other facilities. Contact lists should also consider special needs in the impacted area such as multilingual communications.

Hard copies of the list should be kept at the EOC and within each EAP binder. At a minimum, annual reviews and updating of the contact list should be completed to keep the list current.

A.11 Alternative Systems of Communication

If there is an interruption in telephone service during an emergency condition, emergency response personnel should broadcast over their radio communications system and cellular phones as necessary. Cell phone/telephone numbers for the emergency responders should be maintained and updated in the notification flowchart on a regular basis.

A.12 Emergency Labor, Supplies and Equipment

Once an emergency condition has been identified, mobilization of the appropriate equipment is key to addressing the situation. The following lists provide partial equipment lists for the conditions described above. This list should be modified as required to address actual conditions at the time of the emergency. Additional equipment not listed below may be necessary. Actual condition and estimated response time versus the rate of deterioration of the dam may preclude the repair of the structure and necessitate full evacuation. The primary goal is to protect human life and minimize property damage.

- Emergency lights and generators for dam work or evacuation
- Construction equipment if the dam is repairable
- Loaders
- Excavators
- Gravel hauling trucks
- High wheel trucks
- Sandbags
- Shovels
- Tree removal equipment
- Barriers, barricades and personnel transportation to facilitate evacuation

The provision of labor, equipment and materials is the responsibility of the dam owner. As such, the following sections provide recommendations for

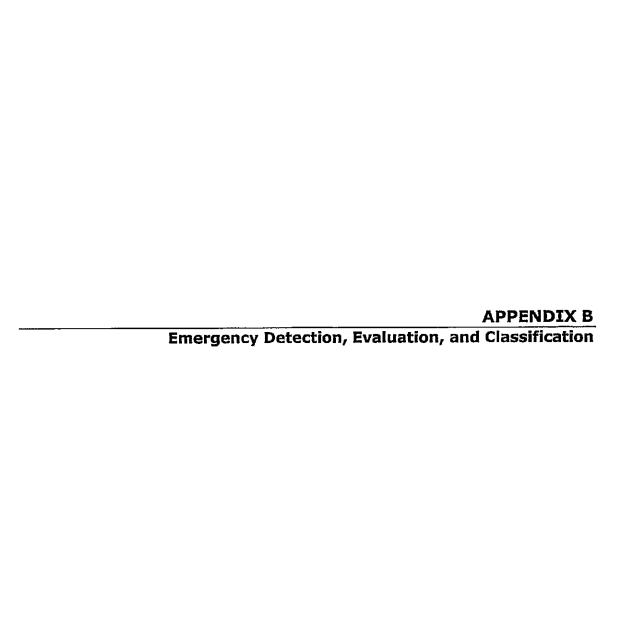
establishing relationships and agreements with local contractors, vendors, and suppliers.

A.13 Subcontractors

The dam owner should develop/maintain open-ended contracts with a number of general contractors and/or suppliers. These contracts allow the dam owner to hire equipment as needed at a set hourly rate. Materials could be purchased from any of the contractors.

A.14 Potential Borrow Areas Around the Town

Potential borrow areas should be identified that could be utilized as sources of fill material in the event of an emergency condition at the dam requiring extra material. The owners of these and any other gravel pits that may be utilized during an emergency should be contacted. Appendix D identifies materials and equipment available within the region.



APPENDIX B EMERGENCY DETECTION, EVALUATION, AND CLASSIFICATION

The detection, evaluation, and classification of a potential emergency situation are crucial in determining the level of response and notification required in order to minimize the response time.

The following emergency classification system is proposed for this site:

- <u>Dam Safety WATCH:</u> "Potential failure is developing": This is a situation where a failure may eventually occur if left unattended. This situation will require a Phase I response with continuous monitoring of the situation. This emergency classification level was formerly titled "Condition I".
- <u>Dam Failure WARNING:</u> "Failure is Imminent or has occurred": This is a situation where a failure either has occurred, is occurring, or is just about to occur. This situation will require Phase I and II responses that will proceed with evacuation procedures. This emergency classification level was formerly titled "Condition II".

Examples of the preplanned procedures and notifications that should be followed based on the various conditions observed during either storm or fair weather conditions are outlined below. These are examples and are not intended to describe all possible conditions, nor are they intended to limit the actions taken during a given event.

B.1 Dam Safety WATCH Examples

Notify: ALL PARTIES SHOWN IN BLUE ON THE NOTIFICATION FLOWCHART

- Any seismic event regardless of how slight
- Other situations which may lead to damage at the structure
 - o Evidence of vandalism
 - o Bomb threat
 - o A civil disorder near the reservoir
 - o Any aircraft accident near the reservoir
- Water level of the impoundment is at an unsafe level and is rising threatening to overtop the dam
- Dischárges resulting in significant erosion and/or scour
- Any developing erosion, settlement, or upheaval occurring on the downstream slope or at the toe of the dam that is considered to be controllable
- Any undocumented leakage through any dam structure considered to be controllable

B.2 Dam Safety WARNING Examples

Notify: ALL PARTIES LISTED ON THE NOTIFICATION FLOWCHART

- Water has overtopped or will overtop the dam
- Any uncontrollable erosion, settlement, or upheaval occurring on the downstream slope or at the toe of the dam
- Any uncontrollable leakage through any dam structure resulting in degradation to the structural integrity of the dam
- A dislocation or failure of any structure which allows for an expanding, uncontrollable discharge of water through the spillway or dam indicating a breach is occurring
- Dam is failing, is about to fail, or has failed

A Dam Safety Watch may be declared initially with gradual transition into a Dam Failure Warning or a Dam Failure Warning may be declared immediately, depending on the actual conditions.

While these actions attempt to generalize responses to the observed conditions, the judgment of the primary observer and/or knowledgeable person(s) must be utilized. While some conditions such as breaching, overtopping and severe piping can dictate an immediate evacuation; others will require the observer to determine the extent of the concern and the probability of the concern being addressed within a timely fashion.

B.3 Additional Guidance for Determining the Emergency Level 1

B.4 Potential Hazards That Can Lead to Dam Failure

The purpose of the section is to educate the user of the EAP as to some of the common causes of dam instability and possible failure. A short definition of each hazard is listed along with typical causes. This is not intended to be an exhaustive list of all failure mechanisms as each dam has a unique set of conditions which will influence the development of conditions and concerns.

1. Flow Erosion

- Washout of spillways, embankment sections.
- Causes: poor compaction of silt backfill; lack of riprap or concrete protection at interface between soil embankment and concrete structure; erosion by flow over embankment, spillway, or through outlet.

2. Embankment Leakage, Piping

- Excessive seepage resulting in internal erosion followed by formation of a "pipe" through the embankment, which once formed, causes rapid flow erosion and washout of the embankment.
- Causes: poor compaction of soil along interface with concrete structures; lack of seepage control collars around pipe; root and rodent holes; inadequate or nonexistent filters between fine and coarse soils; cracks or voids within the concrete structure.

3. Foundation Leakage, Piping

- Washout of foundation material below dam causing undermining.
- Causes: poor interface with bedrock and concrete structures; excessive seepage at dam toe carrying soil with it.

4. Sliding

- Serious movement in foundation or concrete structure, which either result in dam failure or significantly weaken the dam structure.
- Causes: Foundation material weak; excessive water pressure in structure or foundation.

5. Deformation

- Gross deformation of dam or outlet structures resulting in immediate failure or cracking of the dam, and subsequent washouts.
- Causes: excessive settlement in foundation, ice jacking (Pressure exerted by expending/contracting ice structures).

6. Blowing of Trees from Embankment

 Blowing of trees on and near the embankment would result in substantial cracks and scour of the embankment and subsequent washout of the embankments.

 Causes: heavy rain associated with gusty winds and natural aging and poor root system of the trees on and near the embankments.

7. Reduction of Crest Elevation

- Deterioration or washout of dam crest.
- Causes: poor concrete condition; heavy rain runoff.

8. <u>Dam Overtopping</u>

- Water flows over the crest of the dam causing erosion and subsequent reduced dam height with time. If overtopping continues for any length of time it may lead to a total failure of the dam.
- Causes: Heavy rain; blocked or inadequately sized spillway.

9. Cracking

- Longitudinal cracking can be due to movements and/or settlements of the dam and can allow water to infiltrate the concrete.
- Transverse cracking can be due to horizontal and/or vertical movement and can result in a flow path across the concrete structure.
- Thin cracks can be very deep and intersect the phreatic surface.

APPENDIX C TERMINATION AND RECOVERY

If the EAP has been placed into action and the event has been deemed to not be an emergency, or the threat has been mitigated, termination of the emergency response under the EAP will be the sole responsibility of the incident commander. Termination process should include, but not be limited to, the following steps:

- Notify all agencies and parties contacted during the response of the situation termination
- Issue public notification
- Complete post-situation dam inspection

Implement post-situation recovery including restoring impacted areas such that they are safe for public use and repairing or otherwise addressing damaged infrastructure.

APPENDIX D AVAILABLE MATERIALS AND EQUIPMENT

The Town of Ludlow Department of Public Works should be contacted for emergency supplies such as trucks, pumps, sandbags and generators. Additionally, a partial listing of local contractors (with contact information) and the emergency supplies they have available is provided below. If emergency repairs may be warranted, supplies and equipment should be brought to the dam, so they are available when needed.

APPENDIX F COMMON DAM SAFETY DEFINITIONS

For a comprehensive list of dam engineering terminology and definitions refer to 302 CMR10.00 Dam Safety, or other reference published by FERC, Dept. of the Interior Bureau of Reclamation, or FEMA. Please note should discrepancies between definitions exists, those definitions included within 302 CMR 10.00 govern for dams located within the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

Orientation

Upstream - Shall mean the side of the dam that borders the impoundment.

<u>Downstream</u> – Shall mean the high side of the dam, the side opposite the upstream side.

Right - Shall mean the area to the right when looking in the downstream direction.

Left - Shall mean the area to the left when looking in the downstream direction.

Dam Components

<u>Dam</u> – Shall mean any artificial barrier, including appurtenant works, which impounds or diverts water.

<u>Embankment</u> – Shall mean the fill material, usually earth or rock, placed with sloping sides, such that it forms a permanent barrier that impounds water.

<u>Crest</u> – Shall mean the top of the dam, usually provides a road or path across the dam.

<u>Abutment</u> – Shall mean that part of a valley side against which a dam is constructed. An artificial abutment is sometimes constructed as a concrete gravity section, to take the thrust of an arch dam where there is no suitable natural abutment.

<u>Appurtenant Works</u> – Shall mean structures, either in dams or separate therefrom, including but not be limited to, spillways; reservoirs and their rims; low level outlet works; and water conduits including tunnels, pipelines, or penstocks, either through the dams or their abutments.

<u>Spillway</u> – Shall mean a structure over or through which water flows are discharged. If the flow is controlled by gates or boards, it is a controlled spillway; if the fixed elevation of the spillway crest controls the level of the impoundment, it is an uncontrolled spillway.

Size Classification

(as listed in Commonwealth of Massachusetts, 302 CMR 10.00 Dam Safety)

<u>Large</u> – Structure with a height greater than 40 feet or a storage capacity greater than 1,000 acre-feet.

<u>Intermediate</u> – Structure with a height between 15 and 40 feet or a storage capacity of 50 to 1,000 acre-feet.

Small – Structure with a height between 6 and 15 feet and a storage capacity of 15 to 50 acre-feet.

<u>Non-Jurisdictional</u> – Structure less than 6 feet in height or having a storage capacity of less than 15 acre-feet.

Hazard Classification

(as listed in Commonwealth of Massachusetts, 302 CMR 10.00 Dam Safety)

<u>High Hazard (Class I)</u> – Shall mean dams located where failure will likely cause loss of life and serious damage to home(s), industrial or commercial facilities, important public utilities, main highway(s) or railroad(s).

Significant Hazard (Class II) – Shall mean dams located where failure may cause loss of life and damage to home(s), industrial or commercial facilities, secondary highway(s) or railroad(s), or cause the interruption of the use or service of relatively important facilities.

<u>Low Hazard (Class III)</u> – Dams located where failure may cause minimal property damage to others. Loss of life is not expected.

General

<u>EAP – Emergency Action Plan</u> - Shall mean a predetermined plan of action to be taken to reduce the potential for property damage and/or loss of life in an area affected by an impending dam break.

<u>O&M Manual</u> – Operations and Maintenance Manual; Document identifying routine maintenance and operational procedures under normal and storm conditions.

Normal Pool – Shall mean the elevation of the impoundment during normal operating conditions.

<u>Acre-foot</u> – Shall mean a unit of volumetric measure that would cover one acre to a depth of one foot. It is equal to 43,560 cubic feet. One million U.S. gallons = 3.068 acre-feet

<u>Height of Dam</u> – Shall mean the vertical distance from the lowest portion of the natural ground, including any stream channel, along the downstream toe of the dam to the crest of the dam.

<u>Spillway Design Flood (SDF)</u> – Shall mean the flood used in the design of a dam and its appurtenant works particularly for sizing the spillway and outlet works, and for determining maximum temporary storage and height of dam requirements.

Condition Rating

<u>Unsafe</u> - Major structural, operational, and maintenance deficiencies exist under normal operating conditions.

<u>Poor</u> - Significant structural, operation and maintenance deficiencies are clearly recognized for normal loading conditions.

<u>Fair</u> - Significant operational and maintenance deficiencies, no structural deficiencies. Potential deficiencies exist under unusual loading conditions that may realistically occur. Can be used when uncertainties exist as to critical parameters.

<u>Satisfactory</u> - Minor operational and maintenance deficiencies. Infrequent hydrologic events would probably result in deficiencies.

<u>Good</u> - No existing or potential deficiencies recognized. Safe performance is expected under all loading including SDF.

6:15 p.m. – Joint meeting with Finance Committee & School Committee – FY27 Budget.

Mr. Silva: Well good evening, everybody. So if the School Committee does have a quorum, we should open your meeting. I believe that the finance does not have a quorum.

Mr. Laing: I would like to call to order the meeting of the Ludlow School Committee. Today's date is October 21 $^{\rm st}$ 6:15 p.m. I'm sorry sir, did you say they did not have a quorum?

Mr. Silva: No. Okay so here to discuss. Who's going to start this off?

Mr. Strange: Thank you Mr. Chairman. Thank you to the School Committee for coming in. It's always good to see you guys and to the FinCom reps who are here. Just quickly, you know, we don't really have too much of an agenda but sort of the order of events will be, I'm gonns go through some projections that we have for revenues, expenditures, things like that. I'm happy to answer any questions along the way. Please feel free to interrupt me and then we'll to put together any questions along the way. Please feel free to interrupt me and then we'll to put together a level zero budget this year which is essentially any contractually obligated to put together a level zero budget this year which is essentially any contractually obligated increase from Fiscal 26. So that's what that spreadsheet is for those who are interested. Any questions on any of that stuff? So just a quick agenda. You'll see the slides we go through, we put together a few objectives and goals for Fiscal 27 and put together our revenue projections. We certainly have some economic uncertainties to navigate over the next several months. We'll talk about potential cost saving measures, ways to enhance our revenue, and then take any questions that anybody has.

Mr. Gennette: Marc, can you speak up a little bit when you're talking?

certified every year to point to, sort of our conservative budgeting practices. Okay, I'm going and conservative budgeting practices. We can just look at our annual free cash that gets preparing the town to survive annual budget challenges through creative problem solving town government for continued success. I really think discussion makers have done well minimizing the financial impact of the town's budget on residents. And lastly, position the bit later. And everybody's feeling the squeeze on their budget. So we always have in mind costs. We just had a meeting with MIIA today about our healthcare that we'll get into a little feeling the persistent inflationary pressures along with the universal squeeze in healthcare flip side of that of course we want to minimize financial impact on residents. Everybody's residents. And obviously we want to maintain those services in Fiscal 27. You know on the really hit home that you know at this point we really do offer a full gamut of services for our shutting down hours at the senior center. They don't offer trash services, right. So just to with budget issues, you know, they're talking about shutting down hours at the library, residents. Certainly, in talking to other town managers and administrators who are dealing granted, you know the services that the full compliment of services that the town offers to hall. And you know we wanted to lay that out to really hit home that I think we take for veterans service center and so much more. We offer certainly plenty of services here in town a transfer station available 4 days a week, local animal control services, a fully programmed open 6 days a week, a popular municipal golf course, automated trash and recycling service, public works, a leading senior center facility with a full slate of programs, a public library services, including a robust public safety function, local dispatch and ambulance servies, we can get it into the minutes. So, town residents enjoy a full compliment of municipal and foremost is to maintain level services and I am gonna read what's on the slides just so Mr. Strange: Yeah, yeah, sorry. All right so we put together three goals for Fiscal 27. One, first

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to try to go relatively slow through this screen and please if anybody has questions please let me know. So we really have three sources of revenue that supports our budget every year. So, we have property taxes and new growth and that's what sort of is constrained or falls under proposition two and a half. So, in looking at our Fiscal 26, levee limit and in anticipating new growth we're looking at about a \$1.9 million increase total in our property tax increases and new growth broken down by about \$1.3 million increase and that's increasing the levy the full two and a half percent. And then we looked at the last five years of new growth, and the average was about \$575,000. So the second sort of you know major source of revenue for the town is local receipts. As you'll see in Fiscal 26, we estimated 10,509000. We just increased the estimate about \$500,000. I think we could expand, we could increase that estimate a little bit. You know if we do we'll just be hedging against our free cash number in Fiscal 27. But there's a little bit of wiggle room there but we wanted to be consistent with our conservative practices in the past. And then our state aid. State aid has really been a problem spot for all communities. The MMA, the Mass Municipal Association just published a report indicating that I think the state aid when adjusted for inflation cities and towns are down 25%. So you know we assume the 1% net increase in Fiscal 27 and that amount is \$182,171. And down at the bottom here we put together our last five years of net state aid increases. So that is you know our state aide minus our assessments and our charges. Last year it was a 0.2% increase. The year before was 0.5%, the year before that was 3.8%, then 1.2%, 1.6%, for an average of 1.5%. Not sustainable. That is not a sustainable number for communities to not, certainly not thrive, but not to survive. And then by comparison you look at the last five years of inflationary increases, year to date for 2025 is 2.7%, 2.9% the year before, then 4.1, 8.0, 4.7, for an average increase of 2.7. So that state aid isn't even keeping up with inflation for us. And that's for all communities.

Mr. Mullin: Mr. Chair, quick question.

Mr. Silva: Yes, sure.

Mr. Mullin: Marc, question for the local receipts FY27 estimate of 11. So obviously that's not from 26. So my question is, what is the, how did you get to that number? Is there anything in there that you're citing as a specific example?

Mr. Strange: So we, I actually have the numbers and you'll see the increases. Sorry I didn't go over that bullet point. So we don't have Fiscal 25 yet cause we have not closed out Fiscal 25. But the last three years the increase has been 11%, 5%, 12%. So that's like, I think it was like we went up a million, we went up 500,000, we went up a million, which is why I saw there's probably room to increase that estimate and still be safe. You know, again that's why I think we've you know, we've been over \$4 million in free cash. But considering the state of what I'm gonna show you in a minute, we might have to be more aggressive on that.

Mr. Mullin: So at this point it's an assumption, Right? The increase?

Mr. Strange: Correct.

Mr. Mullin: Okay. We haven't identified a tangible, this is what. Okay. Good. Thank you.

Mr. Strange: Correct. Anybody else?

Mr. Silva: So Marc, before you go that was Chad. Do you want to just, we all know each other here. But the public is looking and say, well, who is that guy? So yeah, if you could when you speak.

Mr. Mullin: Sure. Chad Mullin. Member of the finance committee. Thank you.

Mr. Silva: Thank you

Mr. Strange: I'm on a lag tonight. So this slide is actually the one that we should really spend the most time on. If it ever comes up. We sort of laid out, you know, what we're looking at in terms of increases, cost increases, how that compares with our ability to increase revenue based upon the state aid, the local receipts and the property tax increases. 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anybody. Everybody. Any questions on that stuff? honest about it and put together you know the sort of the best summary that we could for and Massachusetts is one of them. So not great news but we wanted to be you know very came out this morning from Fortune and it talks about all these states that are in a recession certainly has created some uncertainty. And last but not least, there was this article that you know, it's only time will tell how it impacts cities and towns, time will tell but there's, it 80% decrease in immigration activity in Massachusetts. You know whether that happens a billion dollars. Immigration's a huge driver of the workforce. And Moody's is predicting an tax analysis, public tax analysis for the public. Tariffs could cost mass consumers more than taxpayers Foundation, which is a nonprofit organization that does all, you know, all kinds of trickle down to cities and towns. The tariffs and there's all this data has came from the Mass account for 26% of the Fiscal 26 state operating budget. We don't know how that's gonna increasing the cost for cities and towns like us. In terms of the state budget, federal funds are trickling down. So providers and carriers are essentially passing down the cost and again, meeting with MIIA today they sort of hammered home that the Federal Medicaid cuts million revenue increase, so, there's quite a gap there. And what's causing that? Certainly and the employee benefits, the increase is \$6.2 million. Again, we're only looking at a \$2.5 spreadsheet that we have that shows all the level zero increases, the school budget increase and retirement cost increase, leaves us about \$122,000 short. All told the you know the an aggregation of all of our anticipated revenue increase and it doesn't even cover the health anticipated increase of those two-line items is \$2.7 million. Below that is the number of, is 12% or so. The value of a 10% retirement assessment increase is \$657,000. So just the increase. On top of that our retirement assessments have been coming in between 8 and of those tools in place. So we're budgeting an 18% increase which represents over \$2 million The year before that we had negotiated a ceiling on our increase. This year we don't have any negotiating table with the IEC. So that helped us get it from essentially 15% down to 11%. Last year we got away with it. We didn't get away with it but it compelled us to go to the say hypothetically that you know the trust average is 18% we're gonna be higher than that. for example, last year the trust average was 15%. Our loss runs this year are 95%. So let's let's say the trust average they have more than 300 member entities that they aggregate. And can have a 10% margin for profit essentially. And so if you're right around 90% you will, and you know the insurance services that we're using and they like to see towns at 90% so they try not to get too far into the weeds but MIIA looks at our loss runs. So how much basically like yeah. I would you know, I think probably 18% is a good bet. The other factor here is, so between a 12 and 21% increase for towns. So I was like, 15% is probably pretty low and she's their trust average at the end of January and right now their actuaries are looking at anywhere sobering. It was a sobering meeting. So they're looking at, they, we typically put out there, insurance and we had our meeting with MIIA health benefits trust rep today and it was waters. So as I said, we had originally budgeted for an eight or 15% increase in health why it's not working. There we go. Okay, so employee benefit cost increases muddies the

Mr. Gennette: Marc, I might be asking the obvious here, but is there any advantage to maybe shopping MIIA at this point? Or can we do that at this point?

Mr. Strange: They're all the same, you know. They're all the same. I tend to, I think I sent a summary email to the Select Board and the Finance Committee and there was a summit where they had the head of the MIIA health benefits trust, the head of GIC, which is the group insurance commission, one of the Mead guys at Blue Cross Blue Shield. And they essentially said you know the system is broken. You know the way we deliver healthcare in massachusetts is broken. So cities and towns should be preparing for these types of increases until something happens. They're not quite sure what that is. GIC is gettling a \$700 million bailout from the state this year cause they're running short. It's a serious problem. It's not our fault, you know, it's nothing that we have control over. But if we go to, I mean, MIIA has been great to us. They have the deepest pool of members to their trusts. Some of the smaller trusts, like Hampshire County, they're really you know, up against it. They're facing a 38% increase over the past two years. It's just everywhere. You know, we looked at self-insuring. We literally looked at every possibility, they're just, you know, there is just no magic bullet solution to it.

Mr. Gennette: Thank you.

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Mr. Laing: I have a quick question. So am I understanding this that with the 2.5%, plus the new growth, plus the local receipts, and state aid increase does not even cover the increase to the employee benefits costs?

Mr. Strange: Correct. Those are based on assumptions to the best of our ability. But yes, the answer to your question is yes.

Mr. Laing: Thank you.

Mr. Alves: Marc, the 6.2 on the level zero.

Mr. Strange: Yes

Mr. Alves: The bottom of the first section there. That's inclusive of the 2.7?

Mr. Strange: Correct

Mr. Alves: Thank you

Mr. Strange: Any other questions? Okay. What can we do on our end to potentially look at saving costs? And you know some of these are efforts that are already in motion. Some of these are you know potential suggestions. This is a budget year where we're really gonna have to look, think outside the box, not to use that cliché, but we really need to be creative about, you know, how we're spending our money. So you know first and foremost it's attacking you know the health insurance premium splits and plan designs. We did that last year with the IAC. They were, you know operating in a spirit of compromise. They agreed to some plan design changes that saved us about \$400,000 which was terrific. Helped us, you know, nearly balance the budget. You know any change in the split any 1% change in the split is worth about \$110,000 for us. Our client splits are 78 22, which are sort of across the, it's 78 22 for all of our plans which is the most generous split in the region. There are some towns that have an 80 20 but only for certain plans. I would say the average is 70 30. Some of the lows ones, Southwick, is 50 50. I think Longmeadow has a plan that's 50 50, you know, so you know employees have enjoyed the split, these splits for a long time and the town's been happy to pay for but you know we're just not in a situation where we can sustain that type of split in the current environment. So we're meeting with the IAC on November 6th to, we will have, putting together some options for them to consider. MIIA will be there to help educate and you know we'll see where it goes. We'll do what we can. Chief Brennan was in earlier, Chief Brennan and Chief Pease are speaking with some neighbors about creating a regional dispatch where Ludlow would be the host community. Something like that is, I know we've talked about regional dispatch in the past. It's not quite as lucrative as joining an established dispatch practice. But you know, Ludlow has the physical space to host additional dispatchers and we have a state of the art radio communications system so it sort of makes sense for us. Not sure if that would help us in 27 considering we have the infrastructure in place already at May. But we're just in the beginning stages of exploring that possibility. You know I think this year we're gonna hear the word override quite a bit. We're trying to figure out a way to make it strategic. So our trash, our total trash costs are around 2.1 million, I think around 2 million, you know, so my initial thoughts at least we've not spoken to the board about this yet, is to do an override to capture that cost. And what that would do, it would eliminate the \$200 trash fee, which right now is greatly inequitable. So we just got a receive a call from a resident who's a senior who lives alone and it takes her a month to fill up her trash barrel. She just got a \$200 tax bill. Whereas some of the sort of more affluent and more capable households in town are getting that same \$200 bill. So you know the override would do a couple of things. It would increase our ability to balance the budget and it would eliminate the trash fee and make the distribution of the cost for the trash service more equitable. You know another option that we talked about as a team, we had a finance team meeting, a town finance team meeting. One idea that was floated is renegotiating the lease with the Boys and Girls Club, which you know we understand is not a popular option you know but right now the town and the Boys and Girls Club have a 10 year lease and the BGC doesn't pay the town anything for the lease of the building. We provide a full-time custodian and from time to time we also provide capital funding for them. Last but not least certainly is always a possibility of budget cuts, staffing cuts. We're looking at potentially closing the summer camp. There would be more discussion on that coming soon

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ears. That was my last slide. Happy to answer any questions. if anybody has any other ideas about how we can raise more revenue we are certainly all ask them to really take a hard look at you know where we could increase fees. And of course we recently did a fee study but we could do, we can go back to all of our departments and the businesses or the patrons but it would increase our local receipts. And last is you know trickles down to the patrons of the businesses which is certainly not great for anybody, for typically what happens is increased costs on businesses as I think we all know that typically on businesses. It would alleviate the burden on residents and it would also, you know, We've talked about splitting the tax rate this year which would obviously increase the burden know derive some more investment income, which investment income is a local receipt. more aggressive portfolio where it has 80% equity, is 20% bonds. So we're hoping to you certainly help us. And we're also moving around some other funds that are eligible into a those funds into, it's MMDT, I'm forgetting what it stands for, but that yields 4.5%. So that'll had a bunch of funds in a money market account that was bringing in I think 1.7%. We moved certainly be helpful. We recently moved some funds around into higher yield vehicles. So we them into the community. We've done that and I did that in Agawam and you know it can their you know a portion of their commercial taxes for a period of time to you know help ease to either stay or come into Ludlow and expand their businesses. Its gives them, it forgives a TIF policy which is tax increment financing. Essentially it's a tool to incentivize businesses attract more businesses at least you know make it more appealing. We can also put together repaving Stevens Street. We will be redoing the East Street Corridor which should be able to that are derived from new development and in and around the mills complex. We will be DIF in place and we will be starting our DIF funded projects. So you know we have DIF funds okay, just quickly a few you know strategies for potentially increasing revenue. We have a can work together on this and try to come up with a solution. I think that's my last slide. Yeah, just increase. So we're really, it's gonna be a challenging year for everybody. So hopefully we at about a \$3 million deficit after our level zero. And so with the level ones that deficit would with the Recreation Commission. Really everything is on the table. You know right now we're

Mr. Sanches: So you set up for a level zero, we're about 3 million, right?

Mr. Strange: Yeah

Mr. Sanches: And then each level is another million.

Mr. Strange: So the level zero what we wanted to do this year was we asked departments to put together budgets that are only contractually obligated. You know, obviously mostly salaries and CVAs and whatnot. But there are other contractual obligations. And just to see what the baseline was you know what are we obligated to and then we can see what the delta is between that and when they actually come in with the requests. So yes when the level one comes in with actual requests that number will go up.

Mr. Laing: Mr. Chairman

Mr. Silva: Yes

Mr. Laing: I'm sorry I have a question. So when you said look at the splits between the insurances with the IEC, we recently negotiated with our units so this is something totally different than that.

Mr. Strange: Yeah, no, we're still in negotiation with two of our units too. It would be. It's separate from that.

Mr. Laing: Thank you

Mr. Kelliher: Mike Kelliher Finance Committee, Marc, you had about a \$3.7 million delta between what the 6.3 is and what our increased revenue is. How does that compare to previous years level zero budget? Are we dramatically different, or?

Mr. Strange: This is the first year we've done a level zero. So typically after the level one we're 1.5 million over. That's pretty typical to be 3 million over before we even receive.

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Mr. Kelliher: Its 3 7. Lease so that make sure we get that.

Mr. Strange: Yeah. Well there are other sources of revenue in there that aren't captured cause that's just the line item budgets. But yeah, you know to be 3 million over before we even get to level ones, that's significant.

Mr. Alves: Marc, going back to the trash and the override. So the cost of trash is 2.1 you said, right?

Mr. Strange: Round. Yep.

Mr. Alves: And the fee does not cover the 2.1? right?

Mr. Strange: The fee covers about 1.35.

Mr. Alves: So that would essentially be the savings, one. Right? If we did the override, it would provide 1.5 of relief, not 2.1.

Mr. Strange: Correct. So you know there's no way to you know we don't have that many mechanisms to raise revenue, so we're gonna have to look at adding to the trash fee again this year. So instead of you know hitting residents with another hundred dollars, right, we would back out that 1.3 and then add in you know if it's 2.1. I would suggest going above 2.1 so we can you know, it's another tool to bridge the gap. You know again the carrot is you know \$3 million override how much additional would that hit the average household? I don't think it's anywhere near 200. And again, it's far more equitable. So, you know what's the revenue increase with an override anywhere between 700,000 and however high we wanted to go with the override.

Mr. Alves: Okay. Yeah, I was just trying to get towards the real value and I'm glad we did the level zero. I was the one that requested that. And I think it's good that we're facing this earlier rather than getting all those layered requests in up top and then having to have a reality check and pair things back down.

Mr. Strange: Yeah. Agreed.

Mr. Alves: Thanks for that.

Ms. Bowler: So, when do we start looking at the quote unquote amenities that our town has and say we need to start reducing those as opposed to start, instead of adding more taxes onto our residents? Because I already heard at a previous meeting that our taxes are going up. So now we want to look at going above the two and a half percent. You're now talking about if we don't do the two and a half percent we have to raise the trash fee again. I've heard multiple residents say that bills are going out late. There's being assessed fees that are not being waved because of our own town miss on sending out dates so that they're being charged. I mean, I feel like we're just charging more and more to our residents. I've heard you guys in past say we're over, we're making our seniors not be able to afford this town anymore. So when are we going to start looking at the amenities that we're offering and say maybe we can't have a golf course anymore. It's not even, maybe we can't do this you know this service anymore or maybe we cant you know this small town of Ludlow can't do this anymore instead of raising taxes, raising taxes, raising taxes. Because it gets to a point where even the young people can't afford the taxes anymore. It's not just the old people. And I guess that's my questions is when is enough, enough? And I just threw out golf because, that's. I was looking at you Bill.

Mr. Silva: Mr. Rosenblum?

Mr. Rosenblum: Oh no, no, I know. I was gonna say is that the golf is on an enterprise fund, which is self-sustaining, so, it's only on the sheet, you know and the question comes up every time at town meeting, you know, oh my God, wait it's 3 million. What's it costing us? Well, it's, we put it on, it's on the budget just so that people see it. As long as it's self-sustaining because obviously it's the same thing I do down in Hartford. As long as it's self-sustaining then it's fine. If it goes back I know we had a couple years ago where we, they October 21, 2025

Dorrowed 30,000 and about 60,000 so there was a hundred thousand. I actually went to the Chair and asked for when we were negotiating, when we were doing the budget and we were trying to find a little extra money for the school department I think it was, I actually asked for that reimbursed back somehow and I got a no. And that was from the commission because we were trying to find ways to make money. But for that one in particular, like enterprise funds are just basically self-sustaining. The moment they start costing money out of the general fund, yeah, then it's an issue. We are, there is one thing that we're looking at, we have a meeting in a few weeks, you know, some tough decisions on some things, you know summer camp and that, there's things that go with that as to why it's being visited. So, services wise, I think you'd have to I mean, yeah, we do. We offer a lot. We do.

Ms. Bowler: But again sir, camp, you're taking away from the residents at a really low rate.

changes the burden but it doesn't change what's owed. large commercial base. We're like 18% and it shrunk. So passing that on it, all it does is it or Chicopee or Springfield because they have a large industrial base. We're getting 65 to 70 people that are showing up so we from the whole town outside of your board, finance, and town meeting. Town meeting is 90 something to that effect and say hey this is what I think, I mean, we need to get more input see their precinct member's address. Go and email you know, drop a letter in their box or website. Any person, again, we always say the six people that are watching, they can go and precinct people and ask the questions. And even the precinct members are on town service, you know, then it goes to town meeting. Town meeting also needs to go to their suggestions? You know if you get enough people that are sitting there to say to cut this one meeting is maybe we open it up to sitting at Ludlow High School again and going what are a bigger discussion really for, I mean, I don't think even, I think it's like we did with the town life. I mean, I don't know if we could find a way and maybe it is services but that's gonna be to the sushi place, next to Starbucks, so you got more traffic going on. So then its quality of and things of that nature. You know we have something apparently it's gonna be going in next Now we're talking traffic again. You know cause we're dealing with the West Street Bridge where are we gonna put things? Do we fill the pad that's next to Kentucky Fried Chicken? to a million? That's a big nut. It's you know, it also if we're growing revenue in certain areas, grow revenue in town? It's hard I think it is to grow it. I mean should we go from you know 500 in insurance. Last year was 1.5 million. These are numbers that we cant you know, could we say what are you guys doing with the money? They go well it's going to a \$2 million increase happens we all know it, they come to you guys and they come to us and they sit there and It's the municipalities are getting dumped on and it stinks. It really stinks because then what They don't help you out. That's for sure. You know, we got 0.8% last year. You get peanuts. thing is when you sit here and look at a hit that we're getting the state doesn't help us out. other services I mean you know, the nursing program. I mean what other things? The biggest to why, but, and its things that are actually, there's reasons why it would have to be, but Mr. Rosenblum: There's reasoning behind it. That, it'll be, it'll come out more in the future as

Mr. Silva: Yeah, you get no revenues by changing rate.

Mr. Rosenblum: No I know. I'm just going all different things that we're trying to alleviate the burden on the burden. And for your instance, I mean special education's going through the roof, you know, and things of that nature. It's just I don't know where you get it. I mean I really don't. If we could find, I know Mr. Mullen always likes to ask about how do we generate revenue and if we generated a million dollars in growth that's like a hundred percent jump but 500,000 isn't gonna help us that much. So I mean I think and I'll tell you straight up is that we've discussed it and I've said it out in public is that we probably get our split down to that we've discussed it and I've said it out in public is that we probably get our split down to 30. I think as you were saying the loss runs are like 99% on an HMO, which means that that's bad is that if we actually went into the HMO going to 60 40 eventually and staying at a 70 30 for a PPO, those are options, cause I think it comes down to especially for the schools 70 30 for a PPO, those are options, cause I think it comes down to especially for the schools

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and anyone in town is we don't want to displace employees. If we don't want to do that then we're gonna have something like the insurance is a big save. We go 70 30 it's about \$880,000. You go 60 40 what was it 1.8 or 1.9 million. So there's savings there. Again you've negotiated. We have to negotiate. So yeah it's, I come from a place where I'm on municipal insurance now, it's different, but in all the years that I've been working it's been regular insurance. And the plan that we have right now is I've talked to other people in other municipalities they go, that's unheard of. I think its Ware is 80 20. But I think that's a driving force right there. It's gonna affect everybody. It's not being singling out one department or anything. It's gonna be a town wide effort. And I would say that we'll probably once again and then I'll stop, once again is that we're probably not gonna be able to approve any new positions which we've done the last two years. We cut 750,000 out a couple of years ago by saying no to any increases in positions. So I mean my stance is openly is that we cant afford it. We, if we're 3 million in the hole, 3 to 3.5 million in the hole. Thank you.

Mr. Silva: Anybody else? Any?

Mr. Laing: I have a comment. So we and Dr. Tiano and his team have done a great job of being very conservative in our, on the school side. We've tried not to have that word override for many years. Like we've done things at the school side to make sure that we didn't need to go to that route. Are other towns are at this point as well? This is not, we're not?

Mr. Strange: No

Mr. Laing: This is?

Mr. Strange: You, Mr. Chairman. You will see a lot of overrides this year. You know, Belchertown is in Hampshire Trust community. They got hit with a big health insurance. So, they did an override last year. South Hadley is doing one in November; they did one last year. They're doing another one. Hadley had one. It got voted down. You know, you're gonna see a lot of overrides this year. A lot. You just, with prop two and a half, right? Unless you have a large commercial base, you're stuck. Right. So if you have a \$2 million increase in your health insurance premiums you can't keep up with it. Like the numbers, you just can't do it without an override, or you know, cutting literally whole departments. Going back to Sarah's question about services. You know, do we close the senior center? Do we close the library, right? What do you, we don't have and I'm sure Dr. Tiano would echo these sentiments, we have skeleton staff on in town hall in our town. So if we have one person out we're you know it's a real burden on that department. Where there's nobody to back up. People you know go on vacation, they get sick, whatever it is, they go out and get another job. It takes us a long time to right that ship. You know it's not like we have a bench, there's no place else to cut unless we're literally cutting departments.

Mr. Rosenblum: Mr. Chair, if I can add one thing to that cause you had made a comment about the bills going out on time. You're absolutely right. So in order to get that needs to be remedied so that the town has more trust in what's going on in town hall. So, I know that there's been texts and calls going back and forth from us into this building saying we need to fix this. Because the first thing that's important to me at least, is being able to service 20 to 21,000 people, 7,300 homes in this town to when you come in here it's interpersonal skills. It's being able to sit here and people are coming in and you're not complaining about \$15, you're complaining about \$3,500, \$6,000. Is that when those people come into this building is that we have an answer and we can fix it. You know, obviously the other thing too is getting the online system going to where it's working. The frustration's with us as well. So it doesn't fall on deaf ears because he's usually getting a text or a phone call at least from, I know he's done it from a couple of us today. So those are things if those things are more seamless it instills trust in the citizens of the town to be able to understand and maybe cope with a little bit of hurt a little bit more if we're taking care of it in the proper manner. And we're sympathetic to everybody.

Ms. Bowler: And again, I think that's where people are gonna come from is like if we're looking for more money, we need to make sure we're using it properly. And we're dealing with it properly because it's you know.

Mr. Strange: Absolutely.

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Mr. Rosenblum: We use it properly most probably all the time. But the thing is it's receiving, is collecting it and receiving it or asking for it and receiving it. It's just that aspect. I think once that cleans up you know, you clean up a few things, what it does is it the citizens will have a little more trust in what's going on.

Mr. Strange: You at least want to know that if you're paying higher taxes, that you're getting services, reliable services for that. Absolutely.

Mr. Laing: I'm sorry, I got another question. So when you said the increase would be less than \$200 per household, but that would cover the fee. Can you explain that for me, Marc? Like, so it wouldn't even be a 200, \$200 increase to the?

Mr. Strange: Yep. It would be baked into your tax rate.

Mr. Laing: So someone's family situation would not go up more than the \$200 but we'd be alleviating their trash fee.

Mr. Strange: Right. So you know again if you have someone living in a house that valued at \$185,000 their increase is gonna be baked into what that rate. Right. So that person's gonna be getting their automated trash services without paying a fee. And you know the family that lives in the \$900,000 house is going to be paying you know a proportional amount through their taxes. Right. Also not paying a fee. Right. But there's an equity to putting it in the tax their taxes. Right. Also not paying a fee. Right. But there's an equity to putting it in the tax their taxes. Right. Also not paying a fee. Right had believe that we're having now. And people, not had a gentleman in earlier who has you know spoke out against the fee.

Mr. Silva: The other thing is when you do that and put in a tax rate, right now the trash fee is being, which I had a problem with as we all know, I've always spoke against it because residents are paying that trash fee. Now commercial, yes, they don't use the trash, but they're not paying anything. So you put this into the tax rate now commercial properties are paying anything. So you put this into the tax rate now commercial properties are paying the same rate. So they're actually paying for that service, for the trash. Even though they use their own trash because they don't collect, but it actually moves that over a little bit to them. That's a little bit of a help.

Mr. Strange: That's a good point.

Mr. Gennette: And the ancillary cost to that too because we're not chasing billing. There's not unpaid bills. There's not you know somebody wasting their time, you know doing all of that legwork.

Mr. Laing: Just a scary word. That's it. Trying to avoid that.

Mr. Strange: Well that's why the more you say it the less scarier it gets.

Mr. Rosenblum: We've said it for how many years is I think it's come up twice since the early two thousands. It's been, we know the town would sit, has shot it down and if it was just business as usual when we were going for an override it would get shot down easily. But I think that understanding where we're at and that. Yeah, do we hold some blame? Obviously. Every municipality does. But do we, but can we, \$2 million dollars? I mean last year was about 1.5, this year you know it's just it hits hard because when we found that out because I had asked can we negotiate again for the average wise hit we did before because I think South Hadley got hit with 20 and above. So, I don't think this time we can negotiate that one cause were getting hit with 20 and above. So, I don't think this time we can negotiate the average, we won't see the 20 or 21%.

Mr. Gennette: So, Mr. Chairman, look I mean the whole trash fee is based on us going on a two and a half override. I don't even think we should be talking about a two and a half override until it's an absolutely necessary conversation. Until the Town Administrator has met with the insurance to figure out what the splits are and those kinds of things and we see what kind of numbers are coming in from that, this override conversation is for naught cause we don't even know what the ramifications are of that. As far as cutting services and stuff, our services are heavily used by everybody. So what's important to one group is not our services are heavily used by everybody. So what's important to one group is not

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important to another group and the other way around. So who are you gonna tell is not important? That's the problem with cutting the services. I agree with you that we're backed up against the wall, but who decides what services we don't have and what are we not giving the community in a certain area? You know, Marc, you had said that renegotiating the lease for the Boys and Girls Club. My question with that would be is it uncommon for us to have a free Boys and Girls Club?

Mr. Strange: I would say so, yeah.

Mr. Gennette: So what are other towns paying their Boys and or getting for a lease contract?

Mr. Strange: I mean we could you know look at that. I think to get full value going from the Boys and Girls Club not paying anything to getting full value I don't think that's, I think....

Mr. Gennette: Well, I'm not trying to be unfair to the Boys and Girls Club. All I'm saying is if the town is not getting what the going rate is for a lease for a Boys and Girls Club, then it's not fair to us either. So, we can make up those kinds of rooms too. That kind of room too. The other thing was is you can't have attracting new businesses in a diff district and turn around and talk about a split tax rate. We don't have the business size to do a split tax rate. We're gonna drive our small businesses right out. They're done. It's just, it's almost an impossibility. If you did a split tax rate, it's no different than the trash. It's just a lever that you're gonna turn to just get more and more and more and more money. And its just a greedy, greedy little thing that people are just gonna keep gouging the business community to the point that it's not doing anything. So it's the same thing with the trash fee. We're just gonna keep turning up the fee, turning up the fee. So that's a problem too. Although I would love to get rid of the trash fee, but and if we ever talk or decide to go over two and a half that's when the trash fee needs to disappear. I'm not for increasing but until we get some better information about what's going on with MIIA and what we can do as far as the a, what is it AIE? What is it? IAC. Until we do that this is all for nothing. Because that's where it's all, it's all in employee benefits. That's where we're getting hit year over year over year. And the school has cut. I know, I recognized the hard work the school's done over the past three years. I mean we used to come in fighting you know, over money and things like that. And you guys have really I mean you guys have tightened it right down and you know I don't know how we ask you guys to tighten up even more. You know, DPW took zero last year. There was no increase to the DPW last year. So you know I think we have to start at the beginning. That is with the insurance splits.

Mr. Silva: Just wanna say that one other way to get revenue is certainly bringing businesses in. As we know, Millside Drive just got accepted and the lots from what I'm hearing are all sold. And hopefully there's businesses coming in to generate some revenues. But quite honestly Ludlow doesn't have enough industrial, enough commercial places. We're all residential. So we should be looking at it, at places or spots where you, we could actually rezone it and if you rezone it there's a lot of businesses looking out there for that kind of property. We just don't have it. It's and I'm in the real estate business and I have people all the time asking do you have a place I can put this and there just isn't any. So if we could find the spots that we could maybe even put an industrial park or something that would increase revenues. But that's the only way that I see that we can increase revenues really. Now if anybody knows has the number to Amazon and put their big warehouse here. And then the caveat is.

Ms. Bowler: There's a big lot behind here.

Mr. Silva: And then the caveat is that you try to get these businesses and you have a certain business come in and neighbors come in and complain. They don't want em in their backyard. Well, we can have both. We just cant.

Ms. Bowler: Not gonna make everybody happy. We've learned that a long time ago.

Mr. Gennette: So on to the school stuff?

Mr. Silva: Do we really want to?

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Same thing for athletic fees and so forth. Mr. Gennette? another example is Pre-K as we have our gens pops come in and they pay for the services. education tuition. We have school choice for students who choose to come to Ludlow. And from out of district tuitions. Circuit breaker is a reimbursement four out of district special operating budget. On the right you have our revolving funds, circuit breaker is an example supplemental funds. These are not an additional nice to have. These are baked into our Some of our revenue was frozen earlier this year before being released. And these are not saying, there's uncertainty at the federal level in terms of revenues that would come in. several other titles as Mr. Strange. These are just some examples there. As Mr. Strange was entitlement grants from IDEA, that's special education to Title One, Title 2A, and there's alternative funding. And on one side of the ledger, you have grants. You know this is our you just the actuals for you folks, just to refresh you. Our operating budget also has few years. That goes hand in hand with you know the town's appropriations. And I share with know the Chapter 70 aid for a town like Ludlow has increased insignificantly over the past combination of the town share as well as Chapter 70 aid. And as Mr. Strange was saying you operating budget it's composed of two parts. First is the general fund and that's the before. But just as a reminder to the general public, what makes up a school budget. Our our families, you know this is what we have as our compass. You folks have seen these slides our core values as we make decisions, you know, regarding the needs of our students and have all the information now. I share this with you, you know, this is our vision, our mission, you. As we were just discussing, it's October. I mean a budget is projections and we don't but just I appreciated how succinct and to the point and forward looking it was. So, thank tonight. Mr. Strange, I appreciate the presentation. And I have some numbers to that in a slide or two. We were fortunate Our out of school, out of district tuition and this is the most variable number that you'll have provide transportation for student's going to St. John's, you know, within our school district. athletics, and so forth. This is also for homeless students in the custody of DCF, this is also for for out-of-school, out of district students who we have to transport to their out of district The other larger ones, transportation. And this is not just the big yellow buses. This is also obviously and this is for FY 26. Almost 74% of our budget is salaries as you would anticipate. folks know that number there. This is a slide we like to share. We're a service department from the town as well as the alternate funding. Our real operating cost is 42,486,000 and you appropriation from the town, you know again, combination of Chapter 70 aid and revenue Dr. Tiano: So, in terms of that for FY 26 our current fiscal budget, the general fund

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students that have recently moved into the district needing support we've actually had to contract out because we can't find folks for those positions. And that's an increase beyond above what a salaried employee would be. Our transportation as I mentioned, that's our regular ed, our special education, our vocational, homeless, DCF. What's known is that we don't know what that number is for next year at this time, it's October. What we do know is that was an 8.36% increase for last year. And we're not done making all of our projections for FY 27. Our out of district tuition you know when we talk about this conversation typically focuses around special education but this is also our vocational LPVEC as well as other vocational schools. We do know what's in the known column. There's a 3.04% increase for FY 27 for private out of district schools that our students attend. That is set by OSD, the Operation Service Division at the state. Similar to the insurance back in 2024, the average increase for years was 1 to 2%, 3%. Surprised every school district in the Commonwealth with a 14% increase that we had to work our way around that fortunately we were able to do. What's known to us right now is the number of current students who require a placement beyond the walls of Ludlow Public Schools. What we do know since the summer we have approximately 640,000 of unanticipated costs. These are students with significant needs who have moved into our district. And I put in parentheses there, this is a combination of an out of district placement or costs that are in district. As I've shared with the committee members many times, you know, this is an unknown for us. It, you know, last year it kind of broke even for us. This year, right now it's 640,000 beyond what we have budgeted. Now we budget contingencies for that because we know that this could happen. What the unknown is, is the number of students needing out of district placement or services and the number of vocational students not only going to LPVEC, but if someone were to go to Smith Voc, for example, a pathfinder, that's an additional cost to use beyond what we pay for LPVEC. In terms of our funding for the last three years for the general fund has been a 3.3 increase and that has been good. And we're appreciative. Over the past two years our grants have decreased by 12.5%. And so when we put together the FY 26 budget, we were conservative in those numbers. Truly as we're budgeting for next year where the title grants are gonna land and again that's about 4 million dollars of our budget. There's a lot of uncertainty you know at the federal level and superintendents' organization, the school committee organization, business management association. You know we have people at the State House who are getting information in real time and disseminating it to us. But again, there's a sort of fickleness if you would at the federal level and moves taken in the Department of Education for example. So, this is where we're at. We've started our budgeting process again projections, our projections, and this is where we are at right now. We want to keep it tight, short, simple and would be happy to take any questions.

Mr. Gennette: Mr. Chairman?

Mr. Gennette: So I see that your alternate funding here, thank you for that 4.4 on this other slide. But this still doesn't break out what the grants are versus your circuit breaker, your school and I know your, a lot of your budget's not done or whatever, when we go through the season or anything like that, I would be really interested to see what those breakouts are.

Dr. Tiano: Sure. Those are currently on our website and if you have specific questions or any member here, if you want to email me directly or funnel them through the Town Administrator. We're very responsive.

Mr. Manfredi: We don't have a lot of details. That one I do. 4.4, 1.3 of that was circuit breaker.

Mr. Gennette: That was circuit breaker?

Mr. Manfredi: Yeah. 1.3 million is circuit breaker. 1.7 are the entitlement grants. And so those are the big drivers. And then the 12.5% drop in the entitlement grants from two years ago to now the grants that we get every year. State.

Mr. Gennette: I remember seeing this same graph last year and I didn't ask what those numbers were then. So I wanted to make sure I asked this time because if we saw what they were last year, we saw what they were this year, it's easier for us to quantify the hit that

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you're taking too. You know to your funding. So it just makes it a lot easier to have the

Dr. Tiano: So, again we provide anything that you would need ... Mr. Gennette.

Mr. Gennette: Thank you

This is something back in 1993 that was the Ed Reform Act from Massachusetts that really took a good solid look at how schools are funded and for equity purposes so that a student could if a student lived in Brockton or Ludlow, that they would have a chance to have the same educational experience. There are flaws in every funding formula. And you know Mr. Strange and I have talked about that in terms of towns and where Ludlow fits is you know we're not poor enough to get a lot of money and we're not and where Ludlow fits is you know we're not poor enough to get a lot of money and we're not the nough. So, we're a long way away from those changes but they're coming together to do through. So, we're a long way away from those changes but they're coming together to do that.

Mr. Alves: Okay. So, they're the change they made was to approve a commission to study it.

Dr. Tiano: Right.

Mr. Alves: Got it. Thank you. Numbers wise, so, well we're not on that slide anymore. That's okay. On the last slide, we have known expenses 3% increase in salaries, right?

Dr. Tiano: Yes

Mr. Alves: And if I go to the pie chart salaries encompass 73.5% of the budget.

Dr. Tiano: That is correct.

Mr. Alves: Firstly, is that inclusive of benefits in that salary factor?

Dr. Tiano: No. The benefits are not in our operating budget.

Mr. Alves: Okay. So 3%, excuse me, 73.5% of 3% is 2.2%. Sounds confusing. Are you with

Dr. Tiano: Almost

Mr. Alves: If I look at the budget sheet, right, the level zero, we currently have it plugged at two and a half percent. So in salaries alone, after we applied that increase we'd only have three tenths of a percent to play with.

Dr. Tiano: I trust your math.

Mr. Alves: You wanna check me on it? You follow me? I'm just trying to piece together in my head cause I'm not in this every day. Right.

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Mr. Manfredi: So a 3% increase in that salary would be roughly 840,000.

Mr. Alves: Right, that's what I had. So my numbers here and that makes sense. I had about 114,000 left of wiggle room after that's applied. I think that ties to the 951. Did you say 840 or eight?

Mr. Manfredi: It's a very rough calculation. 840,000.

Mr. Alves: No, we're within 3000. We're good. Okay. I'm tracking. Thank you.

Mr. Manfredi: You're welcome.

Mr. Silva: Anyone? Anything else? We certainly have a lot of work to do and study.

Dr. Tiano: Agreed.

Mr. Sanches: Good to start early.

Ms. Codding: A lot of variables

Mr. Silva: It's yeah, it's very nice that we're starting early and give us some time rather than all of a sudden crunch time and you have to do, to make decisions that are not very favorable. But as usual I have no doubt that we'll get there. I've been doing this a long time and in different ways and we have to get there one way or another obviously. So we will get there whichever way we'll be and just keep Marc abreast of any changes anything that comes in.

Dr. Tiano: Absolutely. Will do.

Mr. Rosenblum: Does finance have any?

Mr. Silva: Not yet.

Mr. Rosenblum: No. I know, I know. I'm just yeah.

Mr. Sanches: Tony Sanches finance committee. So yeah we appreciate the early alignment, transparency, preview of the fiscal challenges and town wide pressures. But yeah, getting it started early, definitely beneficial for a productive budget season, so thank you.

Mr. Silva: Yeah, and just one more thing, I think we, like Mr. Gennette said, I think the override issue should stay moot for now because as you all know, this community, I've been in this community forever. I don't believe there's ever been one, an override. And various communities have, had two, three overrides already. And this community for some reason just, so we can't bank on that. I really don't think it will, we'll get it through but the way we're looking at it possibly if they get their trash bill maybe they'll come to the table. But I wouldn't look at it in this community. I just wouldn't.

Mr. Gennette: Well, Mr. Chairman, I don't want to you know step over your comment or anything like that but we're really doing the community a disservice if we don't try to stay under two and a half. And that's really kind of the goal. Thank you.

Mr. Gennette: Yes, Mr. Chairman, The Capital Improvement Planning Committee will be convening soon. The request from departments deadline is, Marc, what November 11th?

Mr. Strange: November 14th.

Mr. Gennette: Movember 14th. So we're just starting to get geared up and get ready for those. And hopefully we can make short work of that and make our requests to the Board of Selectmen so that we can get those ready for the spring. That's all I have as far as board updates go.

CLOSING COMMENTS

Mr. Silva: So any closing comments?

Mr. Gennette: Mr. Chairman, I would like to follow up on Brian Leonard who was in here for his opening comments. I would've liked to have had a conversation with him. I couldn't agree with him more about the trash bill. I hate the trash bill. I can't stand it. Again, like I said in the meeting with the school department and fin com, it's just a lever to just keep turning it up. It was the worst thing that we ever did. I've been preaching that since I came on the Select was the worst thing that we ever did. I've been preaching that since I came on the Select board. The problem with it now that it's already established is getting rid of it. It would take

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a two and a half override to actually get it there. And it, we're, shouldn't be in the habit of two and a half override. So we're put in a pickle because of it. And as far as the DPW saying that we wanted 300, that's a complete, I don't know what they were telling you. This board didn't want to go up at all. Never mind go to 300. So we've been fighting this, we've been really trying to figure it out. I mean you were getting a bill before and it was gonna go up and you were not gonna have automated service if we didn't do the automated service. So at least you're getting something for the money that you are spending on it and it is still cheaper than a private service. I really, I heard you, I sympathize with you, and I'm glad you came in and said something. And you know, I just wanted to say as far as the CARES Coalition goes, you know every year they come in here and what an incredible organization. I have to say that they're probably the one organization that crosses all boards, all boundaries. They said something to that. It's just a homegrown, you know, entity that just, what amazing things they do down there and I'm just so happy to hear that they have so many kids participating in the High School CARES. And I just wanted to commend them on that.

Mr. Silva: Just to go before others, back to your trash thing. Just want to let people know or taxpayers know that there is a discount for seniors, residents. I know that they, it didn't go out with a bill this year. The discount for seniors.

Mr. Strange: Abatement. Yeah

Mr. Silva: The abatement did not go out.

Mr. Strange: It's online. So we put it online now. So it's online for people. If you go, if you are so inclined to go online, it is on the website.

Mr. Silva: Most of them don't go online though. But you certainly can just go to the DPW and fill it out there and do it there. So just wanted them to, people to know that. Okay?

Mr. Gennette: Appreciate that very much Mr. Chairman.

Mr. Alves: It's a good segue to me cause I have some trash discussion too. And some questions. So Marc, where are we with the online?

Mr. Strange: For the trash?

Mr. Alves: And being, not being able to pay online?

Mr. Strange: So the problem was this is the first time we've used our outside vendor to distribute the trash bills. And I believe it's the first time that we've allowed residents to pay the trash bill online. The problem was every other tax bill requires a TXT file that UniPay will upload. The trash bills for some reason of course requires an XML file. So we had to reach back out to our consultant who put it all together and we're working on it. So hopefully tomorrow, I'm not quite sure what if how much progress they made today. But we're aware of why it didn't stick and hopefully it'll be up tomorrow.

Mr. Alves: So why wouldn't it be part of the process to verify that? Because I don't know if it was the trash bill but it was another bill this year, there was the same problem. And I think I had the same I don't know if I did in the meeting but we had some conversations and it was let's ingrain this in the process. Right? And let's verify the features ready before we go live. But now we have the same issue.

Mr. Strange: Totally agree with you. Totally feel your frustration. I'm meeting with Ryan tomorrow. We're creating a checklist. So we're gonna have a checklist of understanding what information we need from the various departments, the timing and getting it to Kirkwood, communicating with the public and making sure that it's online before we actually send the bill out. So and we're gonna create, I want to know what all the dates for all those bills are coming up and we're gonna put those on our calendar and make sure this doesn't happen again.

Mr. Alves: And kind of work the time backwards to build in?

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Mr. Strange: Yeah. So, you know, probably a month before the bill's gotta go out. We'll have a meeting to make sure we're on schedule.

Mr. Alves: Okay. And then on the abatement form that Mr. Silva was talking about, why did we make the decision to not include it in the envelope? Because that was happening previously.

Mr. Strange: Right. I don't have a good answer for that. We actually met with the DPW and our town account and the treasurer collector about the whole process and somehow it slipped through the cracks. We actually had the abatement forms having the abatement forms available in the treasure collector's office, at the senior center, having the abatement forms available in the treasure collector's office, at the senior center, at the DPW. The problem in my estimation was that we didn't communicate that, right. So when we didn't put the abatement form in and it's also extra. So if we put enough of another when we didn't put the abatement form in and it's also extra. So if we put enough of another should have done a robocall saying this is coming, this is where you can pick up your abatement form.

Mr. Alves: I would still think the value of putting the abatement, so I guess here's where I'm going. The value of putting the abatement form in the envelope at whatever the cost on the back end we're probably gonna save with the cumbersome work that's gonna be inflicted on the department and the public. So I don't think that was wise.

Mr. Silva: Can you just hold on for that, to go along with that Marc in back of that bill, is it blank?

Mr. Strange: Yes

Mr. Silva: I think those, the abatement form should be put in back of the bill just as excise bills.

Mr. Strange: That's a good idea.

Mr. Silva: If excise bills actually come and there's actually an abatement in the back of the bill that you can, so, if we have those that won't cost anything other than maybe the printing, I don't know. But that, right on the back of the bill, there should be the abatement cause it's loon't know a big abatement form or you know.

Mr. Gennette: It's literally one sentence with a checkmark.

Mr. Silva: Put it right on the back and that'll be over.

Mr. Alves: Or you just shrink the bill to like the first two thirds and you put it on the bottom third. So, continuing there I guess, this isn't the first time we have a trash abatement, right? Are we building a database of people that have filled it out so that we don't have too continuously?

Mr. Strange: Without gettling into the details or the weeds too much, the reason that we change this year is because every employee in town has access to all of our information. Right. That's incredibly insecure. So what we're doing is we have plans to do an audit and investigation and overhaul of all those permissions, but in the meantime, we're doing one-offs. So as we're preparing for the trash bill, we realize that the DPW personnel have a lot more permissions than they should have. So the decision was made to you know bring the collections into the treasurer collector's office. Right, cause they have the permissions. We had a back and forth. We had multiple meetings on this. Where we landed was, because it's such a complicated process, is the DPW is really gonns still be the primary, you know, department to collect, but then the information will be transferred over to the treasurer collector so they can physically go into the system and enter it. Right, because right now meet a complicated process, is the DPW is really gonns at the primary, you know, that's like the weeds, right? So that's what the town is ultimately seeing is what we're talking that's like the weeds, right? So that's what the town is ultimately seeing is what we're talking about. But it was, it's a majorly public symptom of all this other stuff we're trying to do.

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Mr. Alves: Okay. I think I just, not to go back again, I just think bottom line, we need to make sure that if we're sending out a bill, people have the capability to pay that bill. Whether it's in person, online. Yeah.

Mr. Silva: And certainly they can come in and pay it.

Mr. Alves: Sure. But people don't have those means and you know if I myself wanna pay my bill today, I couldn't do that today. Right, and I don't think that acceptable. That's it. Same thing with the abatement. We can't ask people to do things and make it difficult for them to do it. Alright. The government should be, you know, if we're sending people bills, it should be something that's almost mindless and timeless. Right? I know I need to pay this. Whats the easiest way to do it? And we should be facilitating the easiest way for the people to do that. Because again, it makes more work for the public and it makes more work for the people here in this building. And I think it would, it adds to a very tense situation in the building because now you have people coming in saying, I'm here. I'm wasting my time. I could have done this at home in 30 seconds. That's all I have on that.

Mr. Gennette: Before you move on, can I comment on that? Mr. Chairman, so real quick, you know, a lot of people coming in saying they've paid bills and everything like that. They've been met with resistance. They haven't been, it doesn't sound like they've been accommodated well. Have we made any advancement on that? So what have you don't to improve that?

Mr. Strange: Yep. Well we addressed it with personnel and we're also scheduling training sessions which have not occurred yet but we're in the process of scheduling them. And I'm also meeting with Ryan every week, Friday mornings to talk about all this stuff.

Mr. Gennette: Because I don't want to, you know, the billing going out and now if they go in late and then they get charged a fee and all of a sudden the treasurer collectors department is like well it's your fault. You know, they're gonna be like, what do you mean? I didn't get, I don't know anything about the bill.

Mr. Strange: Yeah. Well in fairness, two separate issues. The demands that went out were bills that had not been paid previously. There were some residents who did get a demand that had paid. They came in and those situations were rectified. You know, the problem with this situation is, as Anthony said, not being able to pay online and that should be rectified in the next day or two and also the abatement forms.

Mr. Gennette: What about the excise taxes and stuff that we're going after? How is that coming about? A couple of weeks ago, we were talking about excise taxes that were past due. That they were going out, trying to get revenue from that we had not collected in a very long time. I'm just wondering what the status is on that.

Mr. Strange: Like how much we've collected? I can ask.

Mr. Gennette: Yeah. I'd love to know how that's coming along.

Mr. Strange: Yep. I can ask.

Mr. Gennette: Thank you and I apologize for stepping on your closing comments.

Mr. Alves: It's fine, it's on the same topic. Yeah. On a lighter not, I went to the police and fire open house on Sunday. That was a good time. So thank you to the chiefs and the staff involved there. I let the chiefs know that, I don't think they gained a recruit in my daughter, but at least they made her day. We had a good time there. And then just everyone, you know, it's getting darker earlier. The sun's going down earlier. I guess I just said the same thing two different ways. Halloween's coming up. Just be safe driving on the roads because there's children and I guess residents in general popping out of nowhere, trying to recreate and enjoy their evenings. That's okay cause we wouldn't be You know, what we're talking about in our budget, you know, cause we sit here, we're these changes or suggestions, they have confidence in us that we're doing the right thing. probably the confidence and respect back to the point where, when they, we're making of these things is that we need to be cognizant of their frustrations and we need to gain bills online and my wife walks about three bills in the places, and that's about it. So it's one they probably would rather just come in and hand it to you. But there's us, I pay 85% of the they'll be able to do it online. Like you know, you're saying there's a lot of people, the seniors, an answer. If they don't have a, if they have a question or they're able to pay it quickly or actually trust us. So if they trust us and they see that they can come into town hall, they get abatement and all of those things, is that we need to do it right to where people in town will better at it and you know we're working through our issues with billing and you know the some people are in, is that we need to be better at that. Mr. Rosenblum: So what's the, I know it passed at town meeting stabilization fund for rec. have we, have you tossed around a number yet of what you would want to, the initial deposit into that?

Mr. Strange: It's on my list. Se we have to, I want to do a holistic review of our financial policies, including those two, the capital stabilization and the park and rec to come up with a policy for how, what, you know, what's the minimum amount that we want to see go into those funds every year.

Mr. Gennette: It should be small, so we have room. We can always add more if we have it.

Mr. Strange: Yeah

Mr. Alves: He said a floor.

Mr. Gennette: Well that's an appropriation at town meeting each year anyways, right?

But I'll tell you what, it's the first one I've gone to and I'm gonna continue to go because it's impressive to see, and God rest his soul, Mr. Tony Goncalves was a big part of this and help start this 36 years ago. And he would be right now, singing the praises of it because that night there was 12 freshmen in college cause they had committed to being in school, continuing their education, that each received a thousand dollars plus another \$5,000 from what was it the Diocese? It was a total of a \$6,000 scholarship to 12 kids for \$72,000. Prior to those scholarships, I believe it was just short of a million dollars and after that night I believe now it's over a million dollars of scholarship money given out in 36 years. And I joke about it because I went up, I said thank you to, I said hi to a lot of people and said thank you because it's in this community there's such a sense of community and that the fact is, as I said to Mr. Alves before the meeting, is that you see a lot of these people see each other seven days a week. You still walk in there,

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there's a hug, there's a handshake, there's a dance. The dancing I got to get lessons because everyone else is dancing. But what a great night. Congratulations to all the students, the recipients that received the scholarships. And there was only one because he said his Portuguese wasn't that good, but pretty much everybody in one way or another spoke a portion of their. David Costa's son did it all in Portuguese and then pushed for Sporting. But it's a testament to the community and I really enjoyed it.

Mr. Alves: I'll piggyback off that. I was at that event. I make it a point to go there every year as being a past winner of that. It wasn't \$6,000 at the time but I will highlight one of the winners was my cousin Ryan. So, congratulations to him. And he is the 10th member, we did the math, 10th member of my family that's received that award. Proud of that.

Mr. Gennette: Mr. Chairman. So, Marc, let's schedule an IT Steering Committee meeting sometime before the end of the year. I wanna make sure we get one in. So, whatever best suits your schedule let's put that on there. If you want, I can send you an email tomorrow just as a reminder. We're waiting on a Green Communities Energy Audit because I'm gonna try and convince Mr. Silva that a green community's designation is a good thing. So, it's gonna happen at some point. I'm still working on the Strategic Planning Committee, that's going well. I'm hoping to have some better support for that soon and hopefully we can move forward with it. That would be great. Marc, as far as the insurance goes, and you keep forward with it. That would be great. Mr. Strange: In terms of the industry? Yes. They're not anticipating a slowdown. Mr. Silva: And all I have as well is the Night in Portugal, which was the scholarship event, I just wanted to add one thing to that is that there's several businesses that actually as well present checks to these students. And quite a few, most of them I believe were in town businesses that were actually donated. Such as loseph Dias Foundation and you had various visitors not to mention em all, but it's unbelievable event and wonderful things that businesses do.

The Meeting of the Select Board, held on Thursday November 6, 2025, began at 6:00 p.m. in the Select Board's Conference Room.

Members Present: James Gennette, William Rosenblum, Anthony Alves (via phone), Also present: Kathy Houle, Chris Coelho, Ray Phoenix, and Joel Silva

Motion made by Mr. Gennette to open the meeting at 6:00 p.m. Mr. Alves second. All in favor. Motion passed 3-0.

First order of business: Pledge of Allegiance

VISITATION

Joint meeting with Planning Board – To interview and possibly appoint candidate to fill the current vacancy for a Member.

6:00 p.m. - Haley Rivers

Mr. Phoenix: This is a joint meeting. So, it's Planning and the Select Board all together, at least for the first part of the evening. We have several candidates that have come in for interviews to join us on our Board and fill our empty seat. We have four in the lineup. I believe we got confirmation from three. Maybe the fourth is here or will show up. We'll see as time goes by. The 6:00 we have Haley Rivers, who's in the room already. Did you wanna come on up to the table? And just by way of saying the things that shouldn't need to be said but we say them anyway, there are cameras and microphones in the room, doing the things that cameras and microphones are known to do. You are being recorded for posterity, the internet, and everybody else. That said, Mr. Vice Chair, I guess we've got home court over here. You want to start off as visitors? Or would you like me to start off?

Mr. Rosenblum: No, you guys can go ahead.

Mr. Phoenix: So, Haley, we met with you previously. You were ... enough to come in when we're looking to fill the Town Planner spot. We are now looking to fill a Planning Board Member spot. So, it's nice to see you coming back especially as one of the only people in that pool before that was a resident, so, it's nice to see you coming back. I'd like to start by just asking how familiar you think you are with the responsibilities that we have as Planning Board Members, as opposed to the responsibilities we were talking about the last time you were here.

Ms. Rivers: Yes. I'd like to start by apologizing for the state of my voice. I'm recovering from a cold, so if I need to take a second to cough or collect myself, I apologize in advance. But I still wanted to come and represent myself at the meeting today. But to answer your question, I know the Town Planner in and of itself, acts on behalf of the town and interfaces with the Board. But the Board itself has responsibilities where you are elected to the position. So, the public actually has to accept you as the candidate rather than the Town Position, which is appointed. I am also aware that as members of the Board you advise, you make recommendations, but it's not quite as you work as a collective rather than just the individual planner.

Mr. Phoenix: And are you aware of what our normal meeting schedule looks like?

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Ms. Rivers: Yeah. From what I've seen on the website it looks like you meet twice a month, Thursday's, typically at 7:00. I know that you're meeting a little bit earlier this week.

Mr. Phoenix: And that's a timeframe that does work for you?

Ms. Rivers: Yes

Mr. Phoenix: We do sometimes meet on other nights of the week or on off weeks depending on what's going on. Tonight is not normally one of our regular meeting nights. So that does happen occasionally. Are there any particular parts of the position of being a Planning Board Member that are particularly appealing to you?

Ms. Rivers: Yeah, and I actually want to state that while I am very interested in being a Planning Board Member, I also know that there's an associate position available and I know that I have about four years of experience on the corporate side of the private side and so I admittedly am a little bit more interested in the associate position. I have a lot of technical experience, but I know I'm a little bit lacking on the political side. But other than that, I really see the Planning Board position or the associate member position as just a wonderful see the Planning and position or the associate member position as just a wonderful possibility to get involved with the town. To apply my skills and give back and also just be more involved in how the town continues to develop.

Mr. Phoenix: I think I could ask some more questions or say some more things, but I'd like to see if any of the other members of either Board have anything they would like to add or ask before I keep going.

Mr. Silva: Yes. Describe a time that you had to make a difficult decision and how did you

of the reason why we were there in the first place. trying to let everybody say their piece, let everybody feel heard but then also reminding them system because that's not something we have any control over. Mr. Coelho: I've heard a lot from Ms. Rivers between her other interview and this, so I'll yield my time to maybe the people who haven't had as much experience.

Mr. Rosenblum: Thank you for having interest in the position. If selected, would you be looking to run for another consecutive term?

Ms. Rivers: Honestly at this time I am not certain. I am really interested to get involved politically and to make a difference in the town, but I also know that I am young and there are a lot of options available to me so I don't know that I would necessarily want to commit to two terms. But it is something that I would definitely be interested in for this term.

Mr. Rosenblum: And just one other question. With your background what would you recommend for development that encourages growth?

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Ms. Rivers: Interesting question. I feel like there are a lot of different things. Sorry that one's really throwing me for a loop. Honestly, I haven't been necessarily thinking as much on the economic but more on how we can better the infrastructure that we currently have. I know I've done a lot of work under the MVP program and the types of grants and projects that are available under that program. I know I've also had a lot of experience under things like Complete Streets and so while it wouldn't necessarily be like a tax incentive or anything to fully build corporate growth or industrial growth, I think that focusing on those types of programs makes the town a little bit more inhabitable. It makes people want to engage with other aspects of the town and it also allows them better transportation and pedestrian, bicycling. I feel like all of those recreational activities tend to inspire people to be more active and I think if we start to appeal to that side of things it will appeal to the younger generation and it will bring more ideas to the town, that would lead to further development.

Mr. Rosenblum: I know that's kind of like a cross-section question between planning and our end too. No, I'm good. Thank you very much.

Mr. Gennette: Mr. Chairman, Haley it's nice to see you. I just want to ask about some of your experience at Tighe and Bond. You've been there a little while now and I think you're pretty successful down there. The MVP grant you got multi awarded there, how many towns were you overseeing as far as the MVP grant went?

Ms. Rivers: Over the past 3 and a half years I've worked with probably seven or eight different towns for MVP action grants. I've also helped on the HNP front where I worked for a county in New York, so, it was 23 additional towns. So, for the grants in and of themselves I think I've been successfully awarded four different grants and that was the Town of Harwich, Kingsborough, Westfield, and Northampton.

Mr. Gennette: Excellent. I like your diversity of experience with different towns. That's pretty much all I have. I think a couple of other questions were already answered.

Mr. Phoenix: Kathy, anything? Anthony, did you want to add or ask anything?

Mr. Alves: Yeah, I have just one. Haley, thanks for your interest. Thanks for coming in. The one question I have is what would you say whether personal or professional the most applicable trait you have is that could be a positive for this Board in the town?

Ms. Rivers: Honestly, I think I'm just a very enthusiastic person and I tend to be very optimistic and I try to handle everything with as positive an attitude as I possibly can. I know that, especially in some of these political situations where tensions run really high, I think the ability to remain cool under pressure and keep in mind that anybody that comes to the town with any kind of issue or if there is any kind of drama people really are here representing themselves because they care about the Town of Ludlow and they want something better for it. And I think that attitude and a willingness to learn and try to accept all these different points of view and try to find a better path forward is what would make me a good candidate for this position where to continue involvement in Ludlow and find a way to give back.

Mr. Alves: Great. Thank you.

Mr. Phoenix: Just to close the loop on the timeline of things, for the regular Board Member spot this would be to fill the empty spot until the spring election, which if you are looking to run for that, the time to pull papers is going to be coming up real soon. And that would then be to run for the remainder of the unexpired term. Which that's what, two years that would be left on that one?

Mr. Carpenter: It would be four years. Yeah, cause it was reelected in March.

Mr. Phoenix: So, it would be appointed until the spring election and then running for that remaining four years. So that's what that would look like. So, I know you were talking about possibly not going beyond one term. When you're talking about that are you talking about not going beyond the spring or are you talking about not going beyond that full term if you were to run? Or have you even thought about it that far out?

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Ms. Rivers: I really haven't thought about it that far out. I really want to see what the dynamic becomes between us or what opportunities there are. But it would really depend on what kind of difference I can make in that role or if there are other roles that would make more sense.

Mr. Phoenix: Okay. Do you have any questions for any of us from either Board?

Ms. Rivers: Yeah. What would your expectations be of me on either a monthly or yearly

Mr. Phoenix: Generally, the expectation would be for a regular Board Member, attending the meetings. Paying attention. We like to see people that are willing to go to some of the training classes that the Community Planning Training Collaborative puts on but it's not required. But they do give some good insight into things that are going on. Some of the classes have been around for a while. Some are newer. I'm sure some of the older ones have been updated with recent changes to the law. But basically, the requirements are showing up and participating and trying to be as fair and impartial as you can and try to follow what it says in the bylaws. And sometimes that is easy and sometimes it's incredibly difficult. But that's basically the expectation, is best effort.

Ms. Rivers: Secondary question, what traits are you looking for in a candidate that would make someone stand out or that would make someone the exact type of person you want to work with on this Board?

Mr. Coelho: I think somebody with a fresh perspective would be nice.

Mr. Gennette: Mr. Chairman, I don't like these situations only because I don't think elected officials should be appointing elected officials and that's what this is. It happens in our town when there's not other Board Members. So, expectations as far as people that are already on Board's, I don't know that we really, we don't run into these situations all the time. The expectation is the community elects somebody that they want. So, much to the Chairman's expectation is the community elects somebody that they want. So, much to the Chairman's duestions about your commitment towards running again in the spring are very important because the community needs to be able to make that decision. So this is kind of unorthodox, but this is how we do it in Ludlow.

That's the reality of it. don't end up having people waiting for us to be able to get enough people here for a meeting. trying to fill that spot until we can get to the election and let the people decide then. So we haven't had enough warm bodies to show up because people are ill or whatever. So, we're of times within the last nine months where we've had to cancel meetings because we just being down a Planner, a Planning Board Member, and an associate. So, we've had a number able to keep things moving forward. As it stands, you know we're starting to recover from member for our Board, which some others don't, is to be able to try and make sure that we're have enough members present to hold those meetings. It's also why we have an associate we need to have a super majority. Things like special permits, things like that. We need to hard to have a quorum. It's difficult to have a meeting, especially when we have votes where ultimately, it's just trying to fill that gap cause what we end up with are situations where it's definitely not unique to Ludlow. It is a weird system. I definitely agree with that. But remainder of the term and I've been here since. So, it's a long-standing process that's board member when Bill got elected and then I ran again the following year to take the passes to go from Town Hall, from study hall to Town Hall and back. I went to being a full Board to the Board of Selectmen. I went from being the associate member getting hall how I got involved back in 1998 when Bill Mahoney switched from being on the Planning Mr. Phoenix: I think it's not just Ludlow, this is kind of the practice in a lot of places. It's also

Ms. Rivers: Thank you

Mr. Phoenix: So, if nobody has anything else, I think we do have somebody else we need to speak to. A few somebody's. So, thank you for coming in and I think we'll probably be looking to make a decision after we talk to everybody.

Ms. Rivers: Thank you for having me and thank you for your consideration.

Mr. Phoenix: I think we do have at least one more of our candidates has come in. Want to come forward and tell us who you are.

Mr. Ender: My name is David Ender. I'm not a forever resident of Ludlow. Moved here 20 years ago and I responded to your ad in the paper. My background. Excuse me. I don't know all these gentlemen, but I wanted to say thank you so much. Hi Josh. Thank you for your kind invitation. I appreciate that. I've been living here for 20 years. My background. You have my resume. Academically when I was at Boston University, I took numerous courses in urban planning. I'm not an expert at it but I do have some knowledge of it. And here's something tonight that really impressed me, the fact that you have to have community involvement. My background, just as a quick summary to you is after I graduated from college, briefly, I was in sales and sales management. I climbed up the ladder like you typically would here and I oversaw teams locally, regionally, nationally. Anyway, I know how to work with teams. I like Ludlow. It's a great town but any organization that wants to get somewhere has to have short term and long-term goals. You need a mission. You have to have a vision. Where you going with this. The thing that I look at all my life is that towns, cities, states, federal governments, there's a lot of bureaucracy. It's not on purpose but a lot of things don't get done because they get caught up in committee. You need to have a thing where you have to say, listen, we need to get some stuff done. Let's not try to eat an elephant. Do a piece at a time. Know where you're going with it. The people in this town are very eager for progress but if you get caught up into many committees nothing gets done. Not just here, anywhere. So, you need to decide what do we wanna accomplish. So, you set that out and then you start achieving those goals. As I said, you involve the community. It would be a part of this. When I studied in college in looking at urban planning HUD was a big thing. They were big at bringing in the community and say, what's important to you? And as they involve them in a more powerful approach to everything. And the more they had the support of the community, the more it grew. So, when I saw this ad, I said this is interesting. This is something that I have background in. I never worked in urban planning, but I know what it's about and I said Well I live here. Currently, as you know, I told you Josh in my letter, that I am a substitute teacher here. I work in four different communities. Palmer, Wilbraham, Hamden, and here and I have excellent references which I'm proud of, but I really enjoy what I do. Prior to that I owned my own company, and I trained over 100,000 adults in 25 years. Most important thing is you have to have a team approach otherwise there not gonna learn. So, in working with the Planning Committee you can't get anything done if you're not working as a team. You know that. And the important thing is that you all have to be on the same page. And it's nice to have great dreams and which you want to do but the thing is, the reality is what can you do, and I heard this earlier tonight when I walked in, well what's within the budget? You got to work within practicalities. So, you say, what can we accomplish? And when you do that, things get done. And since I'm a novice here with this group, cause I don't know exactly everything that you've been doing obviously, the more I would learn the more I could offer as far as suggestions, ideas, or what have you. Beyond that I put my candidacy in because I thought I could do something here for you. I hope to help you out.

Mr. Phoenix: Thank you for that. So we do have just to give you information, we do have both the Planning Board and the Select Board represented here this evening. Select Board partially in person and partially virtually. So we had a number of people here looking to speak to you this evening. As far as the position of a Board Member, we're currently looking to fill that spot. There's also an associate member spot that we will be looking to fill after this one's taken care of. I guess my first question would be if you're not selected for this position would you be looking to possibly fill that slot?

Mr. Ender: Let me ask you a question in direct. All I would say to all of you is that I've heard the word volunteer. I'm not a volunteer. I applied for as a per diem or as an associate or what have you. That's my only piece there. Beyond that I'd be.

Mr. Phoenix: So, the regular Board Members spots we do get a yearly stipend that's broken down into monthly payments. The associate member is a non-compensated position. So, from what I'm hearing is that then mean you would not be interested in that position?

Mr. Ender: That is correct.

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Mr. Phoenix: Okay. Also, we are currently looking to fill the spot until the spring election and then that would be going on the ballot so you would need to pull papers and run if you wanted to continue past that. Is that something you were already aware of? Is that something you were planning to do?

Mr. Ender: If you took me on until that time, I would be more than welcome to go run for office, that's not a problem. I've already run a couple of campaigns in this town how to run a my people that I ran for. One. I won't get into it. In either case, I do know how to run a campaign. But the most important thing is the reason that I'm here is that I like to contribute to do something for Ludlow. I like this town.

Mr. Phoenix: Anybody else want to add or ask anything?

Mr. Gennette: Mr. Chairman, Mr. Ender, thank you for coming in. I appreciate your ability, not your ability but your eagerness to wanna be a part of what's going on here. Do you have any, and I kinda briefed your resume as you were kinda talking there, do you have any grant writing experience?

Mr. Ender: Yeah

Mr. Gennette: You do. Are you familiar with terms like the Municipal Vulnerability Program?

Mr. Ender: Do you know who the Commonwealth Corporation is?

Mr. Gennette: No

Mr. Ender: There a big grant offering organization in Massachusetts. I've written numerous grants for them, and I can give you information on that if you want.

Mr. Gennette: Perfect. Excellent. So, did you have an average number of towns that you've worked with before on stuff like that?

Mr. Ender: Not towns. What I did was I wrote grants for financial institutions and I won them. These grants were in excess of \$100,000 each.

Mr. Gennette: Perfect. Excellent. That's my question. Thank you.

Mr. Ender: And I have won them.

Mr. Gennette: I'm not saying that that's what we're gonna do here, it's just, if information is put in front of you that is going to get forth that you could probably offer insight as a Board Member to say, you might not get that if you push this.

Mr. Ender: Right. I know how to write the grants. I'm familiar with what goes on behind the grant writing.

Mr. Gennette: I apologize Mr. Chairman, I don't mean to speak on your behalf on anything like that, the Board oversees the Town Planner. So, he's actually responsible for writing that stuff. So, if you get into day-to-day stuff then you're micromanaging and it's a bad situation. Are you aware of that as far as an Elected Position goes?

Mr. Ender: Well, I never held an elected position so I can't speak directly to that. But I have as a business owner written grants and I've had great success doing that. But if you look up Commonwealth Corporation in the State of Massachusetts, they have a lot of grants that they offer.

Mr. Gennette: I will. So, basically what I'm asking, I don't mean to be upfront, but do you understand the role of a person on a Board vs. being the president, owner of a company, vs. being a grant writer? If you had a company, then you had a Board?

Mr. Ender: No, I didn't. I'm an independent entrepreneur.

Mr. Gennette: So, do you understand the role of a Board Member?

Mr. Ender: Yes, I do.

Mr. Phoenix: Did you have anything that you wanted to ask of any of us while you're here?

Mr. Ender: Well, let me ask you a question in going forward now, Josh, I know you're new, am I correct?

Mr. Carpenter: Mmhm

Mr. Ender: Going forward as I said is important that you have a vision for what you wanna accomplish. Next 5 years. 10 years. And I heard this earlier, 20 years. What do we want to accomplish here? And how does that mesh with what the residents of Ludlow want for direction for them? This is their town. The question is with that vision, now you have to have a mission statement, what's gonna happen daily and then going forward? What are you gonna accomplish annually? Everything can die in committee, true? Unless you have a commitment to making incremental accomplishments. My major in college was Political Science. I know a lot about state, local, city, and federal politics. It is bogged down in bureaucracy. You know it's happening now in Washington. Get nothing done. That is not the purpose of government. It's to serve the people. question is, for the Town of Ludlow what do you see of where you want this town to go? I've looked at your videos of the history of this town going way back when. It's had an interesting history, but the question is you need a 21st century and 22nd century vision of what you want this town to be going down. The young people today are not like me. Or you guys, you're not that old. I'm 72 years old. I teach young people. They're totally different than we are. You've had kids, you know. My point is where do you wanna go with your planning? What do you want to accomplish? That's my question. Anybody wants to answer that question I'd love to hear it.

Mr. Gennette: Well, that's why I'm proposing the Strategic Planning Committee. Because we have to get cross department you know conversations not just the Planning Board. Planning Board's a very important piece but in the Town Planners focusing on his duty's day to day. Town Administrator is focusing on his duty's day to day. And who are we as residents who have to come up with what the future is gonna look like in Ludlow. You know, where are we? Cause we're very reactive. You know, we're not proactive and we need a plan.

Mr. Ender: Well, I like the fact that you said reactive and proactive. I'm a fan of proactive. Let's get involved and find out exactly what this community wants to be. Then you fashion your planning around that. I love participation by the residents. Find out what's important to them and then you build your plan there. You can't help but succeed like that.

Mr. Coelho: I just want to say that initially either of these spots is gonna be more reactive right now because we're running into roadblocks for not having enough people on the Board.

Mr. Ender: I understand that. And understand this gentleman, I am not involved in your group. So, I'm coming in looking in through a window right now. I'm just going on my experience of what I know works from a plan where people that come together to try to put something that is meaningful that's gonna happen. But you have differing opinions, the question is can you get consensus. That's really important.

Mr. Phoenix: I think for my answer to the question, I think my vision is something where our interface with people is more clear and more accessible. A lot of the things that we're currently dealing with, whether it's in the zoning bylaw or sub rules and regulations that are an accumulation of changes that have happened over decades and decades of changes. Which makes for a very muddy system. So, we're currently engaged in trying to overhaul the zoning bylaw and bring that into one cohesive document and I really want to see that happen. I want to see more accessibility to the public both in the way the document is structured as well as the language that's used. There are times in legal documents where you need to have specific language but a lot of the time you can much more clearly state what you're saying using plain language that everyone can understand. Similarly, I had worked before on trying to overhaul the subdiv rules and regulations that was difficult. At that point we had a different setup with the Board of Public Works. That might be something

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want to see and what we're already kinda working toward a bit. working on a number of initiatives along those lines currently. So, that's my vision for what l young families to be able to find housing that they can actually afford to have. So, we're people to have affordable homes. In a system that is increasingly becoming difficult for direction. We'll still be able to build the tax base and be able to provide opportunities for something that's valuable that needs to be preserved so we need to keep moving in that keep a lot of our rural character, a lot of our industrial and agricultural roots. I think that's I think that was the way they put it together and that's been held at bay. We've been able to the Turnpike coming into town, Ludlow would be a major metropolitan area by the year 2000. strategic plan that UMASS did, I think back in the 70's predicted that with the influence of Planning but by Town Meeting by the Select Board and a lot of other groups in town. The busier and busier and busier. There's been a lot of effort that's been put in not just by and more overburdened over the years. Ever since the Turnpike went in it's been getting more oversight on how those businesses are coming in because it's only been getting more currently looking to change the way that the Center Steet corridor is handled so that there is because it tells you all the things that you can't really do. But along those lines this Board is of the time I've heard the Zoning Enabling Act be referred to as the Zoning Disabling Act So, we have to be very reactive, which stinks. But we have to work with what we have. A lot of what we have to do is by its very nature and the way the state law is set up very restricted. our zoning set up in town and we've got some things that work, some things that don't. A lot some different people at the helm for that. Similarly, our guiding thing right now is we've got we can look at picking up again after we're done with the zoning bylaw now that we have

Mr. Ender: Well, I like what you said, and you have to have Ludlow a place that people want to come to, not leave. The young people are saying it, even in this country, okay it's our turn. What do you have for us? From what I hear they can't buy a home until they're 40 cause the thing isn't atructured for them. They're losing faith or interest. Now if you have a enterprise, a township, that basically said you are gonns wanns live here cause here's why. It has a lot to offer you. Parts of the country, you know this, people flee certain parts cause there's nothing there for them. There are many places like that, that are dead zones. Now, Ludlow has done really well over the years, but it needs to look focused future wise in terms of what can they offer young people coming up. And when they are here in this town the question is, what's here for me? And if you have a really good planning program and they find it attractive what's here for me? Mr. Phoenix: So, with that, unless somebody has anything else to bring up, I'd like to thank you for coming in. Thank you for your time and your interest and I'm gonna ask if you can step away and we can bring in the next person to interview.

Mr. Ender: That's quite alright. So, I guess we're concluding right now? I thank you for your time. I appreciated meeting all of you and look forward to hearing back from you. And if I understand, if I am selected, I would need to run in the spring?

Mr. Phoenix: Yes.

Mr. Phoenix: Mr. Ellison. Want to join us up at the table.

Mr. Ellison: Absolutely. How are you, fellas?

Mr. Phoenix: Welcome. So, to kinda kick us off, kinda set the baseline here, we're interviewing to fill the spot for a full Board Member. We also do have an open spot for an associate member which would be a non-compensated spot that only votes on specific issues under certain circumstances. Both of those are currently vacant and the Board Member seat we'd be looking to appoint up through the spring election and then somebody would need to run for the remainder of the unexpired term. Is that something you were

already aware of?

Mr. Ellison: Yes

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Mr. Phoenix: If you were not selected to fill the spot up until the spring election, would you be interested in the associate member spot or are you solely interested in the Board Member seat?

Mr. Ellison: What is the associate member? I am not aware of that, so what does that entail?

Mr. Phoenix: So, the associate member functions as a voting member of the Planning Board in the case of special permits when we don't have enough members to be able to have the special permit hearing. Isn't able to act on really anything else, but allows us to have a voting quorum on those matters. So, if we don't have anybody coming in for a special permit there's really no need for the associate to come in but they're certainly welcome too so they can stay involved and everything and speak their mind on any issues that are coming up. Anything like that. It's actually the doorway that I took to getting involved with the Planning Board and a number of other members over the last couple of decades have done the same. I don't think even the majority but it's not unheard of. And Kathy actually, briefly went from being a full member to being the associate member and now she's back and she thought she was out, we dragged her back in. So, it is something we're, it's a way to be involved and be able to make a difference but it's a little bit more limited. And because of that, I think that's part of the reason why that's not considered as a compensated position. Not that the stipends huge to begin with but there's a difference between not huge and zero. So, with that do you think you have any inclination one way or another on the associate spot?

Mr. Ellison: Sure. I might be open to that.

Mr. Phoenix: Now I know you've come in. You've been involved with some of our processes before. You've seen our meetings. You've been involved in the Open Space Plan I believe. So, you're familiar with a lot of the processes and how we do things. What do you feel you'd be bringing to the table that would be unique, beneficial, that would be a benefit to the town and to the Planning Board?

Mr. Ellison: Well, I've been, 4th generation, my son's 5th generation town residents. We operate our small business. All of my relatives prior have worked for the town in one way or another. I currently am employed by the town. I know the town pretty well from a lot of angles. My industrial background, 23 years as a plant maintenance supervisor and then engineer for a major industrial corporation nearby, gave me a lot of background when it came to everything from operating a 4 million dollar budget to 23 employees to many, many technical certifications, municipal water treatment, hazardous materials, industrial refrigeration, electrical engineering, machine design, all of that and more. So, I built buildings and multiple plants throughout the Northeast, so I had to deal with local commissions that kind of thing, so I understand what it takes to do that. In terms of the town itself, I was a charter member of the Agricultural Commission. I currently operate a small business here in town. I bought 150 acres and pretty much if it was an open space I planted corn or hay on it prior to it being a development. So, I know the town in that regard in terms of the landscape. The demographics, having spent a long, long time, now coming on 39 years as a firefighter and paramedic here in town so I know what's going on in town. I've seen a change by the way. I also know the children and the youth. I've coached football for over 10 years up through the high school level and I've also coached hockey. Both championships by the way Chris. In addition to that I was a precinct member prior and I'm currently a precinct member, so I understand the voting process, and I understand what goes on with that. I've written grants, successfully, over a million dollars for that major corporation. I've also written grants for my farm successfully every year. And I've assisted the Chief with some of the grants that we've gotten through the Fire Department. So, I understand the grant process and what it takes to do that. So, I'm kinda well rounded let's just say that. I think I bring a lot in terms of a lot of areas, and I've been involved enough in the town now where you know, I think like Mr. Coelho said, you might as well come down and help out if somebody wants to help us out, we're under the gun here, sure, I'll pitch in.

Mr. Phoenix: I will say too, you brought up the small business, it doesn't go unnoticed. I think it was as recently as today people were throwing your name out there online for if people are in need of some product to throw the business your way because people have had good luck with ya. The thing is I know that doesn't necessarily go to the stuff that we do specifically here, but it does go to people having faith in somebody to be able to deliver on what they say November 6, 2025

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they are gonna do and be a reliable source that people can have faith in. So, you know, that was something that just came up and I thought it was worth mentioning. With that I want to open it up to everybody else. Anybody have anything they'd like to jump in with?

Mr. Coelho: With your background would you be able to point our fresh green Town Planner and the direction of where to find grants?

Mr. Ellison: I think I could assist him. Yeah, I think I could and I'm excited about being able to do that.

Mr. Coelho: That's a big part of it, I think.

Mr. Ellison: I really just to dovetail into that Chris, I really enjoyed both of my stints on the Open Space Planning Committee. I think it was a lot of fun and again if you didn't know what the town was like and you served on a committee you should know it by then. And you know I haven't, obviously worked with his predecessor, that was an honor, and I would look forward to being able to work with losh.

Mr. Gennette: Mr. Chairman, just for the community, cause I asked everybody kinda the same questions they were both, do you understand your role on the Board, what that would be? Obviously, Mr. Ellison, being on the Open Spacing Committee, is very close to the Planning Board so he's completely aware of that. And the other one was for grants, and he just attested to that so, I don't have any questions for Mr. Ellison at this time.

Mr. Rosenblum: Mr. Chairman, I worked on Open Space with you so, my question would be because these are things that we kind of discussed in it, in a round about way is and this kind of intertwines between our Board and Planning is what would you recommend for development that encourages growth in town?

I would like to see. kind of businesses that fit the town well come in and operate that would be something that man that's important. And so, yeah, I think that incentives, things like that, to make the right when it comes to what kind of businesses, where they're gonna go, all that, it's you folks and town, residents, myself included, you know, we look to you folks. The Selectmen, sure, but this size anyway. You folks have a tremendous responsibility because the people here, the frankly, I think the Planning Board are the gatekeepers. They're the gatekeepers for a town give them a good feeling. That they're safe in that regard. As best as you can. I think, quite not have things go south because something else just happened next to them. We want to they're gonns be able to come in, build a million-dollar home on a \$200,000 lot maybe and want to live here now. We have great services. But we also want them to feel good that incentives. Let's entice them in. Why do people want to live in Ludlow? Well, a lot of people to be able to get industry in here, why would they want to come to Ludlow? Well let's give em come here. Cause we haven't you know just gone one way. So, to get back to your question its agriculture. And that really is why the town is a great place and why people continue to time. But if you guys look at that and ladies, if you look at that, half of its industry and half of like to keep my focus on is the town seal on the side of the firetruck cause I look at it all the into the town. Not just residents but also with some business. You know, one of the things I commission, not charter commission, a commercial salesman if you will to bring people we can do to really entice them. You know, I think we should have a huge charter give them incentives in different areas to be able to come in, high speed permitting, whatever Board's to develop incentives whether its 40b, whether its heavy industry, whatever jobs to when you continue to be adversarial or we can start working or try to work better with all the meetings here whether its 40b or any of that stuff, right, I think it's a great opportunity for us frank don't let the tail wag the dog. There's a lot of things we've all talked about in various members have talked about this, I think that incentive programs a great idea. With that to be Mr. Ellison: You know we've talked about this a couple of times, I mean past Select Board

Mr. Rosenblum: Thank you.

Mr. Phoenix: Anything else? Kathy? Joel? Anthony?

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Mr. Silva: If elected and at a Planning Board Meeting presentation, you face a lot, you see a lot of positions how would you react? What steps would you take? If a meeting gets a little, you know? How would your reaction be?

Mr. Ellison: I think I know what you mean. Well luckily, I have spent a long time in management positions. Both at an industry, again 23 employees, male and female, and at the Fire Department I'm a company officer, a Lieutenant on Charlie group. So, we've had to go through quite a bit of training in order to deal with that kind of thing, try to manage that. I'm pretty confident about being able to deal with that in a professional manner and hopefully calm everybody down and get where we need to go.

Mr. Phoenix: We have had some, not just heated, but some odd meetings over the years. Without getting into the details now and getting to far off course we've had some odd situations. Kathy? Anthony? I don't think I've heard from either of you on this one.

Mr. Ellison: I know Bud's been very active in a lot of things. He's also attended several of our meetings and expressed interest on what's going on.

Mr. Phoenix: Anthony, anything from you?

Mr. Alves: No thanks, Mr. Phoenix. I think my question overlapped with yours. And Bud thanks for your interest.

Mr. Ellison: Thank you, sir.

Mr. Phoenix: With that, the thing that I have been asking everybody is, do you have any questions, comments for us?

Mr. Ellison: About the only thing that really I don't have an answer to is explain not only as a Board Member but as the associate, what happens when you're a precinct member and all of that?

Mr. Carpenter: You can no longer be elected to two. So, are you elected or appointed?

Mr. Ellison: Elected

Mr. Carpenter: So, you're elected precinct member, so you can stay on as a precinct member until the election. It's how it worked with me.

Mr. Ellison: Okay.

Mr. Phoenix: We can get clarification on that cause it's not gonna come up until Town Meeting anyway and May Town Meeting is going to be after the election anyhow. So, it's largely I think a moot point on that aspect. We can double check just in case there's a surprise special somewhere along the line. But, yeah, the two elected doesn't work. I believe if you're the associate, because that is appointed, I think that could be still Town Meeting Member. That's at least my understanding.

Mr. Carpenter: So, when I was appointed to the full-time seat, I was on Housing Authority and it was an un stipend position so I had to go through ethics and have the sign off saying that I could be both, but I held both until the election. And then when I won the Planning Board seat I immediately resigned from Housing.

Mr. Phoenix: And then just to cover this base too, since we're kinda in the neighborhood, number of years ago when we were going through and doing things the Planning Board was designated as Special Municipal Employees. So, that does allow you to be on the Board while also still being an employee of the town.

Mr. Rosenblum: That was just what I was going to say because knowing that he's a compensated employee already, you guys already have that status then?

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Mr. Phoenix: Yes. So, with that, I thank you for coming in. I think we're gonna have to have a little bit of conversation and see where everything lands but I appreciate you coming in. Appreciate the interest and the conversation. So, with that, we can start with conversation, we can start with somebody making a motion. I'm open to either approach.

Mr. Rosenblum: Mr. Chairman, I'll make a statement and just go from there. Going through the interview process, I mean I do like as you had said Mr. Coelho, is about a fresh perspective. I do like Haley in that aspect but I do see the fact that I think she wants to get her feet wet first and I can see that she's probably not to enthralled with running a campaign or running again. which I'd certainly welcome if somebody's got a different opinion. So, unless anybody has something that they want to say that it would be contrary to that is so just trying to triage that stuff the best we can. But it was a number of hits all together. person in the office was definitely the biggest bleed. Now getting the full Board Member on three and it's trying to prioritize where do we need it the most. And having the full-time see that the pool is gonna grow all that much. I think it's been tough cause we've been down still a possibility that somebody else might surprise us and want to take that on but I don't happens this evening, if we were to take on Mr. Ellison to fill the spot until the spring, there's so far. Mr. Silva: We were scheduled to have the Board of Assessors present information for us to decide on the Tax Classification hearing, however the date is not quite ready so we're going to, gentlemen, open the public hearing and then move it to a future date.

Motion made by Mr. Rosenblum to open the public hearing for the Board of Assessors Tax Classification at 5:57 P.M. **Mr. Gennette second. All in favor. Motion passed 3-0.**

6:00 P.M. – Richard Flebotte – To Discuss 82 Cady Street – Sun Splash Pools

Mr. Silva: Sir, my understanding is, I did see some of the pictures, if you would like to first of all for the people that are watching identify your name and also your address for the record.

Mr. Flebotte: My name is Richard Flebotte, and I own the property at 22 Wilno Avenue right next to it. My medically disabled son is living there right now. So, basically two reasons that I am here. Number one, the parking lot seems to be being used as a construction dumpsite. It's a constant turnover of trash on a daily basis or a couple of days. Trucks, panel trucks are pulling in and out. They drop off all kinds of debris and then the owners out there with the bobcat and he's moving debris around, putting it in metal piles, putting it into open, he has four open panel vans that sit out there with no plates on them. They move their trash back and forth and I'm not really sure what it is they have going on there. Other than I would say that it doesn't seem to be anything to do with pools. It seems to be more of a construction thing. In the beginning when they first opened it was definitely pools. I do know that the owner has construction licenses in Connecticut and runs construction businesses so, I really feel that's where the problem lies with that. The second problem is with the noise. He's out there all hours of the day and night. If you see the videos, you can see that he's out there late at night with the bobcat. We have him taped at midnight out there, moving stuff out of their trailers with his little hat. And when my son goes out to ask him about him, telling him he's late the guy will make comments to him and just be generally rude. And then the last thing was after I filed the complaint last week, I go over to visit my son and now I'm in a

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situation where he's got guys out there that work for him that all stop and trying to intimidate me and scare me. That wasn't my purpose. My purpose was to try and get the noise under control and maybe fence it off or just get it cleaned up. First time I went last year, it's been over a year, and they fined him a year ago and it just continues. That's about it.

Mr. Silva: Okay. Thank you. Gentlemen, any questions that you might have?

Mr. Gennette: Yeah, Mr. Chairman, Mr. Flebotte thank you for coming in. So, there's a new noise ordinance in Ludlow that I'm sure I saw Marc writing down that probably fits whatever this noise ordinance is. But have you made any complaint to the police department?

Mr. Flebotte: I have and they've told me the last few times that I went about the noise, one night the police officer came out and shut him down. Asked him to stop doing what he was doing. But they both told me there was no noise ordinance in Ludlow.

Mr. Gennette: When was that?

Mr. Flebotte: In fact, I went last Friday to the police department, and they said there's no noise ordinance in Ludlow. That there's nothing they can do about it.

Mr. Gennette: It just passed. Last October, it just passed.

Mr. Flebotte: I thought I saw something about the Chief passing something last year.

Mr. Gennette: Town Meeting passed it.

Mr. Flebotte: That's another reason that I was looking for that cause if nothing else, every other business in town, even our recycle center, doesn't have the type of trash that they have out there. They just don't have it. There's no other business in town that has that type of trash. So, I just don't understand.

Mr. Gennette: You're saying it's not pool material like above ground

Mr. Flebotte: No, there's all kinds of material out there. This is Teddy Bear Pools & Spas, and this is what a reputable pool place looks like. There's no trash. There's no garbage. Nothing like that. This other gentleman also lives on the street, and he took some pictures just from today.

Mr. Silva: Certainly, looks like a lot of stuff out there.

Mr. Flebotte: Those are over a whole year. If you look, it's the same area but over a whole year. So, they find em, he goes out, he picks it up, two days later it's right back out there. And like I said it's a lot of metal so, I don't know if he's recycling metal but there's a lot of metal open. There's just general construction. Doors laying there. Casings, door casings, stuff like

Mr. Gennette: You said he was fined a year ago? Who fined him? What department?

Mr. Flebotte: The Building Department.

Mr. Gennette: The Building Inspector did? Because I'm seeing the Board of Health here.

Mr. Flebotte: I spoke to the Board of Health last week and she, and the other one had a complaint last week she said from somebody else in the neighborhood. The Planning Board, the Building Department just had a complaint last week from another neighbor cause there's a new section that's just been built with half a milliondollar homes at the end of the street and they're sick of driving by it. He just had some pictures just from today. This is after I'm sure he was notified that I was coming before the post tonight.

Mr. Gennett: Well, I certainly would hope if this guys paying attention that he's not going to try to use intimidation. It would probably be the worst mistake he could make.

Mr. Rosenblum: Thank you for coming in for bringing this to us. I would say, only because I did look through a lot of these, I would say a lot of the metal is motors for pools. Some of the plastic there I saw, and I'm not discounting the mess, and I'm not discounting the late hours and everything, but I don't know about door frames, why those would be there, unless he's doing outhouses too. But looking at a lot of stuff here, that's a filter guard, it goes around the filter, and some of these are the tops for filters and cartridge filters and things, only because I have a pool and I maintain it myself, so I recognize a lot of this. However, the time of day yes, it's 10 o'clock on that for the noise.

Mr. Gennette: I think first offense is a warning and then they get a \$350 fine or something.

Mr. Rosenblum: The fines, obviously, the Building Inspector. I did drive by it today. The pavers are for around inground pools and stuff but just the mess in general I agree with you. And the fact that there is noise to all hours of the night, I think there was one that said about midnight. We got paint cans that are outside, things like that. And I just think in reference to Teddy Bear, they're much bigger and they have all the storage. And again, I'm not discounting it and that's why his stuff is all outside. In the very least if there was a vinyl fence around it to at least cover it up or if it's going to be out in the open like this. He's got pool shock bottles sitting out in the open outside. This stuff should either be in cannisters or there should be something there. We do have the right, I think it's with the Board of Health with unkempt properties.

Mr. Gennette: It's right here. Board of Health town bylaw Chapter 4, Section 35, unkempt property. Any residential or commercial property that has any type of overgrown vegetation or plantings that have overgrown to a point that rodents, animals, or vermin can dwell within. Any property of which debris, trash, junk, or garbage has accumulated on the ground, driveway, sidewalks, etc. for longer than 60 days shall be determined as unkempt. And they were issued that. That was to Gundam Realty, LLC and there out of Monson.

Mr. Silva: It looks like you've gone to all the channels that you should go to, and it looks like some of them are following through. Just like this letter just sent November 12th. So, they do have this letter, and the next step would be the Building Commissioner, which is the zoning enforcer. There is violations there so she would have to step in and mandate certain things and I'm sure she's been also notified.

Mr. Gennette: Well, if she's fined him a year ago, if the Building Inspector fined him a year ago there's already precedence set.

Mr. Rosenblum: And there was also I think, going back to 22, some of the things back to 2022. Mr. Chairman, again, I think this is where BJ follows up on this a little bit harder because it sounds like he's slapped on the wrist, cleans it up, and then right after that it's a mess again. Also, notifying him of, I think it's 8 o'clock on Sundays and 10 o'clock Monday through Saturday. I see it's a little different during the winter when it's darker earlier, so it seems like 5 o'clock seems like 9 o'clock.

Mr. Flebotte: Is that for construction equipment? Bobcats?

Mr. Rosenblum: Actually, Sundays is a no because construction on Sundays is zero. But construction kinda falls still I believe into the same timeframe, as it's loud noise.

Mr. Flebotte: Okay, I wasn't sure on that cause I thought the backup beepers from construction are usually 8 o'clock in most towns.

Mr. Gennette: That's not in this ordinance.

Mr. Silva: We have to differentiate that because we're saying construction and maybe he does have construction, but this is a pool place so they may even be open on Sundays which a lot of the construction companies won't be allowed to be open on Sunday. So, they may

be allowed and have some of these things but certainly they should abide by the laws and all we can do is maybe let the officials know that they have to move forward a little atronger.

Mr. Rosenblum: Yeah, it's an eye sore.

Mr. Gennette: I was gonna say it sounds like you're not really clear on the sound ordinance? Email so if you don't mind sending in an email. Can you provide him a copy of the ordinance is. I would also Marc in the morning and he'll give you a copy of what the sound ordinance is. I would also send a message over to the police department and notify them of this that's going on because if there's a potential of intimidation, I want to make sure that the police are well because if that. And I would make sure that you would file your complaint with necessary.

Mr. Flebotte: They actually told me to go to Palmer District Court.

Mr. Gennette: Who did? Our police department?

Mr. Flebotte: The police department, yes, told me to go to Palmer District Court and file a complaint.

Mr. Gennette: Why don't we get the Chief on the phone and find out what's going on over there. Why would we do that? It's in our town. We'll talk to the Chief and figure out what's going on. We'll let him manage the department.

Mr. Rosenblum: One more question. Are these trucks, the backs of these box trucks open at night?

Mr. Flebotte: All the time.

Mr. Rosenblum: That's what I'm saying is these things here. I'm looking at the pictures that you sent in. I mean these things shouldn't be open at night, cause first of all it's a safety hazard and second of all, safety hazard for children and second of all it's for rodents. So, things go back there, and you know when you leave your back garage door open, something scurries up in the attic. Like I said, I recognize a lot of the materials there and in essence he is doing construction, he or she, but it's unkempt. So, it's either clean it, keep it kept, move it behind the building, cause that's out to the side of the building too, cause that's where his trucks are and in the same sense is either put up a vinyl fence or put in some pods.

Mr. Flebotte: That would be great. Even there was a vinyl fence there when the bar was there. And I thought when the bar left it would be better and It's actually worse, if that's imaginable. Cause the bar was contained to Thursday, Friday, Saturday night. I knew when it was coming. Now I just never know. Thank you, gentlemen.

Mr. Gennette: Yeah, I would be really interested to know why the police department deferred him. Well hopefully ... sees this and just cleans it up. Hopefully they just remedy this situation. It doesn't' go any further, that would be best.

6:30 P.M. – Police Officer Candidate – Quashawn Branch

Mr. Silva: Chief, are we appointing two or one officer?

Chief Brennan: We're appointing two to two vacancies, and I'll be requesting a third as an alternate.

Mr. Gennette: I'm sorry Chief. I didn't mean to talk over there. What was it?

Chief Brennan: We have two vacancies currently, so I'm requesting to appoint two to two vacancies and also a selection of an alternate an appointment.

Mr. Silva: The first candidate before us at 6:30 is Quashawn Branch. So, Quashawn, we called you in and we somewhat changed the interview process, but we just want to meet the candidates. At least I do. I wanted to have everybody that we appoint; we meet them and at

least I have a face to see out there. So, if you could just give us a brief or comments about yourself, identify yourself, and let us know why it is you want to be a police officer in Ludlow.

Mr. Branch: So, I want to thank you guys for having me here. Taking the time to meet with me. A little bit about myself, currently I am a 10-year veteran at Baystate Medical Center. I'm a supervisor there. I am a special police officer there currently. I've been there for about 10½ years, somewhere around there. I am currently a special police officer here in Ludlow also. Why I'd like to be a police officer here in Ludlow? As soon as I came here as a special police officer if was like I was home. Literally the people in the town were welcoming. The department was welcoming and I enjoyed everything that I do here. I've always wanted to be part of a community where I could help keep it safe and secure. I feel this place in Ludlow would be home for me. It's an amazing feeling and I'm not just saying that it really is.

Mr. Rosenblum: I don't really have any questions. I would make more of a comment of saying I'm glad that you find Ludlow in the way that you do and that you like being here. And also thanking you for already 2 ½ years. I appreciate your service to the Town. Thank you.

Mr. Branch: Thank you

Mr. Gennette: Are you a Ludlow resident?

Mr. Branch: Not currently.

Mr. Gennette: I love to see your interest in it. I'm just looking at your scoring here, which exceeded all others. Which I think is awesome and I'm happy to have ya. So I appreciate you coming in.

Mr. Silva: Closing comment

Mr. Branch: I look to have a great future here. I really do. Thank you, guys, for having me.

Chief Brennan: I'll just add a little bit on our selection process really quick and this sort of applies to all three candidates. So, we had originally sent out our Civil Service list, using the Civil Service list of candidates. We had I believe 100 notices that went out to both residents and nonresidents to essentially fill two vacancies. According to the rules of Civil Service we looked at five possibly candidates and we were very fortunate in the sense we hit the jackpot because we got qualified candidates that were not just qualified but their also Certified Police Officers as Mr. Branch is. He's a Certified Police Officer. Ms. Rivera who you're going to meet after is also a Certified Police Officer.

Mr. Gennette: Does that mean they can start working immediately?

Chief Brennan: They can start. Well, a couple of things and I'll go over that really quickly. You will have to pass a medical screening. You'll have to pass the PAT. That's the obstacle course according to the Massachusetts HRD requirements. You'll have to complete the field training. You won't have to go to the academy because you're a Certified Police Officer. Once completed the field training process, which will probably be modified because you've been with us for 2½ years but we'll go over things that you may not have gotten as a Special Officer. Once that's completed, you'll be either assigned to the patrol shift either on midnight shift or 4-12 on a four and two schedule which includes weekends, holidays, overtime, including mandatory overtime for either shift coverage, overtime for training, and court testimony. Which you're all familiar with and I'm sure expect. And as far as the residency goes you just have to maintain residency within 10 miles of the border. We'd love to have you in town, obviously. That's basically the expectations and obviously you got to maintain your post certification, driver's license and Massachusetts license to carry, which will be issued by the PD.

Ms. Ribeiro: Mr. Chairman, just for a little clarification for the candidate, once he's appointed this evening, you can go ahead and work with the Chief as far as giving your notice and a start date. In the meantime, you're going to get an appointment letter from us which details all the contingencies in the offer that you'll need to do. So, you'll have something in writing explaining everything that's been mentioned.

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Mr. Silva: Desiree you can relax, breathe easy. This is very informal. What we generally do, and I like to have people come in, I like to meet, greet, and at least put a face to who it is we're hiring and so on and so forth. And I also like you to give us a little about yourself and why it is you want to become a police officer in Ludlow.

Ms. Rivers: Yes. As you guys know, my name is Desiree Rivers. I attended Nichols College. Graduated there in 2020. Graduated there within 3 years with my bachelor's degree in criminal justice and my minor in sport management. During my time there I also participated in the women's basketball team as well as the track and field team. From there, once I graduated, I knew I wanted to get into the police field. A little too young at the time so I decided to expand my knowledge kind of behind the screen with dispatching. So, I worked decided to expand my knowledge kind of behind these there, worked at towns like Southbridge and then college environments as well. And that translated to where I'm at now with the Town of Pelham. I've been a police officer for almost two years now, full-time. Mr. Rosenblum: Mr. Chair, where do you see yourself in 5 to 10 years?

Ms. Rivers: In 5 to 10 years, I look at myself being here, working wherever the department needs me, to fill whatever vacancy it is. Like when I said in my interview, I love going to trainings, sexual assault investigator, already certified in that, FTO certified, so wherever the department needs me is where I'm looking to go. So, in 5 years if that's the role that's open, I'm looking to fill that.

Mr. Rosenblum: Thank you.

Mr. Gennette: Bilingual as well. I know that's a big thing for you, you usually ask that.

Mr. Silva: Thank you. I always ask that. You always need a second language from time to time. It's always great. I don't really have much else for you. You kind of told me why it is and look forward to maybe working with you sometime. The Chief here might have a couple things for you.

Chief Brennan: Like all candidates I just brief them real quickly some expectations in the immediate sense. You have to complete a medical screening to the Civil Service specifications. You'll also need to pass the PAT. I'm sure you're familiar with what that is. That's the obstacle course. That's a requirement with Civil Service. You may have to pass a psychological screening. I know you passed one in the past. It depends on how old it is, you may have to pass that. You will not need a ROC academy because you've obviously a Certified candidate and passed a full-time academy. There will be a field training program. I know you're familiar with that. You're a field training officer I believe. So, that's typically 10 to 12 weeks. It may be modified as you have some experience in those roles. Once you've completed the field training, if you're able to complete that successfully, you'll be assigned either on the midnight shift or possibly the 4-12 shift on a four and two schedule. You'll be expected to work most weekends, holidays, overtime, including mandatory overtime for training, the courtroom testimony, and even shift coverage from time to time. So, I know you know what to expect in terms of busy we have plenty of work, so I think you're gonna like it. So, as far as the residency, you know that you're gonna have to establish a residency within the first 9 months within 10 miles of where I believe Feeding Hills should be within that proximity, so that shouldn't be an issue. Finally, you'll have to maintain your post certification, go to all in-service and trainings, maintain your driver's license, and you will get your Massachusetts license to carry will be issued by the Ludlow Police Department.

Mr. Gennette: Thank you so much. It's nice to bring some skilled officers into town.

Ms. Rivera: Thank you. I appreciate it.

Ms. Basch: I'm Becky Basch from the Pioneer Valley Planning Commission and we helped work with the Council on Aging and Age and Dementia Family Working Group to do some community engagement and develop a community assessment and action plan to make Ludlow an Age and Dementia friendly community. You actually already received designation. The process is for Age Friendly Community you apply for designation, then you create this assessment and action plan and then you submit the report to AARP and for Dementia Friendly designation you submit the report and this pledge which has to be signed by an elected official and then members of the working group and that gets submitted to Mass Councils on Aging who do the Dementia Friendly designation. So, we are looking to you for approval to submit the report to AARP and Mass Councils on Aging and to sign the pledge for final designation. So, and the process, I believe you received the report maybe a month ago. So, the process involves you know engagement a couple of listening sessions where we had almost 50 people at each one. It was a really great turnout. We did a table survey at the listening sessions and then we worked with a diverse working group which included several members of the Councils on Aging, someone from the Fire Department, library, Peoples Bank, Berkshire Bank, Health Department. So, they reviewed the report and action plan and then we sent the report and action plan to others who we listed as potential partners on individual actions and asked for comments. And we didn't get any comments back. I just got one comment from Access Care Partners who used to be West Mass Elder Care that they reviewed the report and looked good.

Mr. Silva: Nice. Gentlemen, any questions? Anything you got?

Mr. Gennette: Mr. Chairman, no, I mean I was on the Alzheimer's Association as a volunteer there and it was a lot of conversations about getting this going and I knew it had to go through the Senior Center, and I think they were actually trying to reach out to you previously. Mr. Rosenblum: Since we actually get a lot of people in here for this, I'm just gonna read the little bullet points they had if you don't mind. What's gonna happen with this new agreement, this is effective November 12th is Eversource is responsible for all jointly owned pole replacements, relocations, and new installations. Verizon will be responsible for removing the remaining jointly owned poles once a new pole has been installed and all equipment transfers are complete. Eversource will continue to respond to emergency situations involving damage to jointly owned poles from motor vehicle accidents or urgent public safety concerns. Each party will continue to be responsible for maintenance, repair, and inspections within their currently assigned municipalities. Cause I know that we usually have pole hearings, probably 6, 7, 8 of them a year. Cause I know that in our town and I haven't really recognized it, cause when I'm driving out it's dark out in the morning. Have you noticed we've had a lot of pole replacements, are the old poles coming out? Have they been pulled out? But they are coming out though.

Mr. Gennette: So, collaboration is designed to improve coordination and response times, streamline pole replacements and removal processes, enhance public safety, service reliability, and customer service while aligning with municipal efforts. So there's your replacement.

And it sort of aggregates and collaborates all of the Zen City does is they have an Al bot that scans the internet both sites that we give, that we these are very, very, stfordable. We're also looking to partner with Zen City. And what a link to the product so you can kind of see what it looks like. It's really, really cool. And all the whole community in terms of you know, what their priorities are. And I'll send you guys meeting members. You know, I think it's gonna be important to get you know feedback from mean, a sampling of the community but you know just beyond us and town staff and town options for the budget this year. This we'll be able to get input from the whole community. I about using this specifically for the budget, considering there's gonna be a lot of different really cool way to do it. You can scan a QR code or you can go onto the site and I'm thinking product improves the town's community engagement tools through surveys. And it's just a of the names of the companies. So, we just had another meeting with Poco. And Poco their want to give a quick update sort of like the types of programming we're looking at and some of the technology is just really cool, and I think it can be really helpful for the town. So, I just the Project Coordinator. Same thing with the voice bot. It's amazing how they can, we could have one of you read like three or four sentences and then they can use your voice to answer the questions. And it's really intuitive. It's sensitive to if somebody says that they're upset that their trash didn't get picked up. It's really intuitive about how it communicates. So, the goal there is to limit the amount of customer service calls that our departments are receiving but also after hours. So, if somebody is sitting at home and you have a question and instead of emailing it through the website you can actually go on the website or call, type it in, you can get your answer right then and there. This is sort of where a lot of towns are trending too. And again, all these solutions are very affordable. And I'm excited to see how we can expand our communications particularly like I said around the budget process for this year. Speaking of the budget, we have another IAC meeting tomorrow which is Insurance Advisory Committee to continue discussions on how we can navigate through this Fiscal Year 27 crisis that we're anticipating resulting from our health insurance increases. And, you know, everybody's been really very open and understanding that we're in sort of this situation together and we're looking forward to continuing to negotiate with them and try to find a reasonable solution that works for everybody. And then lastly, I just want to remind people that town is sponsoring an angel tree program this year and Ludlow residents in need can apply for a gift card while residents and businesses who wish to help can donate gift cards to support the neighbors. Applications are available for those in need on our website and the Facebook page. There's a donation box in the town hall on the third floor in the Selectmen's office and also on the first floor in the hearing room. Donations will be accepted until this Friday, November 21st and our hope is to bring the town together to support those in need this holiday season, which is really what it's all about. PUBLIC SAFETY AND GOOD ORDER

Chapter 140

LICENSES

Section 2

ISSUANCE OF LICENSE TO BE INNHOLDERS OR COMMON VICTUALLERS; SIGNING; REFUSAL; FEE; RECORD; PENALTY

Section 2. Licensing authorities may grant licenses to persons to be innholders or common victuallers. Such license shall not be issued or be valid until it has been signed by a majority of the aldermen in cities where the license is to be granted by the aldermen, by a majority of the licensing board in other cities or by the selectmen in towns. An alderman, any member of the licensing board or a selectman may refuse to sign a license for a person who, in his opinion, has not complied with this chapter. This section shall not require the licensing authorities to grant either of said licenses if, in their opinion, the public good does not require it. Unless otherwise established in a town by town meeting action and in a city by city council action, and in a town with no town meeting by town council action, by adoption of appropriate by-laws and ordinances to set such fees, a fee of not more than twenty-five dollars may be charged for either of said licenses, but in no event shall any such fee be greater than \$100. The licenses shall be recorded in the office of the licensing

authorities. An alderman, member of a licensing board or selectman who signs a license granted contrary to this chapter shall be punished by a fine of not more than fifty dollars.

- 1.3 During the Term, Customer may have access to Updates upon request at no additional cost. "Updates" shall mean certain new features as determined by Zencity, or fixes of minor errors in the Licensed Program which are incorporated in a new release of the Licensed Program.
- 1.4 Certain upgrades can be delivered to Customer upon commercial terms and conditions to be agreed upon. "**Upgrades**" shall mean enhancements, new functionalities that are added into the Licensed Program.

2. RESTRICTIONS AND RESPONSIBILITIES

- 2.1 Customer agrees not to, directly or indirectly: reverse engineer, decompile, disassemble, or otherwise attempt to discover the source code, object code, or underlying structure, ideas, or algorithms of the Licensed Program, Documentation or data related to the Licensed Program, except to the extent such a restriction is limited by applicable law; modify, translate, or create derivative works based on the Licensed Program; or copy, reproduce, rent, lease, distribute, assign, sell, or otherwise dispose of the Licensed Program, in whole or in part, or otherwise commercially exploit, transfer, or encumber rights to the Licensed Program; or remove any proprietary notices.
- 2.2 Customer will use the Licensed Program only in compliance with all applicable laws and regulations (including, but not limited to, any export restrictions, surveillance and monitoring restrictions, and any privacy and data protection requirements).
- 2.3 Customer shall be responsible for obtaining and maintaining any equipment and other services needed to connect to, access, or otherwise use the Licensed Program and Customer shall also be responsible for (a) ensuring that such equipment is compatible with the Licensed Program, (b) maintaining the security of such equipment, user accounts, passwords and files, and (c) for all uses of Customer user accounts with or without Customer's knowledge or consent. To the extent Customer provides any Personal Data (as defined below) of personnel for registration purposes, Customer represents and warrants that it has any right, license, consent, and power and it has provided any notice, all as required under applicable law, to provide Zencity with such Personal Data and will be fully and solely responsible for providing only Personal Data of personnel related to the Customer. Zencity will handle such Personal Data in accordance with its Privacy Policy available at: https://zencity.io/privacy-policy/.
- 3. PROPRIETARY RIGHTS. Zencity retains all right, title, and interest in the Licensed Program, Documentation and any future modifications and enhancements thereof, and all intellectual property rights (including all past, present, and future rights associated with works of authorship, including exclusive exploitation rights, copyrights, and moral rights, trademark, and trade name rights and similar rights, trade secret rights, patent rights, and any other proprietary rights in intellectual property of every kind and nature) therein. Customer is granted only a limited right of use to the Licensed Program and Documentation as set forth herein, which right of use is not coupled with an interest and is revocable in accordance with the terms of this Agreement.
- 4. CONFIDENTIALITY. Each party (the "Receiving Party") agrees not to disclose (except as permitted herein) any Confidential Information of the other party (the "Disclosing Party") without the Disclosing Party's prior written consent. "Confidential Information" means all confidential business, technical, and financial information of the disclosing party that is marked as "Confidential" or an equivalent designation or that should reasonably be

understood to be confidential given the nature of the information and/or the circumstances surrounding the disclosure (including the terms of the applicable License Agreement). Zencity's Confidential Information includes, without limitation, the software underlying the Licensed Program and all Documentation. The Receiving Party agrees: (i) to use and disclose the Confidential Information only in connection with this Agreement; and (ii) to protect such Confidential Information using the measures that Receiving Party employs with respect to its own Confidential Information of a similar nature, but in no event with less than reasonable care. Receiving Party shall, before receipt or usage of such Confidential Information inform its personnel of Receiving Party's confidentiality obligations under this Agreement. Notwithstanding the foregoing, Confidential Information does not include information that: (i) has become publicly known through no breach by the Receiving Party; (ii) was rightfully received by the Receiving Party from a third party without restriction on use or disclosure; or (iii) is independently developed by the Receiving Party without access to such Confidential Information. Notwithstanding the above, the Receiving Party may disclose Confidential Information to the extent required by law or court order, provided that prior written notice of such required disclosure and an opportunity to oppose or limit disclosure is given to the Disclosing Party.

5. DATA AND MATERIALS LICENSE.

- 5.1 Customer grants Zencity a non-exclusive, transferable, perpetual, worldwide, and royalty-free license to use any data or information provided by Customer for use in, by, or in connection with the Licensed Program, any information collected, and/or any analysis of any such information conducted by the Licensed Program.
- 5.2 Any content created by Customer and provided to Zencity for use in connection with the Licensed Program or other services provided by Zencity ("Customer Materials") shall be the sole property of the Customer. Customer hereby grants Zencity and its successors and assigns a perpetual, irrevocable, transferrable, worldwide, royalty-free, fully paid-up, and non-exclusive license under any of Customer's intellectual property, moral or privacy rights to use, copy, distribute, display, modify and create derivative works of any Customer Materials for the provision of the services in accordance with the terms of this Agreement. The parties acknowledge that Zencity does not require any Personal Data to be provided in order to provide the Licensed Program and Customer undertakes that it shall not provide Zencity with any Personal Data as part of the Customer Materials. To the extent the Customer Materials shall include any Personal Data it shall be incidental and Customer shall be fully liable for such Personal Data in accordance with the terms of this Agreement and applicable law.

6. FEES.

6.1 The fees for the Licensed Program ("Fees") are set forth in the applicable Order Form. Properly submitted invoices for which payment is not received within fourteen (14) days of the invoice due date shall accrue a late charge of 1.5% interest per month, compounding annually. The Fees are exclusive of any applicable taxes, which, if payable by Zencity, shall be billed to and paid by Customer, including any bank fees related to the Customer's wire transfer. Customer may not withhold or set-off any amounts from the Fees. For the avoidance of doubt, discounts or credits relating to any term defined in any Order Form shall apply to said term only and shall not carry over to any Renewal Term.

7. TERM & TERMINATION

- 7.1 This Agreement shall commence on the Effective Date and continue for the period of the Licensed Program purchased pursuant to any applicable and outstanding Order Form, including any renewal term, unless earlier terminated in accordance with this Section 7. In the event of any Renewal Term, the Fees payable for the Licensed Program shall be updated as specified in the Order Form. Either party may terminate this Agreement immediately by giving written notice to the other party if: (i) the other party breaches a material provision of this Agreement and fails to cure the breach within seven (7) days after being given written notice thereof; or (ii) the other party is judged bankrupt or insolvent, makes a general assignment for the benefit of its creditors, a trustee or receiver is appointed for such party; or any petition by or on behalf of such party is filed under any bankruptcy or similar laws.
- 7.2 The Initial Term shall be automatically extended for successive renewal terms of 12 months each (each, a Renewal Term and collectively with the Initial Term, the Term) unless either party provides written notice of non-renewal to the other party at least 90 Days before the end of each applicable term.
- 7.3 Upon termination, Customer will pay in full for the Licensed Program up to and including the effective date of termination. Upon any termination of this Agreement: (a) the license of the Licensed Program hereunder shall immediately terminate; and (b) each party shall return to the other party or, at the other party's option, destroy all Confidential Information of the other party in its possession.
- 7.4 All sections of this Agreement which by their nature should survive termination will survive termination, including, without limitation, accrued rights to payment, confidentiality obligations, warranty disclaimers, and limitations of liability.

8. WARRANTY AND DISCLAIMER

- 8.1 Zencity represents and warrants that: (i) it has all right and authority necessary to enter into and perform this Agreement; and (ii) the Licensed Program shall perform in accordance with generally prevailing industry standards.
- 8.2 Customer represents and warrants that (i) it has all right and authority necessary to enter into and perform this Agreement; (ii) it owns all right, title, and interest in and to all data, including without limitation, any Personal Data that may be included therein, provided to Zencity (if any) for use in connection with this Agreement, or possesses the necessary authorization thereto; and (iii) Zencity's use of such data or materials including Customer Materials as contemplated hereunder will not violate the rights of any third party; (iv) it has all right, license and consent required to provide Zencity with the Customer Materials, including Personal Data contained therein, if and to the extent provided in accordance with Section 5.2 above; (v) the Customer Materials and Zencity's use thereof in accordance with the terms of this Agreement does not and will not infringe upon any third party's right; and (vi) it shall at all times use the Licensed Program in compliance with applicable law. "Personal Data" have the definition ascribed to it by the General Data Protection Regulation (EU) 2016/679 of the European Parliament and of the Council of 27 April 2016 ("GDPR")) or any parallel term in the jurisdiction in which the Licensed Program is being used.

ZENCITY DOES NOT WARRANT THAT USE OF THE LICENSED PROGRAM WILL BE UNINTERRUPTED OR ERROR-FREE; NOR DOES IT MAKE ANY WARRANTY AS TO THE RESULTS THAT MAY BE OBTAINED FROM USE OF THE LICENSED PROGRAM. EXCEPT AS SET FORTH IN THIS SECTION 8, THE LICENSED PROGRAM IS PROVIDED "AS IS" AND ZENCITY DISCLAIMS ALL WARRANTIES, EXPRESS OR IMPLIED, INCLUDING, BUT NOT LIMITED TO, IMPLIED WARRANTIES OF MERCHANTABILITY, TITLE, FITNESS FOR A PARTICULAR PURPOSE, AND NON-INFRINGEMENT. ZENCITY DOES NOT WARRANT THAT ANY OR ALL FAILURES, DEFECTS OR ERRORS WILL BE CORRECTED, OR WARRANT THAT THE FUNCTIONS CONTAINED IN THE LICENSED PROGRAM WILL MEET CUSTOMER'S REQUIREMENTS.

- 8.3 To the extent the Licensed Program or any services provided by Zencity hereunder are provided through or in connection with any third-party services, Zencity shall not have any responsibility for any technical issues or limitations resulting from the use of such third-party service, including actions of Zencity on such third-party service taken on behalf of and at the instruction of Customer. - 9. LIMITATION OF LIABILITY. - 10. MISCELLANEOUS, Capitalized terms not otherwise defined in these Terms and Conditions have the meaning set forth in the applicable License Agreement. Neither party shall be held responsible or liable for any losses arising out of any delay or failure in performance of any part of this Agreement, other than payment obligations, due to any act of God, act of governmental authority, or due to war, riot, labor difficulty, pandemic, failure of performance by any third-party service, utilities, or equipment provider, or any other cause beyond the reasonable control of the party delayed or prevented from performing. Zencity shall have the right to use and display Customer's logos and trade names for marketing and promotional purposes in connection with Zencity's website and marketing materials, subject to Customer's trademark usage guidelines (as provided to Zencity). If any provision of this Agreement is found to be unenforceable or invalid, that provision will be limited or eliminated to the minimum extent necessary so that this Agreement will otherwise remain in full force and effect and enforceable. This Agreement is not assignable or transferable by either party without the other party's prior written consent, provided however that either party may assign this Agreement to a successor to all or substantially all of its business or assets. This Agreement (including the License Agreement) is the complete and exclusive statement of the mutual understanding of the parties and supersedes and cancels all previous written and oral agreements, communications, and other understandings relating to the subject matter of this Agreement. All waivers and modifications must be in a writing signed by both parties. No agency, partnership, joint venture, or

employment is created as a result of this Agreement and neither party has any authority of any kind to bind the other party in any respect. In any action or proceeding to enforce rights under this Agreement, the prevailing party will be entitled to recover costs and attorneys' fees. All notices under this Agreement will be in writing and will be deemed to have been duly given when received if personally delivered; when receipt is electronically confirmed, if transmitted by facsimile or e-mail; the day after it is sent if sent for next day delivery by recognized overnight delivery service; and upon receipt, if sent by certified or registered mail, return receipt requested. This Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of New York without regard to its conflict of laws provisions and the competent courts of New York City shall have exclusive jurisdiction to hear any disputes arising hereunder.
